DISCUSSION

The donation is for the benefit of the Los Angeles Police Department (Department or LAPD). The donation will fund Year-2 maintenance, licensing and cloud storage for 860 body-worn cameras. The City plans to cover the costs for Years 3 through 5. The cameras were deployed to three LAPD divisions: Mission, Newton and Central Traffic, and three specialized units within Central Area. The deployment was completed in September 2015, and as of October 14, 2015, 37,000 videos had been captured on the body-worn cameras. This will assist officers in providing accurate depictions of events for courtroom presentation, capturing potentially incriminating statements from suspects, documenting and reviewing statements from victims and witnesses, and obtaining actual time frames of events for reporting purposes.

The total cost of the Year-2 maintenance for the cameras is \$769,734.00. The LAPF has previously allocated \$306,097.00 for this request from prior grants, leaving \$463,637.00 to be funded from the LAPF general fund.

Chief Information Officer Maggie Goodrich, Information Technology Bureau, has approved the purchase and use of the body-worn cameras for the Department. The body-worn cameras are covered with a one-year warranty for maintenance.

The Department is requesting funding for maintenance, licensing, and cloud storage for 860 body-worn cameras. In December 2014, the Los Angeles Police Foundation (LAPF) donated 860 body-worn cameras to the Los Angeles Police Department (LAPD). This request will fund year-2 maintenance, licensing and storage for those cameras. The City plans to cover the costs for years 3 through 5. The 860 cameras were deployed to three LAPD divisions: Mission, Newton and Central Traffic, as well as three specialized units within Central Area. That deployment was completed in September 2015. To date, the LAPD has captured approximately 37,000 videos on the body-worn cameras.

Body-worn cameras have proven to be an effective tool in documenting duty related activity. These systems are a powerful tool that contribute significantly to officer safety, provide evidence for criminal prosecutions, resolve biased policing complaints, and foster positive relations with the community.

Police agencies using this technology say the videos can provide valuable evidence in court and a clear record of the actions of officers. A University of Cambridge study found that when police officers in Rialto, California were equipped with and required to wear body cameras, complaints against officers fell by 88 percent and the use of force dropped by almost 60 percent. In addition, the International Association of Chiefs of Police recently published a position paper endorsing body-worn cameras. The paper found that this technology has the potential to revolutionize police work, hold officers accountable for their actions and increase community trust in the agency.

The total cost of the Year 2 maintenance for the cameras is \$769,734. The LAPF has previously allocated \$306,097 for this request from prior grants, leaving \$463,637 to be funded from the LAPF general fund.

What objectives will be accomplished if the funding is granted?

- ❖ Technological advancement in the way police interactions are documented;
- ❖ A method in which to resolve potentially controversial encounters;
- ❖ Increase officer safety; and
- ❖ Quicker resolution of complaints filed against Officers and the Department.

How many officers will be impacted with this grant?

Approximately 860 body-worn camera units will be maintained with this grant.

How will the community be impacted by this grant?

Body-worn video will foster positive relations with the community and improve trust in the Department. The body-worn cameras will be able to relay the happenings surrounding an incident in an accurate and timely manner.

Describe the short term outcome and long term impact you anticipate within the Department and in the community it serves as results of this grant?

It is expected that this technology will facilitate investigations by providing actual footage of incidents that will provide valuable evidence in court. In the long-term, it is anticipated that the body-worn cameras will help decrease complaints against officers. It is also anticipated the transparency the cameras afford will strengthen the community's trust in the Department.

How can the Foundation evaluate success if the funding is granted? (# of people served, objectives reached, surveys, etc.)

The foundation can evaluate the success of this technology by the Department's progress in the following areas:

- ❖ Quicker resolution of complaints filed against Officers and the Department; and
- ❖ Increase in criminal prosecutions.


