Comments for Public Posting: Dear Councilmember David Ryu and Members of the Transportation Committee of the City Council, I am writing in support of funding for improved safety measures on Angus Street in Silver Lake which LADOT and David Ryu support, including conversion to one-way stretch between Moreno and Kenilworth "Council File 11-2130-S4" My family and I live on Angus Street. We walk along and across Angus Street daily with our young daughters, one who attends Ivanhoe Elementary and the other in a stroller. We likewise drive on Angus Street daily and find that traffic on our street is often times congested and dangerous due to cut-through traffic issues. I hope that funding is granted to convert this stretch of Angus Street to one-way.
