At the Cultural Heritage Commission meeting of November 16, 2006, the Commission moved to include the above property in the list of Historic-Cultural Monuments, subject to adoption by the City Council.

## **FINDINGS**

1) The building "embodies the distinguishing characteristics of an architectural type specimen, inherently valuable for a study of a period style or method of construction" as an example of early Mediterranean-Spanish Colonial Revival residential architecture.

## **CRITERIA**

The criterion is the Cultural Heritage Ordinance which defines a historical or cultural monument as any site (including significant trees or other plant life located thereon) building or structure of particular historic or cultural significance to the City of Los Angeles, such as historic structures or sites in which the broad cultural, economic, or social history of the nation, State or community is reflected or exemplified, or which are identified with historic personages or with important events in the main currents of national, State or local history or which embody the distinguishing characteristics of an architectural type specimen, inherently valuable for a study of a period style or method of construction, or a notable work of a master builder, designer or architect whose individual genius influenced his age. At issue is whether the Commissioners determine the building is significant enough to warrant designation.

## **DISCUSSION**

Built in 1924-25 in the Ambassador Hill area of Los Angeles, this house exhibits character-defining features of Mediterranean and Spanish Colonial Revival style architecture. The primary façade facing the street is asymmetrically composed. It includes a sculpted plaster front doorway, arched openings and a second floor balcony. The roof is a 'S' style clay tile over gabled forms. At the rear of the property is a one-story, flat roofed, partially converted garage with stepped parapet. The proposed Monsignor O'Brien House historic monument exhibits character-defining features that include a simple rectangular floor plan, smooth stucco, multi-lite recessed wood casement windows and French doors, decorative wrought iron railings and window grilles, and Spanish tile roofing. The interior has hardwood floors, decorative plaster moldings and built-in cabinetry.

The house is the work of architect Clarence J. Smale, AIA. Smale is noted for the 1929-30 Smith House in the proposed Hancock Park HPOZ, described in Gebhard and Winter's An Architectural Guidebook to Los Angeles as "a rare concrete Art Deco house." Smale is also noted for an Art Deco style apartment building located in the Mid-City West area. The Cultural Heritage Commission and the City Council have previously approved a structure in this neighborhood - the Franklin T. Briles Residence at 151 N. Berendo Street - as a Historic-Cultural Monument.

Although the original building permit for the property shows another name, the house was owned for several decades by Monsignor Kenneth R. O'Brien, a prominent member of the Roman Catholic Archdiocese of Los Angeles.

The Monsignor O'Brien House property successfully meets one of the specified Historic-Cultural Monument criteria: "embodies the distinguishing characteristics of an architectural type specimen, inherently valuable for a study of a period style or method of construction." As a Mediterranean-Spanish Colonial Revival style residential building designed by a noted architect, the property qualifies for designation as a Historic-Cultural Monument based on this criterion.

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# **BACKGROUND**

At its meeting of September 21, 2006, the Cultural Heritage Commission voted to take the application under consideration. On October 19, 2006, the Cultural Heritage Commission toured the subject property.
