FINDINGS

 The area reflects the "broad cultural, economic, or social history of the nation, State or community" by its association with early suburbanization of Studio City in relation to the popularization of the automobile and the growth in the entertainment industry-related residential development.

CRITERIA

The criterion is the Cultural Heritage Ordinance which defines a historical or cultural monument as any site (including significant trees or other plant life located thereon) building or structure of particular historic or cultural significance to the City of Los Angeles, such as historic structures or sites in which the broad cultural, economic, or social history of the nation, State or community is reflected or exemplified, or which are identified with historic personages or with important events in the main currents of national, State or local history or which embody the distinguishing characteristics of an architectural type specimen, inherently valuable for a study of a period style or method of construction, or a notable work of a master builder, designer or architect whose individual genius influenced his age.

SUMMARY

The Laurel Terrace Street Trees area spans a portion of a 1920's residential development in Studio City. It covers the public portions of Cantura Street, from Vantage Avenue in the east to Rhodes Avenue in the west, and Rhodes Avenue, from Ventura Boulevard in the north to Laurel Terrace Drive in the south. This area is populated by sycamore trees that were planted during the initial development of the neighborhood and by granite light posts installed during its period of significance.

This area was identified in SurveyLA as Laurel Terrace Residential Historic District and eligible for designation at the State and Local level. The following is an excerpt from the SurveyLA report regarding the Laurel Terrace Residential Historic District:

The tract comprising this area was subdivided in 1923 and 1924 by David G. Maxwell, a cattle breeder from Iowa. In 1920, Maxwell purchased a 263-acre ranch near the intersection of Ventura Blvd. and Laurel Canyon Blvd. from long-time valley fruit rancher A. J. Gwynn. Later that same year, he established Maxwell Farms, and in 1923, he offered the first subdivision in the development, initially referred to as "Maxwell Laurel Terrace."

While a handful of buildings date to the 1920's, construction began in earnest in the 1930's, as settlement increased along with Studio City's growing profile as a center for the entertainment industry. The neighborhood was situated adjacent to Mack Sennett's Studioland (later Republic Pictures, now CBS Studio Center), near the intersection of Ventura Blvd. and Radford Ave., which helped jump-start residential development of the tract.

An important feature of this neighborhood is the mature sycamore trees along Cantura Street and Rhodes Ave. According to historic aerial photographs, the trees were planted at the time of the tract's subdivision in the 1920's. These trees have been the subject of several newspaper articles over the years, including a 1996 Los Angeles Daily News article which noted that the trees "give that neighborhood an identify that is sorely lacking elsewhere in our fair city."

DISCUSSION

The Laurel Terrace Street Trees successfully meets one of the specified Historic-Cultural Monument criteria: 1) reflects "the broad cultural, economic or social history of the nation, State or community." This area is significant as one of Studio City's earliest residential subdivisions with many of the original features of the development extant, including the Sycamore Trees and the granite light posts along Cantura St. and Rhodes Ave.

CALIFORNIA ENVIRONMENTAL QUALITY ACT ("CEQA") FINDINGS

State of California CEQA Guidelines, Article 19, Section 15308, Class 8 "consists of actions taken by regulatory agencies, as authorized by state or local ordinance, to assure the maintenance, restoration, enhancement, or protection of the environment where the regulatory process involves procedures for protection of the environment."

State of California CEQA Guidelines Article 19, Section 15331, Class 31 "consists of projects limited to maintenance, repair, stabilization, rehabilitation, restoration, preservation, conservation or reconstruction of historical resources in a manner consistent with the Secretary of the Interior's Standards for the Treatment of Historic Properties with Guidelines for Preserving, Rehabilitating, Restoring, and Reconstructing Historic buildings."

The designation of the Laurel Terrace Street Trees as a Historic-Cultural Monument in accordance with Chapter 9, Article 1, of The City of Los Angeles Administrative Code ("LAAC") will ensure that future construction activities involving the subject property are regulated in accordance with Section 22.171.14 of the LAAC. The purpose of the designation is to prevent significant impacts to a Historic-Cultural Monument through the application of the standards set forth in the LAAC. Without the regulation imposed by way of the pending designation, the historic significance and integrity of the subject property could be lost through incompatible alterations and new construction and the demolition of irreplaceable historic structures. The Secretary of the Interior's Standards of Rehabilitation are expressly incorporated into the LAAC and provide standards concerning the historically appropriate construction activities which will ensure the continued preservation of the subject property.

The use of Categorical Exemption Class 8 in connection with the proposed designation is consistent with the goals of maintaining, restoring, enhancing, and protecting the environment through the imposition of regulations designed to prevent the degradation of Historic-Cultural Monuments.

The use of Categorical Exemption Class 31 in connection with the proposed designation is consistent with the goals relating to the preservation, rehabilitation, restoration and reconstruction of Historic buildings in a manner consistent with the Secretary of the Interior's Standards for the Treatment of Historic Properties with Guidelines for Preserving Rehabilitating, Restoring, and Reconstructing Historic Buildings.

BACKGROUND

On October 8th, 2014 the City Council initiated a motion to take the property under consideration. On November 6th, Commissioners Barron and Irvine inspected the site with Lambert Giessinger of the Office of Historic Resources (OHR) staff. Separately, Commissioner Milofsky inspected the site. And later the same day, November 6th, 2014, Commissioners Scrafano and Kennard inspected the site with Nels Youngborg of the OHR staff.

7. WRITTEN STATEMENTS

A- Proposed Monument Description:

The proposed monument consists of a grouping of mature sycamore trees that line Cantura Street in Studio City, between Vantage and Rhodes Avenues. The trees are predominately sycamores that were planted during the development of the tract in 1923. Although some types of sycamore trees are local plant foliage that are protected under the Protected Tree Ordinance, these trees are not local species and have no protection under the law.

The area surrounding the street trees is a residential neighborhood with modest-sized lots, averaging 50 by 135 feet. The street features uniform setbacks, concrete sidewalks, and original light standards. The area occupies flat terrain with a rectilinear street pattern.

B- Statement of Significance:

The Laurel Terrace Street Trees meet the Cultural Heritage Ordinance definition of a monument under the criteria of "reflects the broad cultural, economic, or social history of the nation, state or community." The trees do this by representing one of Studio City's earliest residential subdivisions, Maxwell Laurel Terrace. SurveyLA found this area eligible as a historic district and identified the street trees on Cantura a contributing feature of the district:

Comprising one of Studio City's earliest residential neighborhoods, the Laurel Terrace Residential Historic District is significant as an excellent example of an automobile suburb, and for its association with the entertainment industry in Studio City. The district's period of significance is 1923 to 1953, when most of the residences were constructed.

The tracts comprising the district were subdivided in 1923 and 1924 by David G. Maxwell, a cattle breeder from Iowa. In 1920, Maxwell purchased a 263-acre ranch near the intersection of Ventura Boulevard and Laurel Canyon Boulevard from long-time valley fruit rancher A.J. Gwynn. Later that same year, he established Maxwell Farms, and in 1923, he offered the first subdivision in the development, initially referred to as "Maxwell Laurel Terrace."

While a handful of buildings date to the 1920s, construction began in earnest in the 1930s, as settlement increased along with Studio City's growing profile as a center for the entertainment industry. The neighborhood was situated adjacent to Mack Sennett's Studioland (later Republic Pictures, now CBS Studio Center), near the intersection of Ventura Boulevard and Radford Avenue, which helped jump-start residential settlement in the area.

An active marketing campaign, along with speculative building fueled by FHA mortgage guarantee programs, helped spur development in these tracts in the 1930s. By 1939, according to Home Owners Loan Corporation survey documents, the neighborhood had been settled


primarily by "business and professional men, motion picture minor executives and employees," with an annual income ranging between \$2,500 and \$7,000.

An important feature of the district is the mature Sycamore trees along Cantura Street, between Vantage and Rhodes Avenues. According to aerial photographs, the trees were planted at the time of the tract's subdivision in the 1920s. These trees have been the subject of several newspaper articles over the years, including a 1996 Los Angeles Daily News article which noted that the trees "give that neighborhood an identity that is sorely lacking elsewhere in our fair city."

The district is significant as one of Studio City's earliest residential subdivisions. The neighborhood stands out as a concentration of pre-World War II residential development in an area where most of the adjacent tracts dates from the postwar period. It is also significant as a collection of more modest residences associated with the local entertainment industry.

Occupying the flatlands of Studio City just off Ventura Boulevard, this neighborhood stands in contrast to the more affluent areas in the nearby hills and canyons.

Due to this evidence, the street trees on Cantura should be designated as a Historical-Cultural Monument in celebration of this history of Studio City development.
