

Dear Councilman Price,

I am writing in strong opposition of the proposal to legalize street vending in the City of Los Angeles (Council File 13-1493.)

The policy would allow an unlimited number of vendors to operate wherever and whenever they want. Further, it would not place limits on the types of foods or merchandise vendors could sell.

Street vending in Los Angeles is known to compromise sidewalk access, food safety and neighborhood cleanliness, and I am concerned that the legalization of vending would magnify these issues.

Most importantly, the city has not provided an adequate framework for legalization and does not have the resources to regulate tens of thousands of street vendors.
