What we, as residents, experienced was a limited-imposition City with a "hands off" policy, as long as everything was done accordingly and there were no violations of existing law. Life in Los Angeles, is becoming more complicated and oppressive every day. There now seems to be, yet, another, "Sword of Damocles" being considered, to hang over the heads of property owners. Today, we have the disclosure of rents issue, via the City Council.

If I could find a stronger word other than "Outrageous", that word being woefully insufficient, I would certainly use it in this case.

I already disclose my rental rates when I file my Income Taxes. This is duplicitous. I have a notion that this might even be a violation of the Constitution, in that it may be contrary to the Right to Privacy. Not the **Privilege to Privacy**, the **Right to Privacy**. Speaking of "Disclosure",
