#### RECOMMENDED ACTIONS

1. That the Board of Police Commissioners (Board) REVIEW and APPROVE this report.

- 2. That the Board TRANSMIT the grant application for the 2012-2013 Anti-Human Trafficking Task Force Program, pursuant to Administrative Code Section 14.6(a), to the Mayor, Office of the City Administrative Officer (CAO), Office of the Chief Legislative Analyst, and to the City Clerk for Committee and City Council consideration.

#### DISCUSSION

The LAPD will receive \$200,000 in funding to enable the Los Angeles Metropolitan Task Force on Human Trafficking, under the leadership of the LAPD, to continue working collaboratively with the United States Attorney's Office, federal agencies, and victim and social service organizations. The task force aims to increase the identification of trafficking victims through proactive law enforcement tactics and cooperation, to increase the successful prosecution of traffickers through multi-jurisdictional law enforcement cooperation, to develop practical service protocols, to develop and provide training and support for law enforcement to proactively identify, rescue, and place victims with service providers, and to ensure victim safety and access to needed services.

The LAPD will allocate \$139,227 to pay for salaries, fringe benefits and overtime, \$773 for supplies and \$10,000 for training. As part of the grant requirements, a portion of the total funding will be provided for the purpose of funding a non-governmental organization that serves the victims of human trafficking to specifically address the needs of this special population. The LAPD will sub-award \$50,000 to the Coalition to Abolish Slavery and Trafficking (CAST), which is dedicated to providing human trafficking victims comprehensive long-term services through a three-armed empowerment approach that includes social services, legal services, and outreach and training.

#### III. Drug-Free Workplace Act of 1990 – (Recipient Handbook, Section 2152)

The applicant is required to obtain written authorization from the city council/governing board that the official executing this agreement is, in fact, authorized to do so. The applicant is also required to maintain said written authorization on file and readily available upon demand.

# SPECIAL CONDITIONS OF JAG PROJECTS METHAMPHETAMINE LABORATORY OPERATIONS

This special condition facilitates compliance with the provisions of the National Environmental Policy Act (NEPA) relating to clandestine methamphetamine laboratories, including the seizure and/or removal of clandestine methamphetamine laboratories [hereinafter, "meth lab operations"].

The United States Environmental Protection Agency (USEPA) has determined that, "law enforcement responsibilities terminate when the law enforcement official notifies the property

owner of record, the state, and the local environmental or public health agencies in writing of a possible site contamination at a clandestine lab."

Law enforcement personnel may seize as evidence and remove any bottles, cans, jugs and other containers, as well as contaminated apparatus and chemical samples from a clandestine drug site, however, law enforcement agencies are not responsible for the clean up/remediation of any rooms, buildings or surrounding environments, including septic systems, rivers, streams or contaminated soils.

- 3. Recipient will equip personnel, as determined by their specific duties, with OSHA required protective wear and other required safety equipment;
- 4. Recipient will notify the Department of Toxic Substances Control (DTSC), and send written notification to the property owner of record, and the local Environmental Management and/or Public Health Department whenever a clandestine methamphetamine laboratory is seized; and
- 5. Recipient will enter into a written agreement with the local Social Services Department to notify the local Social Services Department whenever a minor is found at a clandestine methamphetamine laboratory site, and, if determined to be necessary, require that qualified personnel be dispatched to the site and, if determined to be necessary:
  - (i) Respond to the minor's health needs that relate to methamphetamine toxicity;
  - (ii) Take the minor into protective custody unless the minor is criminally involved in the clandestine methamphetamine laboratory activities or is subject to arrest/detention for other criminal violations;
  - (iii) Arrange for medical testing for methamphetamine toxicity; and
  - (iv) Arrange for any follow-up medical tests, examinations, or health care made necessary as a result of methamphetamine toxicity.

  - (v) Respond to the minor's health needs that relate to methamphetamine toxicity;
  - (vi) Take the minor into protective custody unless the minor is criminally involved in the clandestine methamphetamine laboratory activities or is subject to arrest/detention for other criminal violations;
  - (vii) Arrange for medical testing for methamphetamine toxicity; and
  - (viii) Arrange for any follow-up medical tests, examinations, or health care made necessary as a result of methamphetamine toxicity.
- 6. Recipient will assign properly trained personnel to prepare a Hazard Assessment and Recognition Plan (HARP) for the clandestine methamphetamine laboratory site;
- Recipient or DTSC will utilize qualified disposal personnel to remove the chemicals, associated glassware, equipment, and contaminated materials and wastes from the clandestine methamphetamine laboratory site;
- 8. Recipient or DTSC will dispose of the chemicals, associated glassware, equipment, and contaminated materials and wastes at properly licensed disposal facilities or, when allowable, at properly licenses recycling facilities; and
- 9. Recipient or DTSC will monitor the records involving the transport, disposal and recy cling components of subparagraphs numbered 7 and 8 immediately above in order to ensure proper compliance.

All appropriate documentation must be maintained on file by the project and available for Cal EMA or public scrutiny upon request. Failure to comply with these requirements may result in suspension of payments under the grant or termination of the grant or both and the Recipient may be ineligible for award of any future grants if the Cal EMA determines that any of the following has occurred:

(1) the Recipient has made false certification, or (2) violates the certification by failing to carry out the requirements as noted above.

### **Budget Narrative**

Funding from the Anti-Human Trafficking Task Force Program will allow the LAMTF-HT to provide for the investigation of human trafficking incidents; promote the training of law enforcement officers and allow the LAMTF-HT to enter into a contractual services agreement with the CAST to provide identified victims of human trafficking with comprehensive services to reduce the number of victims that are re-traumatized and forced back into human trafficking situations. Also, funding will support activities to increase the number of human trafficking victims identified as "saved". The LAMTF-HT will provide training to other first responders, gatekeepers and community stakeholders. Through these efforts more victims will be referred and receive critical services, and the conviction rate for perpetrators will increase.

# Personnel

\$110,617 will be used to provide for Los Angeles Police Department (LAPD) sworn and civilian overtime. While on overtime, LAPD sworn personnel will coordinate task force operations to proactively investigate human trafficking elements that will allow the LAMTF-HT to realize an increase in the identification of trafficking victims. The Program Manager (civilian) will perform off-hour community awareness outreach and training.

Grant funding in the amount of \$28,610 will be used in this grant to reimburse the partial salary (30%) and fringe benefits of the LAMTF-HT Program Manager. The Program Manager coordinates and provides liaison for the program with all involved parties, especially the U.S. Attorney's Office, Central District of California. The Program Manager works under the direction of the Commanding Officer, Robbery Homicide Division, and is chiefly responsible for the day-to-day operations. Please note that the Program Manager's

duties will be dedicated 100% to the project, however, funding is only being requested at 30% for a one year period.

#### **Operating Expenses**

Operating expenses will be incurred throughout the grant period.

#### TRAVEL

Four project staff from the LAMTF-HT will attend at least two CalEMA sponsored training and/or conferences. The training locations and dates are TBD. The amount allocated for the participating agencies to expend is \$10,000.

#### CONSULTANT/CONTRACTS

The LAMTF-HT will sub-award an amount not to exceed \$50,000 or 25 percent to the Coalition to Abolish Slavery & Trafficking (CAST). The contractual agreement with CAST will satisfy a major objective of the project which is to provide comprehensive services to victims of human trafficking. Also, CAST has built a network of community partners who have sub-contracted with or provide pro bono services to CAST to provide the a wide variety of services that victims of trafficking require. Funds will be allocated as follows:

#### Personnel

\$28,313 will be used to reimburse the partial salary and fringe benefits of the CAST Emergency Response Coordinator. The Emergency Response Coordinator will work directly with law enforcement to coordinate the delivery of critical services for victims of human trafficking.

#### Program Expenses

\$15,891 will be used to reimburse project expenses associated with the CAST

Emergency Response Coordinator as follows emergency services, client expenses,
housing, program evaluation, data management, parking, mileage, and project supplies.

#### 7. PROGRAM DESCRIPTION

The purpose of the program is to increase the identification of trafficking victims through proactive law enforcement tactics and cooperation, to increase the successful prosecution of traffickers through multi-jurisdictional law enforcement cooperation, to develop practical service protocols, to develop and provide training and support for law enforcement to proactively identify, rescue, and place victims with service providers, and to ensure victim safety and access to needed services.

### 8. PROBLEM STATEMENT

Human trafficking means controlling a person though force, fraud or coercion - physical or psychological - to exploit the person for forced labor, sexual exploitation, or both. California is a top destination for traffickers with its extensive international border, major harbors and airports, powerful economy and accelerating population as well as its large immigrant population and its large manufacturing, agricultural and service sector industries make it a prime target for traffickers. Los Angeles is the largest city in the state of California. Los Angeles is the seat of Los Angeles County, the most populated and diverse with several ethnic enclaves, such as Chinatown, Filipino town, Korea town, and Thai Town which make it appealing to traffickers and allows its victims to blend into these enclaves, making it even more difficult to identify.

#### 9. OBJECTIVES

1) Increase the number of investigations initiated through proactive law enforcement (le); 2) Increase the identification of trafficking victims through proactive le tactics; 3) Increase the number of individuals arrested for human trafficking (HT) through le tactics; 4) Decrease the demand for human trafficking by arresting and educating HT offenders; 5) Develop and implement system to gather and disseminate HT information; 6) Develop a centralized data base; 7) Facilitate the development of service protocols and awareness through the development of training; 8) Measure the effectiveness of training; 9) Provide comprehensive services to HT victims to prevent them from returning to the HT lifestyle; 10) Collect and report data to be used in the reduction in the number of HT victims; 11) Increase the prosecution of individuals participating in the trafficking of humans; 12)Identify and create collaborative agreements.

#### 10. ACTIVITIES

1)Identify target locations to initiate investigations; 2) Meet monthly with service providers to receive trafficking victim referrals; 3)Meet quarterly with LAMTF-HT statistic committee to ensure relevant data regarding victim identification is received; 4) Task force will initiate human trafficking investigations from tips received from LAPD Vice Division and service providers; 5) Task force will conduct "trick" task force operations monthly to address the demand of human trafficking; 6) Track first-time offenders and require them to attend the LAPD John School; 7) Convene quarterly meeting with task force to collaborate on the development of a system to collect and disseminate information identifying the victims and offenders' communities and countries of origin; 8) Initiate contractual agreements with selected vendors to develop a centralized data collection system; 9) Program Manager will reach out monthly to other le and community organizations and provide training; 10) The USAO and LADA will jointly review cases to ensure offenders receive lengthy sentences; and 11) CAST will document types of services each victim receives.

### Project Narrative

#### I. Problem Statement

Human trafficking is a global problem and one that has been accelerated by the relative ease with which people can be transported around the world. Today's slavery is different from the days of old, when people were publicly bought and sold for forced labor. Today, the definition for human trafficking has expanded to mean controlling a person through force, fraud or coercion – physical or psychological – to exploit the person for forced labor, sexual exploitation, or both. The demand for exploitive labor and sex workers by some living in developed countries fuels the supply of vulnerable workers from poor countries. The surreptitious nature of human trafficking makes it extremely difficult to accurately track how many people are affected, however the U.S. government estimates that between 17,000 to 20,000 men, women, and children are trafficked into the United States each year.

California is a top destination for traffickers with its extensive international border, major harbors and airports, powerful economy and accelerating population.

California's large immigrant population and its large manufacturing, agricultural and service sector industries make it a prime target for traffickers. Los Angeles is the largest city in the state of California and the second largest in the United States. The City's estimated population of 3.8 million spans over 498.3 square miles in Southern California. Los Angeles is the seat of Los Angeles County, the most populated and one of the most diverse counties in the United States. Los Angeles' large immigrant community with several ethnic enclaves such as Chinatown, Filipinotown, Koreatown and Thaitown make it appealing to



traffickers and it allows their victims to blend in making them virtually invisible and even more difficult to identify.

The Trafficking Victims Protection Act (TVPA), enacted into law in October 2000 requires federal agencies to combat trafficking domestically and to work with other nations to address this problem internationally. According to the TVPA, victims are being subjected to two severe forms of trafficking, forced labor and sex trafficking. Forced labor involves the recruitment, harboring, transportation, provision, or obtaining of a person for labor or services through the use of force, fraud, or coercion for the purpose of subjection to involuntary servitude, peonage, debt bondage, or slavery. Sex trafficking occurs when a commercial sex act is induced by force, fraud, or coercion, or when the person induced to perform such an act has not attained 18 years of age.

Through Penal Code §236.1, local law enforcement agencies have been assigned investigative responsibility for human trafficking incidents. This new responsibility requires law enforcement officials to be properly trained in the identification of trafficked victims as well as how to assist victims to ensure they receive critical services. The Los Angeles Metropolitan Task Force on Human Trafficking (LAMTF-HT), under the leadership of the Los Angeles Police Department (LAPD), Robbery-Homicide Division (RHD), is a collaborative effort among members from law enforcement agencies, state and federal agencies, and non-profit organizations to work together to develop training protocols and outreach efforts to increase the awareness of human trafficking victims in the metropolitan Los Angeles area. The LAMTF-HT's mission is to improve tactics for identifying and rescuing trafficking victims, provide assistance to victims, and prosecute those responsible for human trafficking. A Memoranda of Understanding was entered into by the LAMTF-HT Leadership Team, comprised of the LAPD, the United States Attorney's Office (USAO), the Coalition to Abolish Slavery & Trafficking (CAST), and the Legal Aid Foundation of Los Angeles (LAFLA).

Since its inception, the LAMTF-HT has been instrumental in the development of the LAPD Roll Call Human Trafficking training video, lesson plan and training bulletin; and establishing a local 800 Trafficking Hotline for reporting human trafficking incidents and/or information regarding trafficked victims. Also, the LAMTF-HT Law Enforcement Committee comprised of representatives from the USAO, Los Angeles County District Attorney (LADA), LAPD, Los Angeles County Sheriff's Department (LASD), Federal Bureau of Investigations (FBI), Immigration and Customs Enforcement (ICE), Los Angeles County Department of Children and Family Services (DCFS) and Victim Assistance representatives from both FBI and ICE have developed protocols that address how law enforcement agencies will respond to human trafficking incidents, determine how potential trafficking cases will be prosecuted and ensure rescued victims receive critical services such as shelter, medical and mental health services, and legal assistance.

The LAMTF-HT law enforcement investigative personnel receive tips and/or leads from the LAPD local 800 trafficking hotline, the National Human Trafficking Hotline and the non-Governmental organizations (NGO) who conduct street outreach. Investigative personnel review the information and conduct surveillance to ascertain whether the elements of human trafficking are present

as basis of initiating an investigation. These investigations have focused on both aspects of human trafficking, forced labor and commercial sex. The main focus of each investigation is to first determine whether trafficking is present; second, to determine the number of victims as well as suspects involved; and lastly, to obtain evidence that will be instrumental in the prosecution of suspected traffickers.

In 2011, the National Human Trafficking Resource Center Hotline received 272 calls from Los Angeles, and a total of 401 calls from Los Angeles County. In contrast, there were 103 calls from San Diego, and 113 calls from San Francisco. Los Angeles County alone represented 21% of calls for the entire state. Of the state's 350 cases referencing trafficking, 268 involved adults and 82 involved minors. An assessment of human trafficking in the greater Los Angeles area found that commercial sex trafficking, followed by domestic servitude, and forced labor, was the most prevalent types of human trafficking activity. From January 1, 2010 to December 31, 2011, the Los Angeles Police Department (LAPD) conducted over 60 investigations of possible human trafficking incidents involving foreign national and domestic victims for both commercial sex and labor; rescuing 90 victims; and arresting 53 suspects. These arrests resulted in federal and state convictions with sentences ranging from three to twenty-five years. Several investigations also resulted in code violations for businesses not in compliance with City ordinances. The majority of victims identified through these investigations were U.S. citizens, minors as young as 11 years old, and victims of Commercial Sexual Exploitation of Children (CSEC). Our experience informs us that there is also a large population of minor victims trafficked in forced labor, including agricultural work, door-to-door sales, begging scams and domestic



servitude. According to the HHS, "very few programs are identifying cases of domestic minor labor trafficking." In 2011, the Coalition to Abolish Slavery and Trafficking (CAST) served 33 trafficking survivors enrolled in the per capita program, for a total of 246 Los Angeles-area victims enrolled since 2006. CAST has served 550 victims of trafficking and secured more T-visas than any other agency in the U.S.

A number of factors have hampered the ability of local law enforcement to identify victims and assist in the apprehension and prosecution of perpetrators. These factors include the lack of proper training for the officer on the street, the lack of public awareness of the magnitude of the problem, understanding the complex and wide range of immigration and legal issues. In addition, local law enforcement lacks the education of the social services available for trafficking victims. Of particular concern is the need to utilize proactive law enforcement tactics to interdict those situations in which there is forced prostitution, indentured servitude, peonage or other forms of forced labor.

The LAMTF-HT faces several issues in combating human trafficking, such as the lack of hard and fast baseline data on the scope of the problem and to what degree it is increasing, the difficulty in tracing the genesis of the crime, disagreement over definitions, the lack of victim identification, distrust of law enforcement and the victims' fear of retaliation.

Funding from the Anti-Human Trafficking Task Force Recovery Act Program will provide the LAMTF-HT an opportunity to further their efforts to combat human trafficking. It will assist in providing continued collaboration with Federal and

other law enforcement agencies on potential trafficking incidents, improve the law enforcement response to all elements of human trafficking, and enhance coordination among partner agencies to ensure that a comprehensive continuum of care is provided to the victims of human trafficking. Additional funding will allow the LAMTF-HT to provide training to law enforcement officials to ensure they understand the complexity of human trafficking and the critical needs of trafficked victims. Training will be provided to other gatekeepers to ensure they understand human trafficking, how victims are trafficked, and how to identify trafficking victims. Lastly, the proposed project will allow the LAMTF-HT to continue to develop outreach strategies that can be executed in an effort to raise the awareness of trafficking and its victims.

#### 11. Plan

The overarching goals of this program are to increase the identification and rescue of victims of human trafficking through proactive law enforcement tactics, the successful prosecution of traffickers through multi-jurisdictional law enforcement cooperation and to ensure victim safety and access to critical services. The LAMTF-HT has established the following program goals, objectives, and activities to be accomplished over the one-year grant performance period.

#### Law Enforcement Component

Goal (1): To increase the number of investigations initiated.

#### Activities:

- Program Manager will meet quarterly with service providers to discuss and identify trafficking victim referrals, coordination and linkage.
- LAMTF-HT Law Enforcement Committee will meet quarterly to discuss ongoing task force operations and human trafficking investigations.

#### Activities:

- The LAMTF-HT will continue to meet quarterly to discuss on-going investigations and new leads.
- The LAMTF-HT will initiate human trafficking investigations from tips or leads received from the LAPD human trafficking hotline, the National Human Trafficking Hotline, and service providers.
- The LAMTF-HT will conduct surveillance as needed to make arrests based on information received from law enforcement and service providers.

#### Performance Measure:

 An increase in the number of human trafficking arrests by the end of the reporting period.

Goal (4): To decrease the demand for human trafficking.

Objective (1): Decrease the demand for human trafficking by focusing on identifying, arresting and educating human trafficking offenders.

#### Activities:

- LAMTF-HT will conduct "trick" task force operations monthly to address the demand of human trafficking.
- Identify target human trafficking locations for task force operations.
- Initiate investigations at target locations and identify offenders.
- Track first-time offenders and require them to attend the LAPD John School for training.

#### Performance Measure:

Total number of "operations" conducted to impact demand for human trafficking by the end of the reporting period.

Goal (5): To decrease the number of victims of human trafficking transported into California.

#### **Training Component**

Goal (1): To facilitate the development of service protocols and to increase awareness of human trafficking by developing and implementing training that will lead to the identification of more victims and the conviction of individuals and organizations engaged in human trafficking.

Objective (1): Facilitate the development of service protocols and increase awareness of human trafficking by developing and implementing training that will



lead to the identification of more victims and the conviction of individuals and human trafficking organizations engaged in human trafficking through activities related to training, public awareness and coalition building.

#### Activities:

- The LAMTF-HT Law Enforcement committee will continue meeting quarterly to discuss and develop protocols and address the handling of human trafficking situations.
- The Program Manager will reach out quarterly to other local law enforcement agencies and the community to schedule training on human trafficking.
- The Program Manager will conduct training sessions quarterly to increase awareness of human trafficking.

#### Performance Measure:

An increase in the number of individuals who receive training by the end of the reporting period.

Objective (2): Measure the effectiveness of the training provided.

#### Activities:

- Attendees of training will complete a short survey on the course content.
- Track the number of leads received from entities or community organizations receiving the training

### Non-Governmental Organization Component

Goal (1): To reduce the number of human trafficking victims that return to the human trafficking lifestyle.

Objective (1): Provide comprehensive services to human trafficking victims to prevent them from returning to the human trafficking lifestyle.

#### Activities:

- Respond to breaking cases referred from the LA Metro Task Force.
- Coordinate emergency service provision for newly identified victims of human trafficking, including safety planning, temporary/emergency housing and basic needs.
- Coordinate legal services for immigration relief and other legal needs.
- Coordinate long-term social services to progress survivors through CAST pipeline so clients obtain self-sufficiency. Client pipeline includes: Tier 1 Intensive Case Management, Tier 2 Information and Assistance, Tier 3 Information and Refer, and Graduation from CAST program.
- Conduct quarterly assessments using CAST's Client Outcome Tracking Matrix, which tracks clients' growth from crisis to thriving states.

#### Performance Measure:

Graduate 20% of active clients from Tier 1: Intensive Case Management to Tier 2: Information and Assistance.

- Graduate 10% of active clients from Tier 2: Information and Assistance to Tier 3: Information and Referral.
- Graduate 10% of active clients from CAST social services program once self-sufficiency is attained.

Objective (2): Collect and report data to be utilized in the reduction of the number of human trafficking victims.

#### Activities:

- Document the number of victims served with supporting data to include sex, trafficking type, Country of origin and units of service rendered.
- Track client progression through CAST pipeline: Tier 1 Intensive Case Management, Tier 2 Information and Assistance, Tier 3 Information and Refer, Graduation from CAST program.
- Collect and compile victim data for quarterly reporting.
- Based on data collected, evaluate and update existing departmental policies and procedures - Client Services Manual, Emergency Response Manual, and Shelter Manual – to better serve human trafficking survivors.

#### Performance Measure

Identify and evaluate trends to better serve victims of human trafficking.

# Prosecution Component

Goal (1): To decrease the number of individuals and organizations participating in the trafficking of humans.

Objective (1): Increase the prosecution of individuals and organization participating in the trafficking of humans.

# Activities:

- The USAO and LADA will collaborate on trafficking cases.
- The LAMTF-HT will continue to collaborate with the LADA to increase the number of offenders prosecuted under Penal Code 236.1.
- The USAO and the LADA will jointly review cases to determine how to proceed to ensure offenders receive lengthy sentences.

### Performance Measure:

An increase in the number of human traffickers accepted for both Federal and State prosecution.

# **Protocol Component:**

Goal (1): To increase the number of collaborative agreements entered into between the task force and other entities in order to increase cooperation and the effectiveness of the Anti-Human Trafficking Task Force Recovery Act Program.

Objective (1): Identify and create collaborative agreements between other entities.

### Activities:

Reach out to at least 2 NGOs or other entities for the purpose of initiating collaborative agreements.

#### Performance Measure:

Increase the number of collaborative agreements entered into between the task force and other entities

The Captain of RHD will act as the Project Director for this program. In this capacity, the Captain will be involved in setting policy for the Department and serve as the management liaison with the USAO. Also, from a law enforcement point of view, specific identification and investigative strategies that are consistent with an overall community policing strategy will be followed and monitored by the both the RHD Captain and Lieutenant II overseeing the project. The Captain will provide leadership and direction and will continue as the LAMTF-HT Co-Chair. In this capacity, the Captain will ensure all task force investigations are shared with the Task Force Leadership Team, work closely with the USAO and the LADA to ensure suspected traffickers are prosecuted at the highest level.


The RHD Lieutenant II will be chiefly responsible for the day-to-day operations of task force investigative personnel and monitor the effectiveness of the task force investigations, ensuring that task force participants follow applicable community policing strategies. Also, the RHD Lieutenant II will oversee the development of protocols for task force operations and investigations of trafficking victims, and serve as the sworn liaison for the Department.



The Program Manager works under the direction of the RHD Captain and is responsible for ensuring grant compliance and accomplishing the established goals and objectives of the grant. The Program Manager is essential to the project since this position facilitates all task force meetings, as well as actively participates on all sub-committees. The Program Manager gathers all data for inclusion into the Human Trafficking Reporting System and prepares semi-annual progress reports. Also, the Program Manager maintains records of all meetings, investigations conducted by LAMTF-HT and tracks all expenditures related to grant funds. Lastly, the Program Manager conducts training sessions, as well as awareness presentations regarding human trafficking.

#### 111. Implementation

The LAMTF-HT is a multi-agency consortium created to address the complex problem of human trafficking in the greater Los Angeles metropolitan area. The partnerships are comprised of federal, state, and local law enforcement agencies, as well as prosecution agencies working collaboratively with victim and social service organizations in the identification of trafficked victims and the conviction of persons engaged in severe forms of human trafficking. The LAMTF-HT has held regular meetings since April 2004. Progress has been made in bridging the gaps and addressing issues and concerns with respect to providing training to first responders and gatekeepers. The Program Manager has reached out and provided training to first responders, building and housing inspectors, animal control officers, residential licensing personnel, neighborhood councils and other organizations that have an interest in understanding human trafficking and its victims.





The LAPD, USAO, CAST, and the LAFLA entered into a Memorandum of Understanding (MOU) that outlines the effort to combat human trafficking. These organizations have agreed to collaborate with the LAPD to train officers to identify trafficking victims, to engage in proactive law enforcement leading to the conviction of individuals engaged in severe forms of trafficking, and to refer victims to needed services. The MOU formalizing the LAMTF-HT contains the purpose, mission, roles and responsibilities of the task force, and has been executed by all parties.

The LAPD will be the lead organization for purposes of grant administration and project coordination. The Task Force Leadership Team will provide direction and help steer the course for the overall effort. Meetings are expected to be held on a quarterly basis and will be managed by the LAPD's Human Trafficking Program Manager.

To become a member of the LAMTF-HT, a letter on the concerned organization's letterhead requesting membership is required. As required by the solicitation the LAMTF-HT will enter into an Operational Agreement with the CAST (to be signed and executed at a later date), to provide comprehensive services to victims of human trafficking that have been identified through investigations or referrals.

The LAMTF-HT Law Enforcement Committee has drafted a formal Response Protocol that addresses how human trafficking incidents will be handled by the various law enforcement agencies working collectively on the LAMTF-HT. The Protocol clearly defines and identifies each organization's responsibility handling

the human trafficking incident. The protocol delineates how participating agencies will assume investigative control of the initial scene, how to identify potential victims and suspects, how to coordinate with victim service providers to ensure rescued victims receive critical services, and how to work with respective prosecution agencies to determine how the trafficking cases will be prosecuted.

The Trafficking Victims Protection Reauthorization Act of 2008 provides guidance with the reporting of minor victims of trafficking. Protocols developed will be incorporated in the guidelines to ensure the LAMTF-HT is compliant with established Department of Health and Human Services protocols for victims of trafficking.

The LAMTF-HT recognizes that survivors of human trafficking are a very unique population. They tend to speak little English, have no money, and no legal status. They have little knowledge of their basic legal rights, and experience a variety of critical, long-term needs due to the physical and mental health problems that stem from long-term neglect and abuse during their enslavement. For these reasons, it is imperative that victims receive the critical services needed to assist them in rebuilding their lives. The LAMTF-HT will sub-award a portion of the grant funding, not to exceed \$50,000 or 25 percent, to CAST, a non-governmental organization.

CAST is a multi-ethnic, multi-lingual human rights organization that has been nationally and internationally recognized for its dedication to the identification of victims, mobilization of all sectors of the community to identify and advocate against trafficking, and provision of direct services for victims. CAST provides comprehensive long-term services through a three-armed empowerment

approach which includes Social Services, Legal Services, and Outreach and Training. The organization also operates the first shelter in the nation dedicated to serving victims of trafficking. CAST's mission is to assist persons trafficked for the purpose of forced labor and slavery-like practices and to work toward ending all instances of such human rights violations. CAST will provide an Emergency Response Coordinator who will coordinate the delivery of critical services for victims of human trafficking such as case management, shelter/housing, medical/mental health, food, basic necessities and interpretation services.



# OPERATIONAL AGREEMENT BETWEEN THE CITY OF LOS ANGELES POLICE DEPARTMENT (LAPD) AND

# THE COALITION TO ABOLISH SLAVERY & TRAFFICKING (CAST) FOR

# THE LOS ANGELES METROPOLITAN TASK FORCE ON HUMAN TRAFFICKING

This Operational Agreement is entered into between the City of Los Angeles Police Department (LAPD) and the Coalition to Abolish Slavery & Trafficking (CAST). This agreement outlines a cooperative effort to combat human trafficking.

# I. Purpose of Agreement

This agreement establishes and delineates the mission of the Los Angeles Metropolitan Task Force on Human Trafficking (Task Force) in addressing the complex problem of human trafficking in the greater Los Angeles Metropolitan Area, which includes the City and County of Los Angeles; the respective duties of the LAPD and CAST; and the transfer of grant funds to CAST as a sub-recipient of the 2012 Cal EMA Anti-Human Trafficking Task Force Program.

#### II. Mission of the Task Force

The mission of this task force is to increase the identification of trafficking victims through proactive law enforcement tactics, to increase the successful prosecution of traffickers through multi-jurisdictional law enforcement cooperation, to develop a practical service protocol, to develop and provide training and support for law enforcement to proactively identify, rescue, and place victims with service providers, and to ensure victim safety and access to needed services. Other members of the task force include the United States Attorney's Office (USAO) and the Legal Aid Foundation of Los Angeles (LAFLA).

#### III. Composition of the Task Force

#### A. Participation

The Task Force will consist of sworn and non-sworn employees of participating law enforcement agencies. Included among the participants are detectives, officers and civilian staff members of the participating agencies.

### B. Direction of Task Force

Responsibility for the overall policy and direction of the Task Force shall rest with the USAO and the LAPD. The LAPD Robbery-Homicide Division will provide a staff member to serve as Program Manager. The Program Manager will coordinate with the USAO and the LAPD on matters of mutual concern relating to policy and direction of the program.

## C. Supervision of Task Force

Day-to-day supervision of Task Force activities by its members at participating agencies is the responsibility of the respective agency heads or their designees.

#### D. Personnel

Decisions to dedicate and control personnel assigned to the Task Force shall remain with the participating agency heads or their designees, who will be kept fully apprised of all investigative developments by respective subordinates.

## E. Adding Participating Agencies

Proposals to add new participating agencies to the Task Force may be made at any time by written notification to the Program Manager of the Task Force. Consideration of this matter will be included on the agenda for the next regularly scheduled Task Force meeting.

# IV. Operation of Enhanced Crisis Response/Task Force

# A. LAPD Responsibilities

As a collaborative partner in the Task Force, the LAPD will:

- 1. Continue to provide a staff member to act as Program Manager, under the direction of the Commanding Officer, Robbery-Homicide Division. The percentage of dedicated time will be contingent upon the grant award amount LAPD receives for this program.
- 2. Assist the Task Force to develop and implement a training program, written protocols, and resource material to enhance the information/resource sharing among law enforcement and other service providers to identify and assist human trafficking victims.
- 3. Conduct an outreach strategy that will increase the public awareness of human trafficking as well as address how this crime can be eradicated.
- 4. Collaborate with federal law enforcement agencies and service providers in the identification and rescue of human victims and provide enhanced enforcement efforts (e.g. investigation, surveillance, search warrant service, and collaborating with other law enforcement agencies) in those communities and provide comprehensive services to victims.
- 5. Collect and report data that measures the Task Force results as required under this grant award. These reports shall include but not be limited to semi-annual progress reports, the final progress report, and financial reports.

# B. Coalition to Abolish Slavery and Trafficking (CAST) Responsibilities:

As a collaborative partner in the Task Force, the CAST will:

- 1. Provide comprehensive services to victims, such as shelter, food, medical and mental health care, legal services, ESL training and employment.
- Collaborate with participating agencies, as well as other local and federal governmental agencies and non-governmental agencies, working to prosecute criminal cases against traffickers and/or provide other victim services.
- 3. Provide practical training to participating agencies, and other government and non-governmental organizations that may come into contact with trafficked persons.
- 4. Conduct an inclusive strategy that both increases the public awareness of human trafficking and also promotes the dignity and freedom of trafficked persons through community outreach and media advocacy.
- 5. Provide interpreters for non-English speaking clients, including but not limited to Spanish and Asian/Pacific Islander languages.
- 6. Respond to requests for information for data relevant to program goals and results from participating agencies as determined by the City of Los Angeles.

## V. Transfer of Grant Funds

As compensation for services provided under this agreement, CAST will be reimbursed an amount not to exceed \$50,000 to fund an Emergency Response Coordinator. These funds are derived from the grant specified in this agreement and awarded to the City of Los Angeles as the grant recipient. CAST will submit reimbursement requests including supporting documentation (e.g. payroll sheets, invoices, etc.) at the end of each quarter (i.e. January-March, April-June, July-September, October-December).

#### VI. Non-Responsibility

Individual agency members of the Task Force will not be responsible or liable for acts performed by personnel of other member agencies or other government or non-governmental agencies in furtherance of or in relation to Task Force objectives or activities during the duration of this agreement. Each individual agency member of the task force agrees that it retains responsibility for the actions of its personnel in connection with Task Force activities.

#### VII. Duration

# Operational Agreement Los Angeles Metropolitan Task Force on Human Trafficking

The term of this agreement is October 1, 2012 through September 30, 2013, but may last beyond these dates at the sole discretion of the City of Los Angeles contingent on the availability of funds for the Task Force. This agreement will enter into effect on the date of the last signature of the agency officials authorized to bind the agencies.

This agreement may be modified at any time by written consent of all involved agencies. Modifications to this agreement shall have no effect unless such modifications are in writing and signed by an authorized representative of the parties hereto.

Any participating agency may withdraw from the Task Force as any time by written notification to the Program Manager of the Task Force. Any such withdrawal shall be effective 30 days after delivery of written notification of withdrawal to the Program Manager.

We, the undersigned, have read and agree with this agreement. We are committed to work together to achieve the stated objectives of the proposed project.



- · Notify USCIS, at the time of booking, when a suspected alien is arrested, and
- · Notify USCIS within 30 days of a felony or deportable misdemeanor conviction of an alien.

Noncompliance with the above mandate may result in the following:

- Temporary withholding of cash payments to the project pending corrections or more severe enforcement action by the California Emergency Management Agency;
- · Disallowance of use of funds for all or part of the cost of the project;
- Suspension or termination of the current award for the recipient's program;
- · Withholding further awards to California's Anti-Drug Abuse Enforcement Program; or
- Other legal remedies
