The success of Spring Street's green bike lane has been proven. Since 2012 we have seen a 40% increase in bicycle ridership along the corridor. We want to be sure this trend is further encouraged in a community that is increasingly residential and pedestrian-oriented. While Downtown LA is a stand-in for cities around the world, it is also a neighborhood for over 50,000 Angelenos. Other cities are competing for our creative talent that increasingly seeks out the urban lifestyle available in Downtown.
