### **FINDINGS**

- The building reflects "the broad cultural, economic, or social history of the nation, State or community" for its association with the expatriate Korean independence movement in the United States.
- 2) The building is "identified with historic personages or with important events in the main currents of national, State or local history" having been the primary residence for the family of "Dosan" Ahn Chang-Ho.

# **CRITERIA**

The criterion is the Cultural Heritage Ordinance which defines a historical or cultural monument as any site (including significant trees or other plant life located thereon) building or structure of particular historic or cultural significance to the City of Los Angeles, such as historic structures or sites in which the broad cultural, economic, or social history of the nation, State or community is reflected or exemplified, or which are identified with historic personages or with important events in the main currents of national, State or local history or which embody the distinguishing characteristics of an architectural type specimen, inherently valuable for a study of a period style or method of construction, or a notable work of a master builder, designer or architect whose individual genius influenced his age.

#### SUMMARY

Built circa 1900, this two-story single-family residential building exhibits character-defining features of the American Foursquare style with some Craftsman features. The subject building is rectangular in plan with a hipped roof. Two hipped roof dormers have decorative rafter tails, wood-shingle siding, and louvered vents. The main elevation features a cutaway porch with square piers and a closed railing. A hipped roof overhangs the porch entry steps. The main entrance has a wooden, eight-light door with a simple surround. West of the entrance is a small wood-sash window. The second story contains two wooden double-hung windows. The building is primarily covered in wood-lap siding. A concrete accessible ramp is located at the rear elevation.

The home was the primary residence for the family of Dosan Ahn Chang (1878-1938) from 1937-1946. During Korea's struggle for independence, the home became a central meeting place for Korean activists in Los Angeles. Ahn Chang-Ho (pen name "Dosan") was born in Korea and emigrated to San Francisco with his wife Helen (1884-1969) in 1902. He is recognized for establishing the first Korean organization in the United States: the Friendship Society (1903), as well as the Mutual Assistance Society in San Francisco. He also founded the Young Korean Academy in 1913. He moved to Riverside, CA in 1904 and a decade later settled in Los Angeles, where he remained active organizing and working towards Korean independence, writing the seminal tract "A Korean's Appeal for Independence" (1919). Though he returned to Korea in 1926, his family settled in the subject building where his wife raised their children. Dosan died in 1932 after being imprisoned by Japanese forces in Shanghai, China.

The subject building was acquired by the University of Southern California (USC) in 1966 and moved to its present location in 2004. It now houses the Korean Studies Institute.

The subject building has few alterations and was restored in 2004.

### DISCUSSION

The Dosan Ahn Chang Ho Family Home property successfully meets two of the specified Historic-Cultural Monument criteria: 1) reflects "the broad cultural, economic, or social history of the nation, State or community" and 2) is "identified with historic personages or with important events in the main currents of national, State or local history." For its association with the Korean independence movement and Ahn Chang-Ho, the property qualifies for designation as a Historic-Cultural Monument based on these criteria.

# CALIFORNIA ENVIRONMENTAL QUALITY ACT ("CEQA") REVIEW

State of California CEQA Guidelines, Article 19, Section 15308, Class 8 "consists of actions taken by regulatory agencies, as authorized by state or local ordinance, to assure the maintenance, restoration, enhancement, or protection of the environment where the regulatory process involves procedures for protection of the environment."

State of California CEQA Guidelines Article 19, Section 15331, Class 31 "consists of projects limited to maintenance, repair, stabilization, rehabilitation, restoration, preservation, conservation or reconstruction of historical resources in a manner consistent with the Secretary of the Interior's Standards for the Treatment of Historic Properties with Guidelines for Preserving, Rehabilitating, Restoring, and Reconstructing Historic buildings."

The designation of the Dosan Ahn Chang Ho Family Home as a Historic-Cultural Monument in accordance with Chapter 9, Article 1, of The City of Los Angeles Administrative Code ("LAAC") will ensure that future construction activities involving the subject property are regulated in accordance with Section 22.171.14 of the LAAC. The purpose of the designation is to prevent significant impacts to a Historic-Cultural Monument through the application of the standards set forth in the LAAC. Without the regulation imposed by way of the pending designation, the historic significance and integrity of the subject property could be lost through incompatible alterations and new construction and the demolition of irreplaceable historic structures. The Secretary of the Interior's Standards of Rehabilitation are expressly incorporated into the LAAC and provide standards concerning the historically appropriate construction activities which will ensure the continued preservation of the subject property.

The use of Categorical Exemption Class 8 in connection with the proposed designation is consistent with the goals of maintaining, restoring, enhancing, and protecting the environment through the imposition of regulations designed to prevent the degradation of Historic-Cultural Monuments.

The use of Categorical Exemption Class 31 in connection with the proposed designation is consistent with the goals relating to the preservation, rehabilitation, restoration and reconstruction of Historic buildings in a manner consistent with the Secretary of the Interior's Standards for the Treatment of Historic Properties with Guidelines for Preserving Rehabilitating, Restoring, and Reconstructing Historic Buildings.

### 9. Physical Description

The Dosan Ahn Chang House is located on the University Park campus of the University of Southern California (USC). This house was moved to its present location in 2004 from its original location on McClintock Avenue and 34<sup>th</sup> Street. The house is based on an American Four Square with Craftsman details. This two-story building has a brick foundation and rectangular plan. It has a hipped roof and wood lap siding. The main (south) façade features a cutaway porch with square piers and a closed rail. A hipped roof overhangs the porch entry steps. The main entrance has a wood, eight-light door with a simple surround. West of the main entrance is a small, wood-sash window. East of the porch is a wood sash, rectangular picture window. The second story contains two wood, double-hung, one-over-one windows with lamb's tongues. Two hipped roof dormers (facing south and west) have decorative rafter tails, wood-shingle siding, and louvered vents. The roof has a wide eave overhang with exposed decorative rafter tails. The rear (north) façade appears to have been altered at the first story with T1-11 siding at the lower walls, and fixed, single and multi-lite windows at the second story. A concrete accessible ramp is located at the rear elevation. The building appears to be in overall good condition.

#### 15. Alterations

Building moved to its present location in 2004. Accessible ramp installed. The rear (north) façade appears to have been altered at the first story with T1-11 siding at the lower walls, and fixed, single and multi-lite windows at the second story.

The Dosan Ahn Chang House was constructed prior to 1907, according to USC records. It was the primary residence for the family of Dosan Ahn Chang from 1937 to 1946. During Korea's struggle for Independence, the home became a central meeting place for Korean activists.

Ahn Chang-Ho pen name "Dosan" (1878-1938), was born in Korea, and emigrated to San Francisco with his wife Helen (1884 -1969) in 1902, seeking a better education. He is known for establishing the first Korean organization in the United States; The Friendship Society (1903), as well as the Mutual Assistance Society in San Francisco. Dosan moved to Riverside California in 1904, and according to the National Association of Korean Americans, worked in the citrus groves there, and taught. This building was acquired by USC after the 1966 Hoover Redevelopment Project and moved to its current location in 2004. The Hoover Redevelopment Project, a postwar urban renewal scheme under the aegis of the Community Redevelopment Agency, allowed USC to expand its campus. Currently housing the USC Korean Studies Institute, the building was originally located on McClintock Avenue in a predominantly Korean neighborhood.

Although the house originally rested beyond the borders of USC, campus expansion eventually included the property. The home is significant both to USC and to the Korean community due to its pivotal role in providing a central meeting place for the burgeoning Korean Independence movement and continuing the work of Dosan Ahn Chang. The interior renovation was completed on November 11, 2004. The new space was dedicated on March 29, 2006.

#### Conclusion

The Dosan Chang Ho Family House is significant because of its role as a central meeting place for Korean activists in the 1930's and 1940's struggling to overcome Japanese oppression. Its' role as the Korean Studies Institute on the USC campus acknowledges the important part this structure played in Korean-American history and strives to continue the work of Dosan Ahn Chang through learning and mutual understanding. Although never occupied by Dosan, the house has come to represent the early struggles of Korean Americans in Los Angeles, and has taken on considerable importance to the Korean Community as an early symbol of their contribution to Los Angeles.

# **FINDINGS**

- The building reflects "the broad cultural, economic, or social history of the nation, State or community" for its association with the expatriate Korean independence movement in the United States.

# SUMMARY

Built circa 1900, this two-story single-family residential building exhibits character-defining features of the American Foursquare style with some Craftsman features. The subject building is rectangular in plan with a hipped roof. Two hipped roof dormers have decorative rafter tails, wood-shingle siding, and louvered vents. The main elevation features a cutaway porch with square piers and a closed railing. A hipped roof overhangs the porch entry steps. The main entrance has a wooden, eight-light door with a simple surround. West of the entrance is a small wood-sash window. The second story contains two wooden double-hung windows. The building is primarily covered in wood-lap siding. A concrete accessible ramp is located at the rear elevation.

The home was the primary residence for the family of Dosan Ahn Chang (1878-1938) from 1937-1946. ## DISCUSSION
