If the police department makes the changes they are proposing many in the entertainment industry are saying that this will drive business out of the city. Not only will the retired officers lose their jobs, many others will be negatively impacted by this. I urge the members of the committee to listen carefully to all the facts, not just the concerns for potential problems that have not occurred. The retired officers provide a needed service in a professional manner that allows more sworn active duty officers to remain on the street doing what they should be doing. To take an active duty officer away from their normal duties only to sit on a film location lane closure makes no sense. They should remain out on the streets fighting crime. We in the city certainly don't need fewer officers on the streets, we need more. When you consider that the retired officers are in uniform and are indeed armed are they not a deterrent in their own way? In a way that actually adds a deterrent for crime at no cost to the city at all. There are so many more reasons to keep the retired officers working these jobs but I will keep this brief for now.
