Dear Chief Beck:

Congratulations on your recent award. In establishing financial assistance programs, Congress linked the receipt of federal funding to compliance with federal civil rights laws. The Office for Civil Rights (OCR), Office of Justice Programs (OJP), U.S. Department of Justice (DOJ) is responsible for ensuring that recipients of financial assistance from the OJP, the Office of Community Oriented Policing Services (COPS), and the Office on Violence Against Women (OVW) comply with the applicable federal civil rights laws. We at the OCR are available to help you and your organization meet the civil rights requirements that come with DOJ funding.

Ensuring Access to Federally Assisted Programs

Federal laws that apply to recipients of financial assistance from the DOJ prohibit discrimination on the basis of race, color, national origin, religion, sex, or disability in funded programs or activities, not only in employment but also in the delivery of services or benefits. A federal law also prohibits recipients from discriminating on the basis of age in the delivery of services or benefits.

In March of 2013, President Obama signed the Violence Against Women Reauthorization Act of 2013. The statute amends the Violence Against Women Act of 1994 (VAWA) by including a nondiscrimination grant condition that prohibits discrimination based on actual or perceived race, color, national origin, religion, sex, disability, sexual orientation, or gender identity. The new nondiscrimination grant condition applies to certain programs funded after October 1, 2013. The OCR and the OVW have developed answers to some frequently asked questions about this provision to assist recipients of VAWA funds to understand their obligations. The Frequently Asked Questions are available at http://ojp.gov/about/ocr/vawafaqs.htm.

Enforcing Civil Rights Laws

All recipients of federal financial assistance, regardless of the particular funding source, the amount of the grant award, or the number of employees in the workforce, are subject to prohibitions against unlawful discrimination. Accordingly, the OCR investigates recipients that are the subject of discrimination complaints from both individuals and groups. In addition, based on regulatory criteria, the OCR selects a number of recipients each year for compliance reviews, audits that require recipients to submit data showing that they are providing services equitably to all segments of their service population and that their employment practices meet equal opportunity standards.

Providing Services to Limited English Proficiency (LEP) Individuals

In accordance with DOJ guidance pertaining to Title VI of the Civil Rights Act of 1964, 42 U.S.C. § 2000d, recipients of federal financial assistance must take reasonable steps to provide meaningful access to their programs and activities for persons with limited English proficiency (LEP). See U.S. Department of Justice, Guidance to Federal Financial Assistance Recipients Regarding Title VI Prohibition Against National Origin Discrimination Affecting Limited English Proficient Persons, 67 Fed. Reg. 41,455 (2002). For more information on the civil rights responsibilities that recipients have in providing language services to LEP individuals, please see the website http://www.lep.gov.

Ensuring Equal Treatment for Faith-Based Organizations

The DOJ regulation, Equal Treatment for Faith-Based Organizations, 28 C.F.R. pt. 38, requires State Administering Agencies (SAAs) to treat faith-based organizations the same as any other applicant or recipient. The regulation prohibits SAAs from making awards or grant administration decisions on the basis of an organization's religious character or affiliation, religious name, or the religious composition of its board of directors.

The regulation also prohibits faith-based organizations from using financial assistance from the DOJ to fund inherently (or explicitly) religious activities. While faith-based organizations can engage in non-funded inherently religious activities, they must hold them separately from the program funded by the DOJ, and recipients cannot compel beneficiaries to participate in them. The Equal Treatment Regulation also makes clear that organizations participating in programs funded by the DOJ are not permitted to discriminate in the provision of services on the basis of a beneficiary's religion. For more information on the regulation, please see the OCR's website at http://www.ojp.usdoj.gov/about/ocr/equal_fbo.htm.

SAAs and faith-based organizations should also note that the Omnibus Crime Control and Safe Streets Act (Safe Streets Act) of 1968, as amended, 42 U.S.C. § 3789d(c); the Victims of Crime Act of 1984, as amended, 42 U.S.C. § 10604(e); the Juvenile Justice and Delinquency Prevention Act of 1974, as amended, 42 U.S.C. § 5672(b); and VAWA, Pub. L. No. 113-4, sec. 3(b)(4), 127 Stat. 54, 61-62 (to be codified at 42 U.S.C. § 13925(b)(13)) contain prohibitions against discrimination on the basis of religion in employment. Despite these nondiscrimination provisions, the DOJ has concluded that it may construe the Religious Freedom Restoration Act (RFRA) on a case-by-case basis to permit some faith-based organizations to receive DOJ funds while taking into account religion when hiring staff, even if the statute that authorizes the funding program generally forbids recipients from considering religion in employment decisions. Please consult with the OCR if you have any questions about the regulation or the application of RFRA to the statutes that prohibit discrimination in employment.

Using Arrest and Conviction Records in Making Employment Decisions

The OCR issued an advisory document for recipients on the proper use of arrest and conviction records in making hiring decisions. Under the 2014 Paul Coverdell Grant Program, the Los Angeles Police Department (LAPD) is seeking funding to validate and implement the BULLETTRAX system, a new ballistic identification technology that captures high-resolution images and topographic information from fired bullets at the nanometer level.

Shooting crimes typically result in two types of physical evidence for investigators; a bullet or, if a semi-automatic pistol is used, a cartridge case. For the past 20 years the LAPD has used the BRASSTRAX ballistic technology system for identifying cartridge cases. However, nearly one-third of violent shooting crimes in Los Angeles are committed with revolvers, which leave bullets behind as the only physical evidence. The new BULLETTRAX system is the only bullet ballistic identification tool of its kind. The BULLETTRAX system is an automated system that captures high resolution 2D images and 3D topographic information of a bullet's lands and grooves for entry into the National Integrated Ballistic Information Network (NIBIN) system. The BULLETTRAX system will expand and expedite LAPD forensic science services by enabling the imaging and correlation of bullets in a similar manner that cartridge cases are currently imaged in BRASSTRAX and correlated in the NIBIN system.

Grant funds are being requested to fund overtime to prevent a significant increase in the FAU casework backlog due to the reassignment of FAU personnel to launch the BULLETTRAX system and database. Once the BULLETTRAX system is fully implemented, grant funds will also provide overtime funding to enter bullet evidence from approximately 234 crimes and 1,200 test-fired samples from confiscated revolvers into the BULLETTRAX database.

Use of the BULLETTRAX system will significantly speed up the analysis of bullet evidence. The FAU currently spends more than 3,000 staff hours per year on bullet microscopy and BULLETTRAX has the potential to reduce that by fifty-percent or more. The BULLETTRAX system will provide the LAPD and our law enforcement partners in other Southern California agencies with the ability to develop a ballistic database that will quickly and efficiently compare the characteristics of bullets entered into the NIBIN.

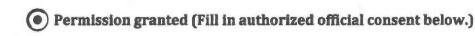

The BULLETTRAX system will provide the LAPD and our law enforcement partners in other agencies throughout the Southern California region with the ability to develop a ballistic database that will quickly and efficiently compare the characteristics of bullets entered into the NIBIN network.

I. Statement of Problem

The Los Angeles Police Department (LAPD), the third largest police agency in the nation, is responsible for a population of 3,855,122 within 21 Geographic Areas, covering 468 square miles. The LAPD Crime Laboratory is a full service, accredited laboratory with all disciplines of Criminalistics. In 2013, the FAU processed approximately 3,800 guns into the BRASSTRAX/NIBIN system. More than 650 crime scene cartridge case specimens were imaged and searched against the NIBIN database and the FAU reported over 200 NIBIN Cold Hits to investigators - many of which helped to solve previously unrelated crimes. Up until March 2014,

there was no corresponding technology for imaging the 1,200 bullets identified from revolvers, as these could not be imaged into the BRASSTRAX/NIBIN system, and required significant handson staff time to analyze. Under this grant, revolver bullets would be imaged into the new BULLETTRAX system, enabling the system to identify potential links between cases that previously required an in-depth, hands-on microscopic comparison.

FAU Staffing

Unfortunately, the City of Los Angeles is still feeling the negative effects of the recession. The Firearm Analysis Unit (FAU) of the LAPD Crime Laboratory is currently understaffed with only 34 of the 42 authorized positions filled. These are subdivided into two working groups : (1) The *Crossfire Detail* enters evidence submitted for image capture and search in the National Integrated Ballistics Information Network (NIBIN) database to compare to other crimes or firearms in the NIBIN database for LAPD, and (2) The *Comparison Detail* is tasked with examining and comparing microscopic markings on fired cartridge cases and bullets, performing serial number restorations, rendering firearms safe, conducting scientific field investigations of shooting scenes, and providing expert testimony for evidence they examine in cases involving firearms throughout the City of Los Angeles.

Backlog in the Firearm Analysis Unit

In total, the LAPD FAU has a current backlog of 451 requests, the majority of which require manual microscopic comparisons of firearms evidence components for 198 homicides, 23 attempted homicides, and other violent crimes.

The BRASSTRAX system is a screening tool that helps the LAPD quickly identify cartridge cases

that have potential links to other cases. Those with links are further analyzed by hand, which can take up to 18 hours per specimen. However, before BULLETTRAX, all bullet specimens had to be analyzed by hand from start to finish. When fully validated and implemented, BULLETTRAX will be a similar screening tool to flag bullets that might be linked to other crimes, thus saving considerable FAU staffing time in the long run.

With only 19 experienced Criminalists and Firearm Examiners currently on staff, the LAPD FAU is currently able to complete approximately 73 microscopic comparisons per month. Although this may seem like a large caseload, in actuality, we are just managing the current influx of analysis requests and maintaining our backlog at its present level. We have not been able to reduce it. In the short-term, we hope to contain our backlog. In the long-term we hope to eliminate it.

Implementation of BULLETTRAX

The proposed implementation of BULETTRAX will enhance and expedite LAPD investigative services including the comparison of bullets within the NIBIN network. However, the addition of BULLETTRAX will at first also result in a temporary workload increase in the FAU due to the reassignment of some staff to the BULLETTRAX project to complete the new system's validation process. Validation is a critical step; as an ISO 17025 accredited laboratory and in keeping with the laboratory's Quality System, new instruments and methods must be validated before implemented in casework. Therefore, additional funding for overtime is being requested to prevent an increase in our current backlog level while the validation and implementation of the BULLETTRAX system is taking place.

Strategy

The LAPD proposes a two-pronged approach to fully implementing BULLETTRAX: First, the FAU will complete and publish a validation study of the BULLETTRAX system, build a functional NIBIN bullet database and screen evidence samples using this new system. Validation is a necessary step for an accredited laboratory prior to implementing a new system. The LAPD will validate the BULLETTRAX system by entering known specimens and checking to see if the system is capable of identifying those same samples when they are entered a second time. The results of the validation study will then be published so other crime laboratories interested in implementing the new BULLETTRAX technology do not have to complete the same process before using the system in their laboratories.

Second, the FAU will need to complete flagged specimen comparison casework in a timely manner effectively preventing any increase in the backlog of requests while the implementation of BULLETTRAX can be completed.

The services provided by adding BULLETTRAX will substantially increase the workload of the FAU due to the reassignment of personnel to complete the validation. Since FAU currently has to stretch its resources in order to handle its current workload and contain the backlog, the FAU will offer overtime to complete the additional comparison casework. This will allow the FAU to remain current with incoming requests, allow for real-time crime laboratory results, and provide timely results to detectives to assist in their crime investigations. At the same time, adding the additional forensic resource of BULLETTRAX will increase efficiency and effectiveness. If the validation study results are positive, BULLETTRAX should assist in solving cases that might not have been solved without this new tool. Timely forensic results give LAPD detectives the leads

they need to solve cases efficiently, effectively, and as a result, the City of Los Angeles can act quickly and successfully in the prosecution of violent crimes, potentially sparing future victims. The following example from the BRASSTRAX system best illustrates the importance of such a timely analysis tool.

On April 11, 2012, a shooting on the campus of USC left two international graduate students dead. The case received local and national public interest as LAPD Southwest Detectives investigating the crime had no reliable witnesses and no suspects. The cartridge case evidence was brought to the FAU for imaging into BRASSTRAX and entry into NIBIN and subsequent analysis. The NIBIN link and comparison information from the FAU provided detectives valuable clues that their case was initially linked to the same gun used four months earlier in two other investigations, miles apart, in which the suspect had been identified. With the NIBIN link, information provided to investigators within 48 hours, the homicide detectives were able make swift connections and arrested the suspects. The forensic firearm analysis played a pivotal role in the outcome of the case. Not only did the FAU's timely work help to capture a dangerous felon, but they also helped relieve community fear in Los Angeles and abroad. The USC campus has one of the highest percentages of foreign students of any university in the nation, so there were also many families abroad who were also relieved when the perpetrator was arrested. In this example, the LAPD was fortunate that the cartridge case evidence used to commit the murders was supported by BRASSTRAX and NIBIN and were able to make a swift connection to the other crimes. If a revolver had been used and bullet casings were found, the case might not have been solved in such a timely manner as there was no BULLETTRAX database at that time.

The growing BULLETTRAX database will also be shared with other regional law enforcement agencies in order for the LAPD and other Southern California law enforcement agencies to be able to look for links in previously unrelated crimes where bullets are the key evidence in the case. There are at least 250 crimes per year in Los Angeles alone that fit that scenario.

II. Project Design and Implementation

The LAPD Firearm Analysis Unit's (FAU) two-pronged approach to enhance efficiency and improve service in the FAU, provides a benefit to the forensic firearms community, and prevents any increase in the backlog of requests. First, the FAU will launch BULLETTRAX by providing overtime for existing staff to complete the validation and implementation of the system. The FAU will image and correlate .38 and .357 caliber bullet evidence and firearms into the system bolstering the screening capabilities of the Crossfire Detail. The Crossfire Detail will not only be able to screen cartridge cases with the NIBIN system, but now they will also be able to screen bullets with the BULLETTRAX system. As a result, the efficiency and output capacity of the Comparison Detail should improve because most of their work will be pre-screened and thereby focused on certain specimens so they will not have to perform as many investigative multi-hour microscopic bullet and cartridge case comparisons.

The FAU will also use a portion of the grant funding to provide overtime for staff to complete time-sensitive comparison casework in order to deliver critical service and suppress any increase in the backlog of requests while the validation and implementation of BULLETTRAX is underway. The BULLETTRAX project will involve the validation phase whereby 200 known

bullet specimens and 25 blind test specimens (with known matches to the 200 set) will be entered into BULLETTRAX to demonstrate the software ability to find accurate correlations between the known and blind test specimens. The project will also involve the entry of approximately LAPD 250 evidence bullets into the database along with the test-fire of 1,200 LAPD evidence revolvers and entry of their test-fires into BULLETTRAX. This is significant resource expenditure, but a needed investment to improve the solvability of 30% of the shooting crimes in Los Angeles.

Validation and Implementation of BULLETTRAX

During phase one of the proposed project, the BULLETTRAX system will be validated. Verification that the BULLETTRAX system is functioning properly must occur before using it on casework. The Principal Supervisor will develop the validation plan and assign staff to participate in the validation study. A set number of 9mm Beretta bullets will be imaged into the BULLETTRAX system. Additional test bullets will be imaged into the system and searched against the database to verify the matching capability of the BULLETTRAX system. Assigned staff will write up the results of the validation study and submit it to the Principal Supervisor for approval, then to the laboratory's Quality Assurance Unit prior to implementation of the BULLETTRAX system for casework in the LAPD crime lab. The validation is expected to show that the BULLETTRAX system is capable of matching bullets that were fired from the same firearm. Previously published validation studies can be used by reference to reduce the work needed to satisfy requirements needed by other laboratories to implement a new method or instrument. The results of the LAPD validation study will be presented at the California Association of Criminalists (CAC) bi-annual seminar and made available to any California forensic firearms laboratory upon request so that they would not need to undergo as of a lengthy

The validation and implementation of the BULLETTRAX system will improve and expand the quality and timeliness of forensic science services by bringing a new technology online and bolstering the screening capabilities of the Crossfire Detail. As a result the efficiency and output capacity of the Comparison Detail will increase by as much as 20%. All FAU staff members will receive training on the BULLETTRAX system prior to the grant period, thus, enabling them to be capable of performing imaging and correlation on crimes where revolvers were used.

Following validation, the FAU will image and correlate .38 and .357 caliber evidence bullets from major crimes where a revolver is suspected (and no cartridge cases are available) and test-fired bullets from all .38 and .357 caliber revolvers received by the Crossfire Detail. This will help build the NIBIN bullet database. Any potential links that are identified through BULLETTRAX will ultimately be verified through full microscopic analysis, if requested by the investigating officers. Investigative links provided to detectives in a timely manner, have the potential to redirect investigative resources to other linked crimes where other transient evidence such as surveillance video, cell phone intelligence or witnesses can solve the crime. In these instances, the microscopic verification of the BULLETTRAX link may never be needed from the laboratory. In the LAPD experience, it is the timeliness of the link information that is most critical to the investigation and only a fraction (less than 20%) require microscopic verification of the link.

In addition, the BULLETTRAX system will be available to all southern California region crime laboratories, allowing the database to grow with their entries as well as those made by LAPD staff.

Any forensic database is only as useful as its data allows and networking the BULLETTRAX system to include bullet evidence from surrounding jurisdictions only strengthens the use of the resource. For example, the LAPD is currently investigating an eight-crime interagency BRASSTRAX linkage that will end a semi-automatic crime spree that has terrorized at least three separate communities. It is anticipated that BULLETTRAX will also provide expedited analyses of bullet evidence leading to potential links between cases involving revolvers in Los Angeles and other participating jurisdictions.

The BULLETTRAX automated acquisition will take approximately 20 minutes to image each bullet and one hour for a database search. Therefore, the BULLETTRAX system is likely to reduce analysis and search time by up to 50%, as compared to a full microscopic comparison. A typical case contains two or more bullets. Using an estimate of three hours to image and correlate each case with BULLETTRAX, it is anticipated that the FAU can image and correlate 78 cases during regular work hours and 156 cases using the 468 overtime hours allocated during this grant period.

Cases will be tracked by the Principal Supervisor in a computer database. Overtime reports will be submitted by staff as the overtime is worked and this will be tracked in the overtime database. The Project Manager will gather data from the Principal Supervisor and provide progress reports to the Grant Administrator as scheduled.

Overtime for Microscopic Comparison

Reducing and preventing an increase in backlog for microscopic comparison cases while the

BULLETTRAX implementation project is ongoing will be achieved most efficiently by providing overtime to trained staff. The FAU estimates that it takes an average of 18 hours to fully analyze each case. Therefore, it is estimated that the FAU can close out 82 cases in the 1,482 overtime hours allocated during this grant period (\$117,078 in grant budgeted overtime /\$79 hourly overtime rate = 1,482 hours/18 hours per case = 82 cases).

The first phase will implement the BULLETTRAX system. The Project Director, Chief Forensic Chemist (CFC) over the FAU, will assign the Principal Supervisor. The Principal Supervisor will review and record the initial Laboratory Information Management System (LIMS) backlog data, set up the database for overtime entry and monitoring, and develop a detailed plan to assess the project progress, documenting and tracking the number of backlogged cases, number of completed cases, turn-around times and recording specific improvements in quality or timeliness. The Principal Supervisor will assign cases to the eligible firearm examiners.

The second phase will consist of FAU analysts performing microscopic comparison casework. Cases will be completed following the laboratory's quality process, including technical and administrative review. Cases will be tracked by the Principal Supervisor in a computer database. Overtime reports will be submitted by staff as the overtime is worked and this will be tracked in the overtime database.

The Project Manager will gather data from the Principal Supervisor and various databases, and provide progress reports to the Grant Administrator quarterly.

Possible Pitfalls

Possible pitfalls of bringing a new service such as BULLETTRAX online include an increase in

the number of new requests for analysis due to the capabilities of this new technology. This may result in a higher workload and possible backlog for this particular screening tool. If a backlog in BULLETTRAX does occur, staff in the FAU can be re-assigned to target the specific area with the higher backlog. Additionally, the crime scene responsibilities and other duties of the FAU members can create a gap in staffing and increased backlog. FAU members receive specialized field response training to handle firearms related crime scenes and, as a result, when they are tasked with crime scene response on an emergent basis, they are not available to complete casework in the laboratory which can also result in an increase in the backlog.

III. Capabilities and Competencies

The FAU demonstrated its capability to implement a federal grant in 2012-13 when the California Governor's Office of Emergency Services (Cal OES) Coverdell Grant funds were used for overtime and the FAU reduced the Unit's total backlog from 832 to 464 requests. Additionally, the oldest request date was improved from 2006 to 2012 as of March 2014. This was accomplished by re-organizing staff assignments to target the areas with the highest backlog (NIBIN correlation) and eliminating non-viable requests. Operating at 80% of its authorized staff positions, the FAU is able to maintain the current workload level by completing the same number of cases as it receives each month. The availability of additional grant funding for overtime will significantly enhance the Unit's ability to implement the new BULLETTRAX technology which has the potential to significantly reduce bullet comparisons and to reduce and prevent any potential increase in backlog.

A portion of the funds secured from this grant will support employees in the Crossfire Detail to

perform imaging and correlation of bullets into the BULLETTRAX system. The Crossfire Detail is staffed with civilian and sworn experts technically trained in the NIBIN system. Furthermore, a portion of the funds secured from this grant will support employees in the Comparison Detail to perform microscopic examinations to compare fired ammunition components (i.e., cartridge cases, shot-shells, bullets, or projectiles) or live ammunition, either as submitted evidence or as exemplars generated from test firing or cycling, to identify or eliminate a specific firearm's association with an incident or to determine the number of firearms involved in an incident. The FAU's Comparison Detail is staffed with civilian experts technically trained in one or more forensic disciplines. They have scientific educational backgrounds and have received specialized training in the various disciplines that they have worked. The Program Director and the Principal Supervisor are civilian experts technically trained in one or more forensic disciplines and have scientific educational backgrounds. They have received specialized training in the various disciplines that they have worked and have received additional training in supervision and leadership. They have many years of experience managing previous federal grants that have been awarded.

The Program Director will:

- Oversee and coordinate the project on a monthly basis
- Monitor backlog reduction
- Organize schedules
- Distribute the allocation of overtime funds
- Provide progress reports to the Grant program administrator as required

The Principal Supervisor will:

- Create and maintain the budget database
- Assign cases to eligible firearm examiners
- Track the overtime balance during the project
- Conduct a monthly review of the LIMS backlog data
- Track the flow of current cases and backlog cases throughout the year.
- Review the finished work product of the analyst/examiners by completing a technical and administrative review of case packages
- Direct, review and approve the Validation Study and ensure that it is presented at the CAC seminar

The LAPD has significant experience successfully managing federal grants. The LAPD has been awarded and successfully managed grants ranging from \$100,000 to \$2,000,000 from various federal entities including, NIJ, FEMA and BJA. The LAPD has also worked extensively with our partners in the Mayor's Office and other city agencies managing Department of Homeland Security grant funding, most recently helping to administer a \$30,000,000 Securing the Cities grant. The LAPD Grants Unit consists of a supervisor, a grant writer and nine grant managers to oversee and report on over 30 active grants.

IV. Impact/Outcomes and Evaluation/Plan for Collecting Data Improvement in quality and timeliness of forensic science services

In 2013, the FAU processed approximately 3,800 guns into the NIBIN system and 650 crime scene cartridge case specimens were imaged and searched against the NIBIN database. The FAU reported over 200 NIBIN Cold Hits to investigators many of which helped to solve previously

unrelated crimes. Of the firearms submitted to the laboratory, approximately 1,200 were identified as revolvers and were not imaged into the NIBIN system. In this proposal, these guns would be imaged by the BULLETTRAX system, enabling the system to identify potential links between cases that previously required an in-depth microscopic comparison

Anticipated Impact of Eligible Project Activities

The two-prong approach is designed to use grant funded overtime to validate and implement the BULLETTRAX system and prevent an increase in the backlog of firearms requests. The implementation of BULLETTRAX will provide a valuable resource enabling the LAPD and other law enforcement agencies to more efficiently analyze and share bullet evidence. This will result in a more timely turn-around for bullet comparison cases.

Plan for Collection of Performance Measure Data

The overall goal of the FAU is to improve the quality and timeliness of forensic services and reduce the number of backlogged cases through the use of the 2014 Paul Coverdell Grant Program. To track the progress of reaching this goal, the following performance measures will be monitored by the Project Director:

- A weekly review of LIMS backlog data by Principal Supervisor to track backlog reduction, oldest request date improvement and adjust overtime scheduling as necessary.
- A review of data collected by the Principal Supervisor, such as individual statistics of how many cases were processed weekly and how that affected the backlog reduction effort.
- Average turn-around time for completed casework

• Effect of BULLETTRAX results on microscopic comparison casework backlog.

The FAU uses a Laboratory Information Management System (LIMS) to record lab activities, dates and specimen transactions, services performed, FAU personnel involved, and other statistical information throughout the entire Crime Lab. LIMS data is stored on the Local Area network that is checked for integrity and backed up daily. LIMS information will be maintained for at least ten years.

Cost Effectiveness of In-House Analysis

A cost comparison between outsourcing this work or performing the work in-house was completed. It was estimated that it would cost \$1,700 per average firearms case for outsourcing. The same analysis performed in-house would take approximately 18 hours at the Criminalist overtime rate of \$79 per hour, totaling \$1,422. For the projected 82 cases to be completed with grant funding, performing in-house analysis will save \$22,796 as compared with the outsource option for cases requiring microscopic comparison.

Attempts to reduce the total cost of the project

- No outside contractors or consultants are necessary or will be used to complete this project. The LAPD determined it more cost-effective and more sustainable to do it in-house.
- All funds will be managed by LAPD.
- Any laboratory equipment or supplies that need to be purchased for this project will be paid by the LAPD. All administrative supply costs will be covered by the LAPD.
- No Computerization or renovation/construction of facilities will be needed for this project.

Firearm Analysis Unit BULLETTRAX Implementation and Backlog Containment BUDGET NARRATIVE

A. Personnel

The Los Angeles Police Department (LAPD) will allocate \$148,434 in overtime costs for nineteen experienced firearms examiners and nine police officers. The nineteen examiners are anticipated to work 1.5 hours of overtime each week for 52 weeks at a rate of \$79/hour for a total of \$117,078 in overtime costs. The nine police officers are anticipated to work one hour of overtime each week for 52 weeks at a rate of \$67/hour for a total of \$31,356 in overtime costs. The nine police officers will validate and implement the BULLETTRAX system and begin building a functional database. The nineteen experienced firearms examiners will primarily perform comparison casework to suppress the Firearm Analysis Unit (FAU) backlog, but will also assist in the validation and implementation of the BULLETTRAX system. These grant funds will enable the FAU to process approximately 234 cases through the BULLETTRAX system and process an additional 82 comparison cases during this grant period, making significant progress in suppressing the current backlog while simultaneously bringing a new technology online in Southern California. BULLETTRAX will facilitate screening of submitted bullet evidence and identification of potential associations between previously unrelated crimes using revolvers.

The Los Angeles Police Department (LAPD) is seeking funding for \$14,258.45 to offset a portion of the salary for two staff members managing this project. A reasonable and conservative projection of the percent devoted to the project was used to determine the

amount of time spent on the project. A Chief Forensic Chemist I will serve as the Program Director and in that capacity perform the laboratory administrative functions of monitoring responsibilities of subordinates and monitoring compliance with overtime policies, requirements and schedules. The cost of \$1,709.55 is based on the Chief Forensic Chemist's annual salary of \$136,764 and this project will command 1.25 percent Full Time Equivalent (FTE) of her time for one year. \$136,764 x .0125 FTE = \$1,709.55. A Supervising Criminalist will serve as the Principal Supervisor who will direct, review and approve the BULLETTRAX Validation Study, track the overtime balance during the project, conduct a monthly review of the LIMS backlog data, assign cases to eligible firearm examiners, track flow of cases throughout the year, and review the finished work product of the Firearm examiners by completing a technical and administrative review of case packages. The cost of \$12,548.90 is based on an annual salary of \$125,489 and this project will command 10 percent Full Time Equivalent (FTE) of her time for one year. $125,489 \times 10$ FTE = 12,548.90. Total personnel costs are 1,709.55 + 12,548.90 + 117,078 + 31,356 = 162,692.45.

B. Fringe Benefits

Fringe benefits are calculated at a rate of 44.10% of personnel costs for the Chief Forensic Chemist I and the Supervising Criminalist. This rate is based on the Cost Allocation Plan 34 that is currently approved by the U.S. Department of Health and Human Services under contract with the City of Los Angeles' cognizant federal agency, the U.S. Department of Housing and Urban Development. The fringe benefits were calculated using the below charts which are the currently

approved Cost Allocation Plan 34-approved by the federal government.
