















Advanced Placement Exams

While high school enrollment in Grades 9-12 has declined by more than 14,000 since 2006-07, more AP courses and AP exams were taken by LAUSD students in 2012-13 than in the past five years. During this period of declining enrollment:

- The number of students enrolled in AP courses increased by nearly 5,000
- The number of AP courses taken increased by nearly 7,000.
- The percentage of students enrolled in AP classes has increased by nearly 6 percentage points (more that one-in-six students are now enrolled in AP classes).
- The number of AP exams taken increased by nearly 12,000. Over 44,000 exams were taken in 2012-13, compared to nearly 30,000 exams in 2006-07.
