At the Cultural Heritage Commission meeting of May 3, 2007, the Commission moved to include the above property in the list of Historic-Cultural Monuments, subject to adoption by the City Council.

As required under the provisions of Section 22.126 of the Los Angeles Administrative Code, the Commission has solicited opinions and information from the office of the Council District in which the site is located and from any Department or Bureau of the city whose operations may be affected by the designation of such site as a Historic-Cultural Monument. Such designation in and of itself has no fiscal impact. Future applications for permits may cause minimal administrative costs.

The City Council, according to guidelines set forth in Section 22.125.1 of the Los Angeles Administrative Code, shall act on the proposed inclusion to the list within 90 days of the Council or Commission action, whichever occurs first. By resolution, the Council may extend the period for good cause for an additional 15 days.

The Cultural Heritage Commission would appreciate your inclusion of the subject modification to the list of Historic-Cultural Monuments upon adoption by the City Council.





FINDINGS

The building “embodies the distinguishing characteristics of an architectural type specimen, inherently valuable for a study of a period style or method of construction” as an example of Swiss/Alpine Chalet and Craftsman-style residential architecture.

CRITERIA

The criterion is the Cultural Heritage Ordinance which defines a historical or cultural monument as any site (including significant trees or other plant life located thereon) building or structure of particular historic or cultural significance to the City of Los Angeles, such as historic structures or sites in which the broad cultural, economic, or social history of the nation, State or community is reflected or exemplified, or which are identified with historic personages or with important events in the main currents of national, State or local history or which embody the distinguishing characteristics of an architectural type specimen, inherently valuable for a study of a period style or method of construction, or a notable work of a master builder, designer or architect whose individual genius influenced his age.

SUMMARY

Built in 1904, this two-and-a-half story residential building exhibits character-defining features of Swiss/Alpine Chalet and Craftsman-style architecture. The front-gabled wood-frame building has decorative wood trimmed fascia, triangular knee braces, and rafters. A half-length porch on the west façade encloses a slightly off-centered entrance and stained-glass window. The building’s exterior features wood siding and composition shingle. The windows are fixed single and multi-pane, multi-pane and single pan casement, and a bay window. Significant interior spaces include an entry hall with beamed ceiling, original open stair landing and stairs, French doors, and built-in cabinetry.

The proposed Louise Pratt House historic monument was designed in 1904 by an unidentified architect. The building was built for Louise Pratt, a real estate developer and philanthropist who was married to Edwin W. Pratt, an employee of the Los Angeles Electric Company and the Los Angeles Lighting Company, a pioneering electric utility in the 1880s.

The subject property may be significant as an example of the Swiss/Alpine Chalet and Craftsman style as well as its possible association with significant historical figures.

The subject property is listed on the National Register of Historic Places (US-87000139) as a contributing property to the Menlo Avenue-29th Street Historic District.

Later alterations to the subject property include the addition of a detached garage and a stained-glass window (1979) to a preexisting window frame adjacent to the entrance.

The Louise Pratt House property successfully meets one of the specified Historic-Cultural Monument criteria: “embodies the distinguishing characteristics of an architectural type specimen, inherently valuable for a study of a period style or method of construction.” As a residential building designed in the Swiss/Alpine Chalet and Craftsman style, the property qualifies for designation as a Historic-Cultural Monument based on this criterion.

FINDINGS

At its meeting of February 15, 2007, the Cultural Heritage Commission voted to take the application under consideration. On March 15, 2007, the Cultural Heritage Commission toured the subject property.

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



SUMMARY

Built in 1904, this two-and-a-half story residential building exhibits character-defining features of Swiss/Alpine Chalet and Craftsman-style architecture. The front-gabled wood-frame building has decorative wood trimmed fascia, triangular knee braces, and rafters. A half-length porch on the west façade encloses a slightly off-centered entrance and stained-glass window. The building's exterior features wood siding and composition shingle. The windows are fixed single and multi-pane, multi-pane and single pan casement, and a bay window. The exterior of the house is largely intact and in good condition. A west facade window, north of the entry door has been replaced w/ a same-size single fixed pane stained glass by artisan Katsuji (Kat) Shinomoto, circa 1979. At the rear/east elevation, a course of windows in the library has been altered by the addition of French doors & the retention of two of the ribbon windows as side lights. A deck has been added at the east. The garage has been converted to living space. The interior is in good condition with some alterations as the structure, over the decades, was converted from a single family residence, to a duplex and back to a single family residence now serving as student housing. Pocket doors are temporarily closed & there is one temporary wall (which contains no electrics) to provide for student privacy. The majority of interior & exterior character defining elements are extant.

It is State listed as No. 026964, as a contributing property (1D) to the Menlo Avenue/29th Street [National] Historic District and as an individual property (1S). It is also a contributing structure in the North University Park Specific Plan. With all of this it is not eligible for the Mills Act program and can only become eligible if it can gain HCM status. Biography: Louise Yelverton Shipman Pratt

Louise Pratt House ~ 2706-2708 South Menlo Avenue, Los Angeles CA 90007

Louise Yelverton Shipman was born in New York State in November of 1864. In 1888 she married Edwin W. Pratt of California. They settled in Los Angeles where Mr. Pratt was, until August of 1897, the confidential man of the operation, and longest term employee, of the Los Angeles Electric Company and the Los Angeles Lighting Company. The Los Angeles Electric Company was the city's pioneer electric utility, organized in 1882 to provide electric street lighting in the city of Los Angeles utilizing strategically placed 150 foot high masts, each of which carried three arc-lights illuminated by electricity. The system was unveiled on December 31, 1882 by Mayor Toberman, providing the first electric service in the City.

In August of 1897 a financial scandal rocked the Los Angeles Electric Company and the Los Angeles Lighting Company and Edwin Pratt, who was noted in the *Los Angeles Times* as, "...a man of ample means outside his employment," who was in no way related to the cash of the operation resigned from the companies amidst the resignations of colleagues and the suicide of one. (*Los Angeles Times*. Aug 31, 1897. pg. 7) No record has been found indicating Mr. Pratt's next employment. In 1904 the company was reorganized as the Los Angeles Gas and Electric Company.

At a later unknown date Louise Pratt and Edwin W. Pratt were divorced. While still married, the Pratts had regularly invested in real estate. Louise continued to invest in land and real estate and her dealings were frequently chronicled in the real estate columns of the city's newspapers. Among her holdings were a 1907 six-story apartment building she had built at 649 South Olive Street, a house on 6th between Hill and Grand streets, the Pratt residence at 816 S. Figueroa Street and many other investments.

In 1910 Louise Pratt and friends undertook an extended grand tour visiting Hawaii, Japan, China, Korea, Manchuria, the Malay Peninsula, Java, Burma, India, Ceylon, Arabia, Egypt and Africa, followed by an extended tour through Europe.

Louise Pratt was regarded as an important Los Angeles philanthropist and was active in the Ebell Club and the Home Musical Club. Pratt died June 10, 1912, in the home of friends Mr. and Mrs. Robert Marsh, 1119 Westchester Place. At the time of her death the majority of her property was in real estate including 100 shares of the stock of Country Club Park, 336 shares of the East Naples Land Company and 25 shares of San Gabriel River Improvement Company. The publication of the details of Pratt's will included bequests to many of the charities and organizations of which she had been a life-long supporter. Among the beneficiaries of her accumulated wealth were Rev. Dana Bartlett who established Bethlehem, a men's hotel for the honest (working) poor and other related charities, the Protestant Los Angeles Orphans' Home, Children's Hospital of Los Angeles, George Junior Republic (an innovative residential assistance program for youth founded in central New York State) and the Salvation Army. Pratt also established at Occidental College a scholarship trust fund for the "assistance, maintenance and education of female students." The trust was established in the name of Pratt's brother, Dr. D. M. Shipman who, at the time, was a long term inmate of the New York State Insane Asylum. Monetary and material gifts were bequeathed to friends and family members. (*Los Angeles Times*, June 28, 1912)

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Historic Significance

The Louise Pratt House is historically significant as an intact example of a Craftsman residence with Swiss/Alpine Chalet design elements.

The architect of the residence has yet to be discovered. Since the Louise Pratt House was built in 1904 there is no extant permit. To date a search of *Builder and Contractor* for the relevant time period has been impossible as the microfilm at the Los Angeles Public Library for that time span has been damaged and awaits a decision on replacement. The *City of Los Angeles Historical and Cultural Resources Survey for North University Park, 1982-83* lists no architect or builder information for this residence. There is also no architect or builder notice in the *Los Angeles Times*. Further attempts will be made to uncover architect information.

Louise Pratt was historically significant as a well-known and well-regarded philanthropist and real estate investor/developer in Los Angeles and its environs prior to and after the turn of the 20th Century. She and her husband Edwin W. Pratt invested in real estate and after her divorce from him and following Edwin's subsequent death, Louise continued to invest and went on to develop several larger apartment buildings. Edwin was known as a prominent utility company officer who served as the confidence man for the Los Angeles Lighting Company and the Los Angeles Power Company, the providers of the first electric lighting in the City of Los Angeles.

When not traveling the world, Louise regularly entertained the elite of Los Angeles and raised funding and philanthropic awareness from her Swiss/Alpine Chalet Craftsman home at 2708 South Menlo Avenue in the North University Park district.

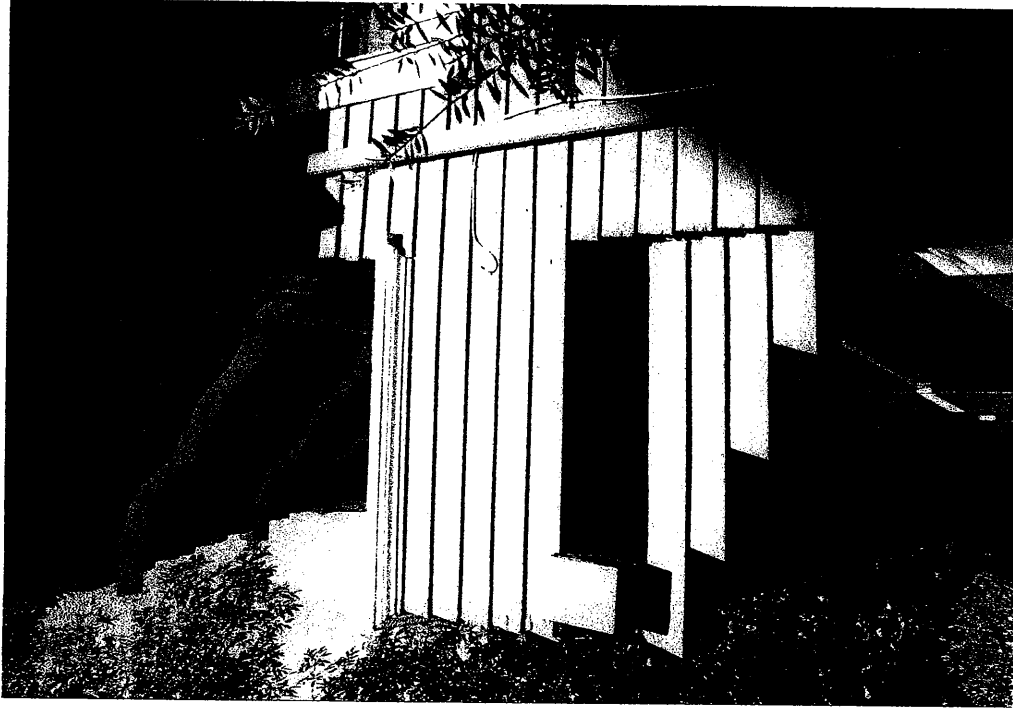

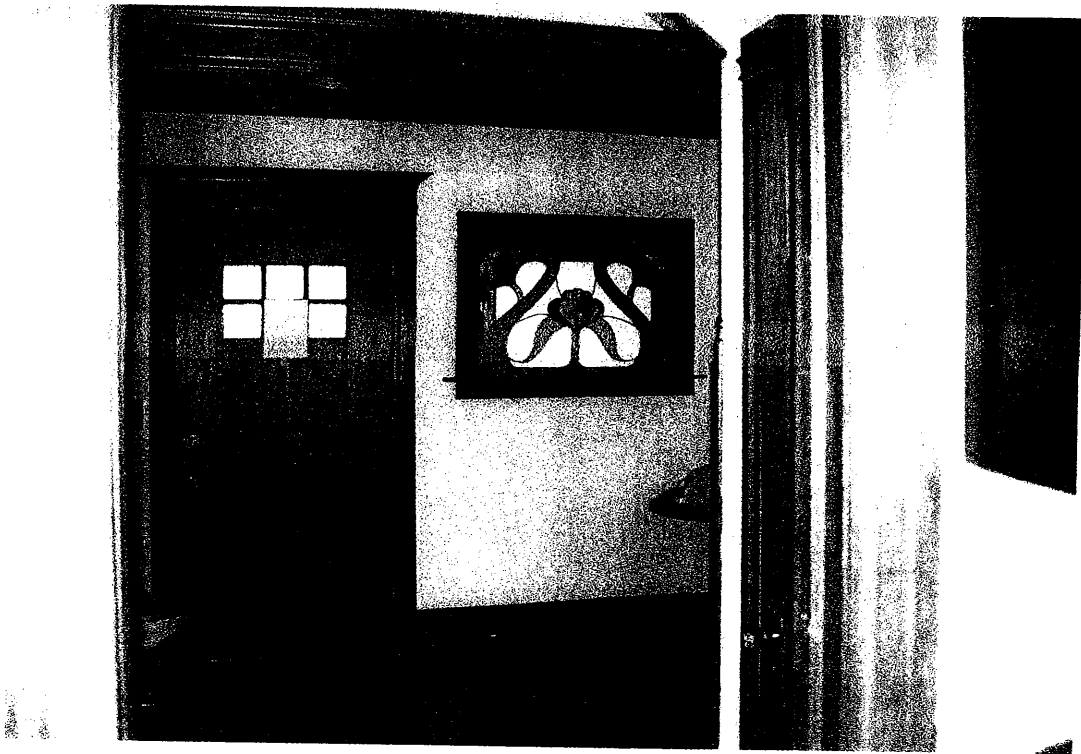

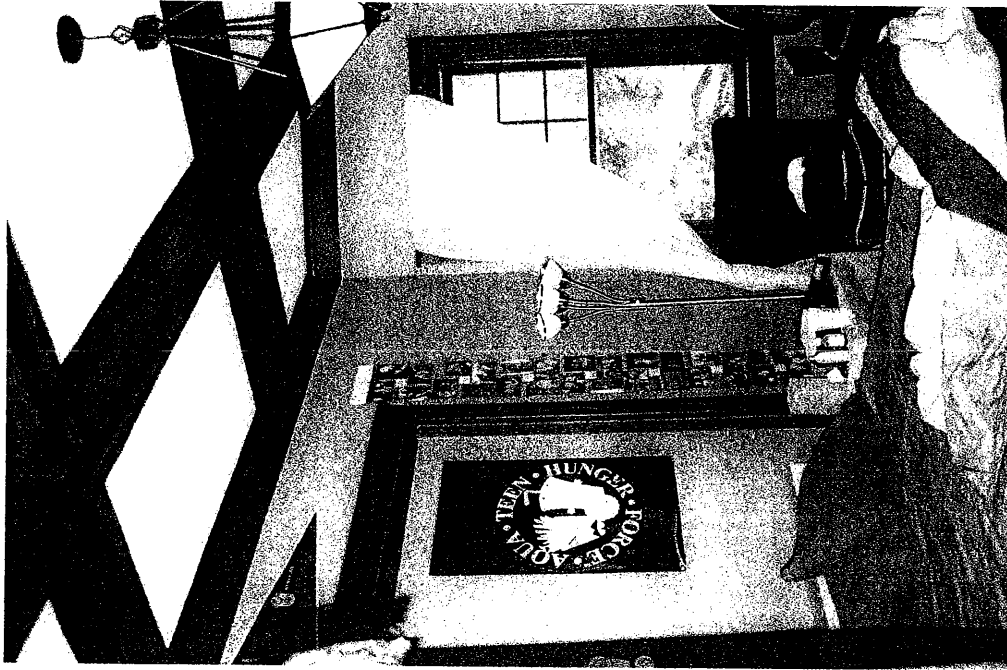

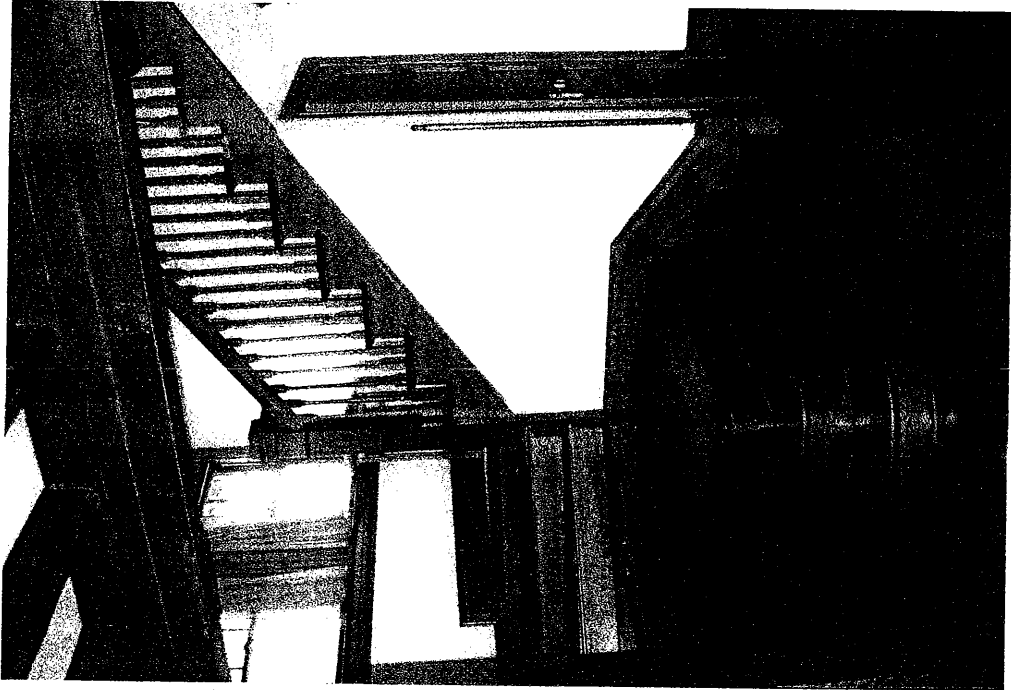


Dining room: Box beam ceiling, south slant bay, viewed to south.

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Entry with beamed ceiling and staircase, corner molding and door to under-stair closet, viewed to northeast.

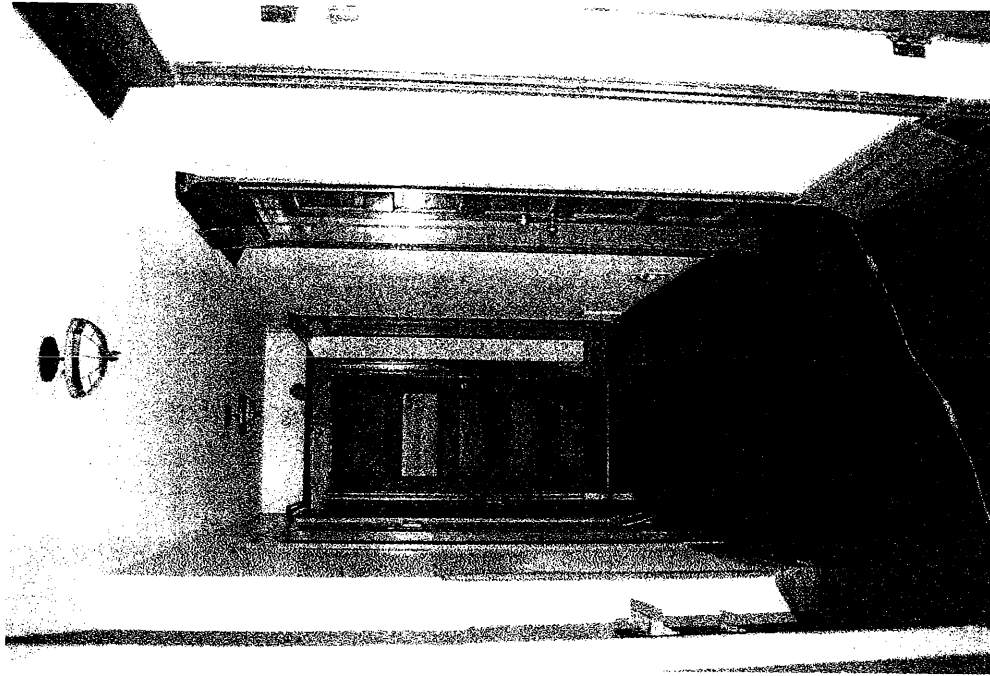


Parlor west wall slant bay: Viewed to west.

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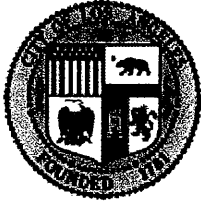
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Second level hallway: Viewed to east from point west of head of stairs.
