
Archived History of Rose Hills



This letter is being prepared to indicate that LA-32 Neighborhood Council is in support of a request for additional community signs within our Boundaries. There have been many community discussions and ample opportunities to provide engaged dialogue regarding the request for "Community Signs", including that of the Land Use Committee.

During a Regular General Board Meeting held in April 2011, our Neighborhood Council voted in the Affirmative to adopt the Land Use Committee's recommendations. It was noted that University Hills and Hillside Village each have five displayed signs. A Motion was introduced to replace and provide for additional signage in 90032, including one with the community of 'El Sereno', to be placed on Eastern, north of Valley. Three 'Rose Hills' signs would be requested by Council Member Huizar and two 'Rose Hills' signs are requested by Council Member Reyes.

The request to retain community Identity started over six years ago, and has grown into the "Blooming Beauty" that will be secured for generations to come. Rose Hills traces its origins to over 7,000 years with the reference to the flower of grace and resilience, the ROSE.

The community of Rose Hills has gained support from the Lincoln Heights Neighborhood Council as well as the Arroyo Seco Neighborhood Council, providing for additional discussion and fact finding. Many local communities have promoted their historical roots to the era of Spain/Mexico calling this area 'Rancho Rosa de Castilla'. Rose Hills is proud to have the unique distinction of such an historic past and wishes to preserve and promote in the future.

With this letter, along with countless archives validating its historic reference for millenniums, and the signatures of hundreds of residents showing support, and support from three Neighborhood Councils, we ask that we gain City Council support as well.

VII. ACTION ITEMS -- Funding Requests.

1. Jerry Schneider gave a PowerPoint presentation and offered the following revised motion, to read as follows:

SIGNAGE PROJECT \$3,000 - Motion that ASNC provide funding in the amount of \$3,000 for a Way Finding Signage Project. Funding is contingent upon the project being funded by additional partners for an amount of additional funding of not less than \$7,500. This project has been under discussion for the last two months in the ASNC Environment Committee, and the committee recommends the project. The project will provide directional way finding signage to assist pedestrians find their way to various cultural, historical, and recreational destinations (such as Audubon Center, Debs Park, Heritage Square, and Lummis Home) from the Metro Rail Gold Line Southwest Museum Station.

After discussion, the Board adopted the motion, after further amending it as follows:

The Environmental Committee will come back to the Board with a detailed proposal showing the number and location of the signs after full funding is secured.

- The motion to approve the allocation of \$2000 in community project funds to the non-profit organization, Northeast Trees, to water 20 trees for one year at locations on Figueroa Ave from 3900 to 4978 Figueroa (which borders the HHPNC) was unanimously approved with one abstention.
- The Treasurer announced that an attempt was being made to resolve the Avenue 50 Security Camera issue by treating the Board's previous appropriation as a Neighborhood Purposes Grant.

VIII.ACTION ITEMS - Non-Funding Requests.

1 710 FREEWAY DISCUSSION

a) After discussion, on motion duly made and seconded, the Statement (see attached) was amended as follows:

Last sentence in first paragraph to be changed from: "The ASNC is opposed to <u>any form</u> of an extension to the 710 Freeway through the ASNC area that will result in" to "The ASNC is opposed to <u>any form</u> of an extension to the 710 Freeway through the ASNC area if it will result in:" (Changes are highlighed)

and approved by a vote of 11 in favor, 1 against, and 1 abstention. The statement is to be sent to relevant elected and appointed officials identified by the Board's 710 working group.

b) A motion was adopted that the ASNC shall file the following Community Impact Statement in support of L.A. City Council File #09-0002-s189 (Garcetti/Huizar/ Reyes, submitted Sept. 30, 2009), a resolution whereby the City would oppose any extension of the 710 Freeway via tunnel through Zones 1 and 2, while calling for any portal opening for such a tunnel in Zone 3 to be south of Valley Blvd. (Zones as defined by the Caltrans/MTA SR-710 Tunnel Technical Study):

"The Arroyo Seco Neighborhood Council supports this action insofar as the resolution opposes as impractical and costly any completion of the 710 Freeway underneath our ASNC communities, contained almost completely in Caltrans "Zones 1 and 2." As good neighbors in the City NC system, ASNC defers to the LA32 Council, representing El Sereno, regarding any construction there. Within Los Angeles City, LA32's area would bear the major portion of any potential negative effects from a possible tunnel extension through "Zone 3."

- By motion duly made and adopted, the ASNC Board indicated that it has no objection to the placement of a "Rose Hills" community sign on Monterey Road adjacent to (but not within) the ASNC's boundaries.
- The motion to amend the Standing Rules or Bylaws (as determined by Rules and Elections Committee) so as to enable the President to take part in board votes has been deferred to the next meeting of the Board. Tom Marble agreed to research Robert Rules of Order to ascertain whether a Bylaws amendment will be required.
- The proposal by Roy Payan of the Montecito Heights Improvement Association, for the ASNC to sponsor a food drive for needy families in all ASNC communities was tabled to the next meeting of the Board.
- 5. After discussion, on motion duly made and seconded, the Board unanimously approved the resolution:

Whereas, the November 8th public comment deadline only provides 42 days for consideration and input to the draft LA Bike Master Plan, thereby severely limiting neighborhood council participation,






THE FIRST MAP OF SOUTHERN CALIFORNIA


This old map, drawn in the ancient records of the San Gabriel Mission to es-tablish the proper boundaries for Mission lands, is probably the first ever drawn of Southern Californic by anyone residing here. It shows the architecture of each building. The following is the translation of the handwriting appearing at the bottom of the map; and after it is a translation of the words scattered over the map, as indexed by number in red:

map, as indexed by number in red: That you may clearly and distinctly understand what San Gabriel is and will be, we eliminate words and make a graphic presentation of the facts. First, Rosa Castilla is claimed by Los Angeles. The Old Mission (Mislon Vieja) yields nothing. At Los Nietos, only Tomas Colima remains and even he himself says this is the last year he is going to pay, as he is going to sell to the Americans. Neither Coyotes (ranch) nor Don Plo (Pico's ranch) produce even a pin. Should R. P. Amable be contented with the upper ranches, including the D. B. Yorba's ranch, this is all that might in good earnest be separated from San Gabriel, and this I do not say for my own sake, but for other peoples' sake, as God knows. And if he wants it so and the same is granted to him, even including the Don Ricardo Dejar (ranch) and the Ibarras (ranch.) And should you also take Ean Juan, the Yorbas and the Ibarras (ranch.) Ust Compute what would remain for any San Ga-briel padre. Just the La Puenta where Americans live and the new American pueblo.



LICNS NOT AGREEABLE NEIGHBORS

Rose Hill People Will Put Up With Most Everything but King of Beasts

The people of Rose Hill want it distinctly understood that they do not object to ordinary city noises, such as automobiles, street cars, steam trains and even the mooing of cows and the occasional crowing of roosters, but in a petition filed at the City Hall yesterday they utter a most raucous protest against a flock of lions which has been planted in their midst. [The

etition declared that, "said lions oy their roaring day and night constitute a public nuisance," and they asked the City Council to please stop the lions from roaring or remove the animals from Rose Hill.

The lions, the petition declared, are located at 401 Mission Road, and are presumably there for motion-picture purposes, to be rented out when one of Douglas Fairbanks's or Gloria Swanson's films require some roaring lions. The Rose Hill people say that roaring lions may be excellent for motion pictures, but as neighbors the animals are most obnoxious.

The petition was signed by E. H. Strong and other property owners in the vicinity of Superior Court on North Broadway and Huntington Drive, and also by the Rose Hill Civic Improvement League.



 - 9. In the event the appointed Chairperson cannot, or fails to schedule a meeting, the Alternate Chairperson may call a meeting of all available committee members.
 - 10. Committees shall produce and submit written Quarter Reports to the board at General Board meetings every three months
 - 11. A simple majority vote will decide all issues and recommendations to the General Board.
 - 12. Committees will consider matters forwarded to the committee by the LA-32 President
 - 13. Committees shall meet no later than the third week following General Board meetings."



This portfolio is a work in progress with far more facts to be found, with ample dedication and constant research, to seek and find what is archived over the centuries. This document is part of my discoveries with efforts to share the truth and provide the material that proves the prominence of the community of Rose Hills. Much of the information provided in this document has been researched and provided by the Los Angeles Public Library, College Archives, State Documents, United States Congress, Museum Facts, Newspaper Clippings, Court Records, Historic Maps, Mission Reports, and other documented reports found on the internet and of local studies.

The dedication for the preparation of this document started over six years ago with the sole desire to find out the historic value of the community of Rose Hills. I was led to believe what many others have expressed about the community in which I live in, and the misperception of the true history of the North East area of Los Angeles. Realizing that I was being misinformed, I decided that I would go on a quest to find out for myself, what the truth is about Rose Hills. For years, it has been claimed that Rose Hills was a part of El Sereno, Lincoln Heights, or Montecito Heights and that Rose Hills was not actually a community. Growing up in this community and being the fourth generation in the same home has given me a unique sense of home awareness and the truth.

My first real sense of discovery was found at the local Library when references showed the community of Rose Hills alongside that of Bairdstown in 1912. It sparked interest in me, that Rose Hills is an old historic community, leading to remarkable findings that will change the outlook of the Historic Community of Rose Hills. With very little knowledge of the historical accounts of the community, my search for facts guided me in many directions. You will find a detailed review of the work that has been uncovered and specific relations of the how the community was named and the prominence it has retained in the Los Angeles region.

Rose Hills is the English version of the same lands that have been here for millions of years. The name of the community, as it was called a century and a half ago, is in Spanish with the very same reference to the *Rose*. The Spanish name was '*Rancho Rosa de Castilla*', and many facts will be shared here with direct connection of the area indicated as *Rose Hills* and the "*Ranch*". Before the '*Ranch*' was actually named and owned by individuals, the area was known for the small river called the '*Arroyo Rosa de Castilla*' with its abundant roses that grew naturally along the banks of the stream. Before any mention of the area in Spanish was claimed, the Native Indians also referred to the *Rose* in naming this location in current day Los Angeles. The TONGVA Indians called these lands "*OTSUNGNA*", which in their native tongue means the '*Place of Roses*'. No matter what language you speak, the relative feature that remains is the connection to the *Rose*, the community of *Rose Hills* has the distinctive privilege of still carrying the name that has been recognized for thousands of years. Enjoy this small venture into the past and realize the importance of retaining the name that has been carried for centuries on end. Discover the beautiful facts of this community and the richness it holds in Los Angeles; discover the *Historic Community of Rose Hills*.

Pre-Historic Time Period

Our planet has continued to evolve for millions of years; the Los Angeles Basin contains fossils from one of the World's most famous localities, the La Brea Tar Pits, which holds natural collections from the Ice Age Period. It also contains the only human found in the Pits dating back over 7,000 years, that of a female Tongva Indian, indicating that civilization and humanity roamed the areas of current Los Angeles. (Credits to 'A Brief History of the Tongva Tribe' by Rosanne Welch - Claremont University 2006) The Tongva Indians have also been referred to as the Gabrielino Indians with relation to the San Gabriel Mission. This thriving Tribe will indicate that they have lived on the lands since the beginning of time, history verifies between 5,000 – 8,000 years in the area as a forming society following the hunted game westward in an organized manner. The entire Tribe was a collection of many little Villages encompassing an area from around Magic Mountain on the north, down to Disney Land on the South. The Pacific Ocean and its many Islands along the coast also played a vital role to the Tongva Indians, out to San Bernardino on the east.

Early Native Villages

Each of the villages had its own name and identified the name with a more specific reference to its location. Some of the Village names still hold a strong relation to the original Tongva Language for over 1,000 years. Some of the names that you hear today, such as; Topanga, Tujunga, Rancho Cucamonga, and Cahuenga, hold the exact name with a slightly different spelling. The names of other villages in our local area included Sibingna, Yaangna, and Otsungna. Yaangna describes the area closest to current day 'Placita Olvera' in Downtown. Sibingna describes the area closest to the current San Gabriel Mission. Otsungna was the name of the only village covering the hills and streams of the area between the two previously mentioned sites. OTSUNGNA means "Place of Roses" in the native language and referenced by the abundant amount of beautiful natural roses growing in the area. (Submitted as Figure 4) These roses have been on the lands for centuries before any explorations moved through the Los Angeles basin, later described as '*Rosa de Castilla*'. Maps and other resources have indicated that OTSUNGNA was the prominent Village of the entire Tribe.

By its location in the hills and with the many local streams that once saturated these lands, OTSUNGNA proved itself to be a viable aspect in native living. Its proximity to the large water way, now known as the Los Angeles River, provided for an ideal Village of significant stature. The terrain provided for the natural sense of elevation, allowing the members of this village the privilege of pristine views of the lands from atop the valleys. The beauty of roaming among the hills, abundant with roses and an advantage of capturing wild life and hunted game, must have proven itself in establishing that OTSUNGNA has been referenced as the largest, and head of all the Villages in the Tribe of the Tongva People. (Indicated earlier and submitted as Figure 4 – Note the size of the marker that reflects the Village of OTSUNGNA)

First Native Contacts – Sea Expeditions

The Native Indians that lived here did so with interest in hunting, gathering seeds, planting crops and leading a natural lifestyle living off the land. The Tongva Indians learned how to sustain themselves with very little conflict and trading goods amongst themselves to survive for thousands of years. The earliest contact with outsiders appeared in the 15th – 16th Centuries as noted by the Cabrillo expedition of 1542 when Spain was in efforts to claim the land of the north. This first recorded contact came on October 7, 1542, when the Pacific Sea exploration led by Juan Cabrillo landed on current day Catalina Island, in which a boat was sent out to preview the mainland where the Tongva Indians lived. The intentions of the expedition were to map out the Pacific ports and bays which had been a success for future explorers. In an effort to assist his men, Cabrillo was injured with a broken leg and subsequently died the following year. (The California State Military Museum – http://www.militarymuseum.org/Cabrillio.html)

It was sixty years later when another voyage was launched along the Pacific North by the Spanish, led by Sebastian Vizcaino in 1602 and the very first time the term 'Rose' was used other than that of the Tongva Indians. Vizcaino used the term on November 10, 1602, December 16, 1602, through January 3, 1603. When this Spanish Explore observed and noted the Rose, he did so by entries into the voyage log. It is the accounts of Padre Antonio de la Ascension's log of the same voyage, that lays claim to the name "Rosa de Castilla" (Credits to J.N. Bowman 'Rose of Castile' – Attached) The naming of the 'Rosa de Castilla' was marked by the recollection of the Rose that appeared in Spain, and relating it to the new lands that were being proclaimed under the Spanish Rule. There had been other sea explorers including those from Asia and Russia to the Pacific shores on through to the 1700's.

Land Expeditions

In the mid 1700's, it had become noted that occupation of Alta California by others than the Tongva Indians was in question, the king of New Spain, King Carlos III ordered a land exploration to claim the land with fears that the English or Russians may want to do the same. During the year of 1768, King Carlos III set the wheels in motion to control the Pacific North and organized with Gaspar de Portola to lead the expedition north by land in the following year, with intent to build missions and lay claim, that the lands belonged to Spain. (Wikipedia -Gasper de Portola) Among those setting out northbound to venture into uncharted lands by foot, was Padre Juan Crespi, who was the diarist for the expedition. The 63 men and nearly 100 mules carrying supplies set forth on July 14, 1769, with the intent of finding the Bay of Monterey roughly in the area of present day San Francisco.

Padre Juan Crespi noted many observations and made daily entries relative to the expedition, some of the most interesting entries makes note to large Earthquakes that took place on Friday July 28, 1769, around 1:00p.m. in the area of current day Santa Ana River. (Rio de los Temblores) As the group of men marched by foot north, they neared the current day San Gabriel River over that very same weekend, they felt many aftershocks and recorded their regularity and viewed a

great valley on Sunday July 30, 1769, in which it is described as 'Marshes', relating to the surrounding areas of Whittier Narrows including Legg Lake. (Credits to the Diary entries of Padre Juan Crespi)

On Monday morning July 31, 1769, the diary entry states that a violent Earthquake once again occurred while having difficulty navigating the muddy waters and the need to clear the brush at every step. As they neared a slight opening in the brush they set up camp in a clear spot and took this time to rest themselves and the animals. The following day, Tuesday August 1, 1769, they continued to rest and sent out scouts to explore the country and suggested routes. Once again the day was rocked by several Earthquakes, the soldiers asked for permission to hunt antelope, as many of the animals had been observed, and permission was granted, with some soldiers setting out on horse while others went on foot. During this hunting mission, they had noted the observation of a 'River of Fine Water' close to 50 feet wide not more than a half days march. Wednesday morning, the men set out for the 'River of Fine Water' to the West through an opening between low lying hills and on the same day, August 2, 1769, passing many Alder and Poplar Trees reached the river to be named "Río de la Porciúncula". It is also indicated that a smaller river from the North-North East intersects this larger river, but the smaller one was dry. (Description of the current Arroyo Seco) Once again, a succession of Earthquakes shook the land throughout the day and the men ultimately camped at a site by the current day Elysian Park. (Historic Landmark #655 on Broadway at the entrance to Elysian Park) On Thursday August 3, 1769, as they lead away from the river toward the west, the men were still amazed at the amount of Earthquakes, and also recorded the observation of a 'Pitch like Material Bubbling Up'. (Referring to the Tar Pits)

Quotation by Padre Junipero Serra in 1770's

In strong contrast to this lack of interest, he displays a keen appreciation of the many natural beauties they now encountered on their journey. As they drew nearer the more fertile country of Alta California, he notes the many beautiful flowers. "And that there should be nothing lacking in this line [he says with a simple, charming delight] today, on arriving at the camping place we have met the queen of them all, which is the Rose of Castile. When I write this I have before me a branch of rose bush with three roses opened, others in bud, and more than six unpetaled. Blessed be He who created them." He gives the place the poetical name of the 'Arroyo of the Roses,' and adds, "It is in so many places rank with Rosebushes full of flowers that well could an apothecary extract his profit." http://www.ralphmag.org/baja) The travelers resumed their laborious march over steep hills, through deep ravines, till one evening, worn and covered with the fine dust of the country; they descended into a well-watered plain, which spread out before them like a shining Garden of Eden. Here they gladly rested for a day, that the animals might graze luxuriously on the green grass and have water sufficient to quench their thirst. "The men," said Junipero, "also thought to have their refreshment with fishing and hunting. Portola and Junipero in the meantime had rather the best of it for they remained quietly in camp and were refreshed with 'chia-water' which the natives brought them, "giving us with Joviality, great pleasure and consolation such as we had not had till here."

In the year of 1852, the Rancho was once again transferred to Jean-Baptiste Batz and his wife Catalina Hegui Batz, immigrants from Argentina who lived in the Adobe home on the east side of the current 710 freeway and just north of the current 10 Freeway. (Submitted as Figure 7) Jean-Baptiste lived on the Rancho until his passing on December 6, 1859; Catalina gained possession under the Homestead Act around 1876 and proceeded to purchase the land from the surrounding owners adjacent to hers. It eventually grew to a total of 3,283 acres of land all claimed to '*Rancho Rosa de Castilla*' until her death on February 22, 1882. The land was then divided as an Estate to six of her eight children with the Southernmost 700 acres passed to the third eldest son named Jose Domingo Batz.

In 1863, the City of Los Angeles was unable to pay the City Health Officer and County Coroner (1862-1865), Dr. John S. Griffin for services rendered and offered in return of payment, an amount of 2,000 acres of land. Instead of paying the \$3,000 owed to Dr. Griffin, the land was provided at 50 cents an acre which would later be called East Los Angeles and the City would later buy back the lands of East Lake Park in 1881. By 1901, East Lake Park was laid out and constructed, using the nearby natural water ways as a source for a major amusement park in the area and first zoological site. (History of Lincoln Park – www.lincolnheightsla.com/lincolnpark/)

Around 1870 a prominent businessman by the name of Jesse Yarnell moved to Rose Hills and was the co-founder of the Los Angeles Mirror Company, which later merged with the Los Angeles Times in 1873. That same year, a major arterial had been recognized as 'Roses Road' which started at the current intersection of Huntington Drive and Monterey Road and proceeded east. 'Roses Road' was later called Los Angeles-Pasadena Road and East Los Angeles Road, now Huntington Drive. The Southern Pacific Rail Road was constructed through the area and still exists to this day, built in 1876 and helped develop the City of Los Angeles, along with the Santa Fe Rail Road in 1887.

As rare as it may seem, a photo included is actually of '*Rancho Rosa de Castilla*' as it appeared around 1880, with several Rancheros standing in the foreground, decades before the recognition of other local communities. (Figure 8 - Cal Trans District 7) A beautiful story relating to the Roses that grazed the lands, as told by Dona Margarita, is provided for your pleasure. ('With Flowers and Trees in California' page 185-187 written by Charles Francis Saunders). Some of the influential residents that have called '*OTSUNGNA'* - *Rancho Rosa de Castilla* – *Rose Hills* home include: Padre Junipero Serra, Registrar of the Pueblo of Los Angeles – Juan Ballesteros, Captain Newton, Attorney Judge and State Senator-George Hugh Smith, Trustee of the first school built in the area – Farmdale Evan Evans, and founder of the Los Angeles Military Academy. The Co-Founder of the Los Angeles Mirror Company – later the Los Angeles Times Jesse Yarnell, owner of the Los Angeles Herald – Hancock M. Johnston (Lincoln Heights portion), Dr. John S. Griffin, W.H. Workman, nephew of Pio Pico – Marcos A. Forster of San Juan Capistrano.

Through this entire period, water sources relied on the *Arroyo Rosa de Castilla* and a much smaller Arroyo that ran north to south, just west of current day Eastern Ave.. The local Ascot ⁻⁻ Reservoir was unable to meet the demand of the growing community and by 1894 was out of capacity in serving the residents. By the end of the Century, the Railway system had been introduced and brought forth the age of the Pacific Electric Rail Road that traveled along the Los Angeles-Pasadena Road which later became Huntington Drive. At the turn of the 20th Century, the 'Red Car' was operating by 1902 and Rose Hills Elementary School was opened establishing a strong year for 1909. (Now Huntington Drive Elementary School)

20th Century - Rose Hills

Pacific Electric Rail Road maps indicate the validity of the community of Rose Hills by making it the first stop in route from a junction in Los Angeles through Pasadena out to Arcadia. This first stop was located at the intersection of Huntington Drive and Monterey Road, with its route through Los Angeles and special destination lines and other lines indicating services to Watts, providing for early transportation options in the City. (Photos included) At the beginning of the 20th Century, rail way transportation was more profound than that of a vehicle. Henry Huntington was the pioneer in the P.E.R.R. and used it to travel into Downtown. He created a stop for the Baird Brothers (George and Llewellyn) at the current location of Huntington Drive and Eastern (In those days called 'Farmdale' Road) There had been many sub-divisions of 'Rancho Rosa de Castilla' - Rose Hills from the late 1800's and many more in the early 1900's changing with the development of the Rail transportation lines through the area. The Baird Brothers had been the most aggressive real estate agents of the time and claimed an area called 'Bairdstown' which had become El Sereno. In the first decade of the 20th Century, there was no unified identity and no coordinated plan for the community as a whole. The sub-divisions were platted haphazardly, resulting in four distinct neighborhoods. (Known as Rose Hills, Bairdstown, Farmdale, and Sierra Vista) The Baird Brothers annexed the lands to the City of Los Angeles and had finalized the founding of El Sereno on June 10, 1915. It was a few years after the annexation to the City that the name El Sereno was changed from Bairdstown.

The first notable indicators of 'Our Lady of Guadalupe' occurred in 1920 with the Sisters of Social Services, where catechism classes were held in the community. In 1924 it was named 'Our Lady of Guadalupe Mission', under the care of Fr. Antonio Arias where mass was celebrated on Sundays. The beginning of World War II sparked the development of the Rose Hill Courts in 1942, built to house the Military personnel. A look of the project from the view of an engineer is provided, showing the preparation of construction, and a beautiful panorama of the community of Rose Hills. (Photo included - Rose Hill Courts - Point #1 Jan. 12, 1942)

With close to two hundred years of growth and recorded history, the open lands have still retained its beauty and natural configuration. What have been lost are the natural rivers and streams that flowed without obstruction, now we have streets that navigate our rain runoff.

With losing the Rivers and Streams, we have lost the Mother of them all, the *ROSE*, growing abundantly on the hillsides, now it has to be planted and tended to for the beauty to appear.

The transportation age came along and the need to modify infrastructure and keep the growing population moving was taking an historic turn. That turn started in Chicago and ended in Los Angeles with the creation and completion of "Historic Route 66". This magnificent endeavor was named the 'Mother Road', stretching for nearly 2500 miles, leading west to Los Angeles by means of the Los Angeles-Pasadena Road through our community of Rose Hills. (El Camino Real - formally Roses Road, now Huntington Drive) This can be considered one of the most popularized highways in the country, hence the name.....'Main Street of America'. Route 66 was established on November 11, 1926. Aside from the Historic Route 66, the street names in the community have led to a unique sense of richness, by naming them after precious minerals and gemstones. Here is a list of street names given and established for the community of Rose Hills; Amber, Amethyst , Beryl, Diamond , Esmeralda, Galena, Mercury, Moonstone, Onyx, Opal, Pearl, Pyrite, Radium, Raynol, Sapphire, Sardonyx, Telluride, Topaz, Tourmaline, Turquois, and Yorba. Remarkable that so many streets carry the names of nature's wonders, all within a community, deserving of such valued gemstones.

With the creation of the Arroyo Seco Freeway, the first Freeway in the State of California, opening in 1940, much of the affluent residents traveled by the rolling hills from Los Angeles to Pasadena doing away with the need for the Pacific Electric Rail Road and in turn giving birth to Huntington Drive. You will find it interesting to see the images of the train actually traveling down the middle of current day Huntington Drive. (Photo of Soto Bridge and P.E.R.R. September 1951) The development in the community did take a jump in the positive direction with the construction of *'Our Lady of Guadalupe – Rose Hills'*. The dedication of Monsignor Ramon Soriano, who became Administrator of the Mission in 1945 and pastor in 1954 provided most of the site growth. The original hall and church was located across the street at the current day Recreation Center. It was in 1953 that the City of Los Angeles wanted to build a playground where the Mission stood, and the current location of the church across the street was purchased that same year with the help of His Eminence James Francis Cardinal McIntyre. Ramon Soriano had remarkable improvements made and welcomed as a special guest, His Eminence James Francis McIntyre, to bless the school on January 22, 1961.

Another great attribute to the Historic value of the community is found on the campuses of Cal State Los Angeles. They have records and many reports verifying the relevance of *'Rancho Rosa de Castilla'* that they have a variety of the species in the Rose Garden, and have also named the major arterial through campus, *Paseo Rancho Castilla*. Our local University claims the truth about the facts and history as researched and found proven and accurate.

In 1970 a Ground Breaking Ceremony took place on Monterey Road for the newly developing '*Rose Hill Regional Park*', where the County Supervisor Ernest Debs and City Council Member Art Snyder dedicate the park to the community with shovels in hand. (Photos of Ground Breaking Ceremony included – Rose Hill Regional Park) After the lease for the park was over, the City resumed

management of the park and named it in honor of Mr. Debs. At this Ground Breaking site, alongside of Monterey Road, is the Official Corner Stone of the Original boundary of *El Pueblo de Los Angeles*. Several indicators mark this location in the community of Rose Hills, as the actual location to the founding of the City of Angels. Visit this local land mark (corner stone) as you enter Debs Park (Formally known as Rose Hill Regional Park) on Monterey Road to feel history.

As recently as just 30 years ago (1981), Mayor Tom Bradley dedicated a plaque in front of the church at the plaza in current down town Olvera Street. This plaque commemorates a very recognizable image. The plaque will also verify a marker, which is described as the '*Pueblos Corner Stone*' in the community of Rose Hills at the entrance to Debs Park (formally Rose Hill Regional Park). This is one of the strongest indicators of the importance of the founding of this great City. If you look very closely and know your history of Los Angeles and its past, you will see pretty much an identical representation between the plaque and the '*Diseno*' submitted as the land claim for '*Rancho Rosa de Castilla*'.(Color image of Plaque attached)

Conclusion

The opportunity to share this collection of information with the community of Rose Hills and the People of the City of Los Angeles will provide for future recognition and references relative to OTSUNGNA, *Rancho Rosa de Castilla*, and Rose Hills. In the coming years, I will continue to pursue additional facts and resources that may provide for additional input. The findings have shown that from its earliest recordable inhabitants over 5,000 years ago, through the turn of the 21st century, the prominent feature of this part of Los Angeles, still remains that of a flower of remarkable resilience, the Rose.

It has been many centuries that societies have lived on the lands we now borrow; there will be generations of the future that will seek written resources to have an understanding of this same area of land. I would hope that this portfolio be recognized and utilized as a valued resource, to show that the memories of the Native Indians, Spaniards, Mexicans, and Angelinos all have a unified bond, to that natural treasure shared by beauty and fragrance, the Rose.

The connection between the Native Indian Village of OTSUNGNA and Rose Hills has been established by a number of credible factors, with many viable accounts credited to the lands between San Gabriel Mission and Placita Olvera, *Rancho Rosa de Castilla*. Following the course of history and understanding the direct relation of the progressive timeline, and its connection to the community of Rose Hills, I would ask that the Historical Society of Southern California recognize the beautiful and precious Historic Community of Rose Hills as a vital component with the founding of the City of Angels.
