COMMITTEE TRANSMITTAL: AUTHORIZATION FOR THE ECONOMIC AND WORKFORCE DEVELOPMENT DEPARTMENT TO AMEND EXISTING WORKSOURCE CENTER CONTRACTS TO ADD ADDITIONAL FUNDS AND TO EXTEND BY AN ADDITIONAL SIX MONTHS THROUGH JUNE 30, 2014

RECOMMENDATIONS

The Interim General Manager of the Economic and Workforce Development Department (EWDD) and the Chairman of the Workforce Investment Board (WIB) respectfully request that the Mayor and City Council:

- AUTHORIZE the Interim General Manager of the EWDD, or designee, to allocate \$9,015,701 in Program Year 2013-14 Workforce Investment Act (WIA) reserved grant funds for existing WorkSource Center Operators as described in Attachment A.
- AUTHORIZE the Interim General Manager of the EWDD, or designee, to amend existing WorkSource Center agreements to extend the time of performance from January 1, 2014, to June 30, 2014, subject to the review by the City Attorney as to form and legality.

WIB ACTION

The City of Los Angeles Workforce Investment Board (WIB) approved the allocation of these grant funds at the WIB Executive Committee meeting on September 25, 2013.

FISCAL IMPACT

There is no negative impact on the General Fund as all items are funded through the City's Workforce Investment Act Adult and Dislocated Worker allocation. The recommendations are in compliance with the City's Financial Policies.

BACKGROUND

In approving the WIB Year 14 Annual Plan on May 30, 2013 (CF# 13-0728, June 27, 2013), the WIB, City Council, and Mayor provided funding for the Workforce Development System providers (WorkSource Centers) for the six-month period from July 1, 2013 to December 31, 2013. During this timeframe, the EWDD was to re-procure the Workforce Development System. As such, the Annual Plan identified \$9,015,701 in WIA Adult and Dislocated Worker funding to allocate to the WorkSource Centers for the period of January 1, 2014 through June 30, 2014.

As requested by the City Council, the EWDD recently reported back to the Economic Development Committee its recommendations for redesigning the Workforce Development System through a Request for Proposals (RFP) procurement process. The EWDD anticipates that the selected WorkSource Centers will be strategically located in the areas of the City having the highest concentrations of poverty; having the greatest number of long-term unemployed individuals; and having the lowest educational attainment rates. The City is also seeking to lower the infrastructure costs associated with the Workforce Development System by favoring proposals that locate in City-managed and other low-cost facilities.

Through the WorkSource Center RFP, the EWDD proposes to increase significantly the number of City residents enrolled and case-managed through the WorkSource Centers through the implementation of the following innovative strategies:

- Refocus the Workforce Development System (WDS) on developing Career Pathways opportunities in high-demand employment sectors leading to living wage employment;
- Harness new technologies and web-based applications to better serve participants;
- Implement an Integrated Service Delivery Model that will require WorkSource Centers to enroll all eligible participants, thereby significantly increasing the number of participants enrolled into the WDS;

- Leverage Strategic Partnerships with education, employment training, and social-service providers to provide more comprehensive services to program participants; and
- Increase services levels for vulnerable populations (e.g., Returning Veterans; Individuals with Disabilities; English Language Learners; Individuals Experiencing Homelessness; Mature/Older Workers; and Ex-Offenders) by mandating minimum service levels.

The EWDD released the Request for Proposals (RFP) on October 18, 2013, and has published the announcement of the RFP release through organizations and local, state, and national media to encourage submissions from qualified respondents from for-profit enterprises, non-profit organizations, and public governmental and educational agencies.

While this RFP process in underway, the EWDD is requesting authority to amend the existing agreements with the workforce development system providers to increase funding and extend the terms of their agreements. Each existing WorkSource Center will receive an amount of WIA funds equal to its first six-month contract total (see Attachment A). Performance goals (see Attachment B) and job training expenditure expectations will be adjusted to reflect the increased funding and expanded timeline.
