The Citizens Coalition for a Safe Community is very concerned with (CF13-0568) the recent explosion and fires (SoCal Gas) in Playa Del Rey (Jan. 2013) we are also concerned about (CF13-0542) the continuing gas migration in the Miracle Mile District with several large development projects proposed in this area as well as the Purple Line we have concerns about historical risks of methane intrusion at explosive levels into this neighborhood. We would like the Committee to task the LAFD to investigate both of these incidents.

Until the reasons for the gas migration, explosions and fires are know there will continue to be warranted concern by the public.

RE: Incident of Janaury 6, 2013

Dear Sir/Madam,

We are residents at 7811 Veragua Drive, located above the Sempra Gas Company storage facility. As a result of the explosion and fire on January 6, 2013, our property incurred significant damage due to splattering of a black oily substance that landed everywhere. We needed significant clean up of our stone work, deck, stucco, swimming pool and pool equipment, outdoor furniture, vehicles parked in front of our house, landscape plants and more. The Gas Company employed a haz-mat clean-up company to mop up some of the visible damage caused by the oily substance but it did not restore our property to its pre-explosion condition. We are also extremely concerned about the long-term health effects to ourselves, our family, our pets, and to the wildlife of the Ballona Valley caused by the airborne particles and residue left behind.

Furthermore, following the January explosion and subsequent re-start of operations, the Gas Company's noise abatement methods were disrupted and to date the noise level in our home through our closed, double-paned windows is extremely loud, much more so than prior to the incident. The high-pitched screeching and loud humming and grinding noises running day and night have caused our family to have many nights of disrupted sleep.

We insist that the Gas Company be vigilantly monitored and in compliance with strict regulations to protect the health, safety and well-being of the local residents and wildlife, or otherwise cease all operations.

We request that the Public Safety Committee review the obligations as set forth by the City of Los Angeles, investigate Sempra's failure to comply and ensure conformity with all of these requirements.

We would like the Committee to task the LAFD to investigate the incident at issue in CF-1305 We have concerns about the recent – Jan. 1, 2013 explosion and fires at the Playa del Rey Oilfield, SoCalGas oil/gas high pressure storage operations and believe that the LAFD should investigate these issues and report back to the Committee in 60 days. Until the reasons for the explosions and fires are known, there will be undue concern and fear of further potentially hazardous episodes within the surrounding communities.

DRAFT Resolution

The Public Safety Committee requests that the Los Angeles Fire Department (LAFD) conduct an investigation of the 6th January 2013 uncontrolled releases and related explosion(s) and fire/flaring of hydrocarbon gases from the Southern California Gas Co.'s facilities at Playa Del Rey.

The LAFD shall coordinate with surrounding neighborhood associations and organization to assure public participation and comprehensive information base.

The central goal for the investigation is to reduce the risk of the situation occurring again in the future and that first responders shall be protected and informed as to threats and risks from entry of such facilities.

The Committee requests that the LAFD report back to the committee within 60 days regarding the initial findings and future directions of such investigation.
