My name is Sergio Lambarri, a board member of the Atwater Village Neighborhood Council and an appointed member of the Citizens Advisory Committee for the Glendale/Hyperion Complex of Bridges Project.

The Atwater Village Neighborhood Council, along with the Atwater Village Chamber of Commerce, the Atwater Village Residence Association, Friends of Atwater Village, and hundreds of residents and business alike, find that Exhibit 1 incorporates the best of all proposed aspects yet allows for the most flexibility now and into the future.

We realize the main purpose of the Complex of Bridges retrofit is so that these historic bridges can withstand a major seismic event. As the complex now stands it is a dangerous and unstable structure, yet the Bridge Project has been on the Council docket since 2005. At previous meetings a consensus could not be reached on which plan to approve and the funding was reallocated. We cannot afford to procrastinate any longer, not only for the possible loss of funding but for the safety of all that utilize and depend on these bridges. We urge you to adopt Exhibit 1 as it is by far the best option.

Exhibit 1 provides four narrower traffic lanes for the safe and efficient movement of private autos, service trucks, delivery trucks, buses, ambulances, fire trucks, and police cars. It also adds an elevated five foot wide bike lane up the bridge and an elevated six foot wide bike lane down the bridge, along with an elevated wider then minimum ADA compliant sidewalk with a barrier to separate vehicles from pedestrians.

All these improvements are for the safety of all that use this historic bridge: motorists, bicyclists, and pedestrians alike. To add these safety measures with-in the confines of this bridge certain aspects need to be withdrawn. With the absence of the south/east sidewalk, which has no stairway to the streets below and dead ends at the Waverly Bridge, space will be provided for the two elevated bike lanes and the elevated protected ADA sidewalk, all while retaining the four motor vehicle lanes.

This area will have an expanded volume of traffic from the civil engineering projects to the multi-family housing complexes being planned and built in and around the surrounding area: the \$1-billion River Project, the expansion of North Atwater Park, the planned 1,100 parking space New Life Vision Church, the newly proposed 60 unit complex in north Atwater Village, and the two major malls along with the multiple apartments complexes coming on line across our border in the City of Glendale. This is only one of three arteries that lead into Atwater Village; we should not restrict access for service or delivery trucks, or for the residences that call this Village home, nor can we afford to have our emergency vehicles trapped on a constricted roadway when critical seconds count. Improvements to the Complex of Bridges needs to take into account future growth and in order to accomplish this we cannot consider confining ourselves to a bottleneck configuration.

We look forward to when the Complex of Bridges Project is completed. A new pedestrian/bicycle bridge across the L.A. River, the addition of multiple bicycle lanes, ADA compliant walkways, a reconfiguration of the I-5 north bound off ramp, a widening of the Glendale Bridges, a radar activated speed limit sign at the base of the bridge, a refurbishment of the existing street lamps, and a return of the original balustrade design on the historic Hyperion Bridge will be a vision to the future with an acknowledgement to the past. With the incorporation of Exhibit 1 we will have a much stronger, more efficient, multi-modal, and more aesthetically pleasing bridge for the next hundred years.

The Atwater Village Neighborhood Council requests that the following Community Impact Statement be added to Council File 05-0173 supporting Exhibit 1 of the Glendale/Hyperion Bridge Improvement Project.

COMMUNITY IMPACT STATEMENT

The Atwater Village Neighborhood Council, along with the Atwater Village Chamber of Commerce, the Atwater Village Residents Association, and Friends of Atwater Village, in regards to the Glendale/Hyperion Bridge Improvement Project, vigorously supports Exhibit 1 as described by the Bureau of Engineering to the Citizens Advisory Committee.

We fully support the addition of bicycle lanes and an ADA compliant sidewalk that will travel the length of the bridge. We also support four motor vehicle traffic lanes which will provide the most flexibility when taking future needs of our community into account.

Every other exhibit would lock-in a three lane bottle neck configuration and would be a detriment to the future growth of our community, Council District 13, and the entire City of Los Angeles.

This Community Impact Statement is based on the action taken at the regularly scheduled Board of Governors meeting on November 13, 2014; the Atwater Village Neighborhood Council has adopted the following motion by a vote of 13 yes's, 4 no's, 0 abstentions, and has directed that this Community Impact Statement be filed with the City Clerk's office reflecting its position.

RE: PRESERVING 4-LANE ACCESS TO THE GLENDALE-HYPERION VIADUCT

Dear Eric, Mitch and Tom:

The Glendale-Hyperion Viaduct is an important part of Atwater's vehicular infrastructure. It gives local drivers and far-flung commuters' easy access to surrounding communities, the 5 Interstate Freeway and nearby businesses. Since its construction the bridge has primarily served to facilitate vehicular travel. Today, the Hyperion Bridge remains a key artery for drivers to travel from, to or thru Atwater Village.

The Atwater Village Chamber of Commerce (AVCC) reaffirms its resolute support for design option #1. This option is the best design out of the three deliberated by the Citizens Advisory Committee. It is the only design that will preserve the 4 traffic lanes on Hyperion's main bridge while providing for pedestrian and bicyclist safety.

Preserving the 4 traffic lanes is of upmost importance to Atwater's small business community. Local consumers have shown time and time again that their preferred method of travel to shop in Atwater Village is by automobile. We, as local residents have attended many community meetings and through the years have given our input and voiced our concerns regarding the safety and historic restoration that would be involved in the project.

We believe the option of 4 vehicle lanes, 2 bike lanes and 1 extended sidewalk would be the most equitable choice to serve the needs of all modes of transportation. We applaud Council Members O'Farrell and La Bonge for their balanced common sense approach to this very complex bridge. We believe this is an all inclusive solution that does not elevate one groups needs over the others.

As residents of the Atwater Village community we feel that the reduction of vehicle lanes would negatively impact the flow of traffic in and out of our neighborhood. The bridge is a main thoroughfare, a truck route and also has a constant flow of vehicles exiting and entering the freeway off-ramps alongside the bridge.
