SUBJECT: REPORT ON COUNCIL FILE 15-1022-S2 REGARDING ONLINE VOTING AND NEIGHBORHOOD COUNCIL ELECTIONS TIMING

Honorable Members:

SUMMARY

The Department of Neighborhood Empowerment (EmpowerLA) and the Office of the City Clerk have been funded to conduct the outreach and elections respectively for the 2018 Neighborhood Council elections without online voting. Because Neighborhood Council elections must be realigned to odd-numbered years and because the issue of online voting, stakeholder definition, voting age and board structures are still pending before City Council, EmpowerLA recommends that the 2018 Neighborhood Council elections be pushed to the spring of 2019 instead and that the affected board member terms be extended accordingly.

If Neighborhood Council elections are to be held as scheduled in 2018, then EmpowerLA requests additional funding in the amount of \$288,000 to conduct citywide Neighborhood Council election outreach. In addition, EmpowerLA requests that the option of online voting for the 2018 elections be offered to the 50 Neighborhood Councils, whose voting registration and online voting platforms have already been built, at the cost of \$3800 per Neighborhood Council plus \$58,950 for 24 Hour Helpdesk services. If the opt-in online voting option is provided to these Neighborhood Councils, then the Office of the City Clerk would require additional funding in the amount of \$200,000. The total requested is \$681,950. A potential source of funding

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could be the approximately \$570,000 in unused Neighborhood Council funds from Fiscal Year 2016-2017.

RECOMMENDATIONS

EmpowerLA recommends that the City Council adopt the following recommendation to move the 2018 Neighborhood Council elections to 2019 instead:

• Instruct the Office of the City Attorney to make the necessary ordinance changes to have EmpowerLA of Neighborhood Empowerment and the Office of the City Clerk conduct the Neighborhood Council elections in 2019 instead of 2018. Any Neighborhood Council election funding this fiscal year shall be directed towards building the remaining online voter registration and voting platform for the Neighborhood Councils and for an election outreach and voter registration campaign in 2018. Any affected Neighborhood Council board member term shall be extended until the certification of the Neighborhood Council elections in 2019.

If Neighborhood Council elections are administered in 2018 as scheduled, then EmpowerLA recommends that the City Council adopt the following recommendations:

- 1. Instruct the Department of Neighborhood Empowerment and Office of the City Clerk to make online voting an option available for the Neighborhood Councils whose online voting platforms are already built out at a cost of no more than \$3800 per Neighborhood Council to be paid by the City, or if funds are not available, by the Neighborhood Council.
- 2. Instruct the Office of the City Administrative Officer to identify \$681,950 in funding for the following outreach and inclusion of an opt-in online voting platform this current year to begin as soon as possible:
 - a. EmpowerLA Election Outreach Total \$288,000
 - i. Printing and Binding \$99,000
 - ii. As-Needed Staffing \$139,000 (2 Project Coordinators and 1 Project Assistant)
 - iii. Office and Admin \$50,000
 - b. City Clerk Online Voting Administration Total \$200,000
 - i. As-Needed Staffing \$132,562.00 (1 Principal Election Clerk and 3 Senior Election Clerks)
 - ii. At-Poll Voting and Registration Hardware \$67,474.00
 - c. EmpowerLA Online Voting Opt-In Cost Total \$248,950
 - i. Activate Existing Online Voting/Voter Registration \$3800/Neighborhood Council x 50 = \$190,000
 - ii. Everyone Counts 24 Hour Helpdesk \$58,950

3. Instruct the Office of the City Attorney to make the necessary ordinance changes to have the Department of Neighborhood Empowerment and the Office of the City Clerk conduct the Neighborhood Council elections currently scheduled for 2020 to be held in 2021. Any affected Neighborhood Council board member term set to end in 2020 shall be extended until the certification of the Neighborhood Council elections in 2021.

MOVING NEIGHBORHOOD COUNCIL ELECTIONS FROM EVEN TO ODD YEARS

With municipal elections moving to even numbered years beginning in 2020, the Office of the City Clerk will have to also move the administration of Neighborhood Council elections from even to odd years. EmpowerLA sent out Neighborhood Council Resolution forms on the timing of the elections to Neighborhood Councils on March 1, 2017 requesting Neighborhood Councils to vote on 4 options. Of the 96 Neighborhood Councils that received the form, 25 took action with the following results:

 Conduct 2018 Neighborhood Council elections as scheduled. Board members would have 3 year terms. For boards with staggered terms, this would also require the term extension of board seats ending in 2020 by one year for 2021 elections at which time the entire board would be up and would have to restagger with 2 and 4 year terms per the Neighborhood Council's decision.

EmpowerLA is in favor of extending current terms of all board members by 1 year and moving the 2018 elections to 2019 for the following reasons:

1. EmpowerLA was funded \$106,200 of the originally requested \$394,200 to conduct a citywide Neighborhood Council outreach campaign elections this fiscal year. During post 2016 Neighborhood Council election townhalls, a significant amount of the feedback from Neighborhood Councils was for EmpowerLA to take on a more robust outreach campaign, particularly for candidates. Without the additional funding, EmpowerLA will not be able to provide much assistance for election outreach citywide. Further, because EmpowerLA did not receive the requested funds for election outreach from the January

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- 17, 2017 report for this Council File to start election outreach preparations in March 2017 for the Valley election regions, EmpowerLA is already behind in preparing an election outreach campaign that will benefit the Valley Neighborhood Councils because their candidate filing opens in December 2017. The additional funding requested if elections are held in 2018 is to hire more staff to assist in executing a print, social media and radio campaign for election outreach and to assist existing EmpowerLA staff to coordinate Neighborhood Councils with their election efforts. As needed staffing for 2 Project Coordinators and a Project Assistant would be \$139,000 with an additional \$99,000 for printing and binding and \$50,000 in Office and Administrative for banners, print materials, bus benches/shelters, social media/radio campaigns and other outreach efforts as suggested by Neighborhood Councils for their region, which must begin as soon as possible for the Valley Neighborhood Councils to benefit from the campaign.
- 2. Discussion and action on EmpowerLA recommendations for Neighborhood Council elections and online voting from the January 17, 2017 report is also pending, which would affect major elements of Neighborhood Council elections: availability of online voting, suggested voter age of 16 years old citywide, number of ballot types, stakeholder determination via self-affirmation or documentation and mandatory amounts for election funding from Neighborhood Councils. In addition, discussion and action on EmpowerLA's February 28, 2017 report for Council File 04-1935-S1 on improving the voting environment is still pending, which would require an ordinance change for the Office of the City Clerk to take over election challenges as planned. The Board of Neighborhood Commissioners is also waiting for the authority to further define the terms "substantial and ongoing" for Community Interest Stakeholders. Because all of the aforementioned issues have a significant impact on Neighborhood Council elections and have been issues in past Neighborhood Council elections, they should be resolved before conducting Neighborhood Council elections again. Since preparations for the elections have already started, meaningful discussions on these matters would likely be rushed in order to meet the election deadlines for this year.

If elections are pushed to 2019, EmpowerLA will utilize the funds provided this year to begin creating an election outreach campaign starting in March of 2018 in order to be ready for the Valley election regions in 2019 and to begin registering voters for online voting if the City Council continues to provide this option for Neighborhood Council elections.

The Office of the City Clerk has been funded to conduct the 2018 Neighborhood Council elections and preparations have begun this fiscal year. Likewise, if elections are postponed until 2019, the Office of the City Clerk will work with EmpowerLA, the Board of Neighborhood Commissions, Neighborhood Councils, and the City Attorney's Office to resolve the aforementioned issues. The funding provided to the Office of the City Clerk to conduct the elections for this year could either be held for the 2019 elections, or, ideally, be used to continue the build out of the remaining Neighborhood Councils' online voting and voter registration

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platforms this fiscal year. In addition, directing some of the funding to Neighborhood Council voter registration is particularly important to build the voter database for 2019.

Please note that the Office of the City Clerk does not support conducting back-to-back elections in 2018 and 2019 as there will be little to no time between elections for the Office of the City Clerk, Neighborhood Councils, and possibly the online voting vendor to effectively gather Neighborhood Council and stakeholder feedback to make the necessary adjustments that normally take place in non-election years. These adjustments can include individual Neighborhood Council bylaw amendments affecting board structure and other election-related provisions, revisions to citywide election policies, which should be based on Neighborhood Council and stakeholder input, and any necessary changes to the online voting platforms, including the addition of new Neighborhood Councils to the online voting roster.

ONLINE VOTING FOR 2018 NEIGHBORHOOD COUNCIL ELECTIONS

If the Neighborhood Council elections are held in 2018, EmpowerLA recommends that the option of online voting be offered to the 50 Neighborhood Councils that have their voter registration and online voting platforms built out already. See Attachment B for the 50 Neighborhood Councils with Online Voting. Because of the shortened time frame for election preparation this fiscal year and because of the time it takes to build out each Neighborhood Council's online voting and voter registration platform, EmpowerLA and the Office of the City Clerk would not have the ability to offer online voting to additional Neighborhood Councils not in the original 50.

The potential of online voting and voter registration to engage more stakeholders in Neighborhood Council elections was clear in the 2016 pilot as noted in the January 17, 2017 report and confirmed in the subdivision election for Skid Row Neighborhood Council this year where 1,388 votes were cast online out of a total of 1,592. The Neighborhood Councils from the original pilot and the subsequent 15 that were built out, should be able to offer online voting for their stakeholders, especially if the stakeholders are already in the database from 2016. Absent any changes to board structures and voting procedures, Neighborhood Councils from the pilot will be able to send emails to their voters from 2016 to offer them the opportunity to vote online without further documentation of their stakeholder status if they confirm no changes.

The cost to provide this ability to opt-in for online voting will be \$3,800 per Neighborhood Council and \$58,950 to activate Everyone Counts' 24 Hour Helpdesk, which was invaluable during the 2016 online voting pilot to address voter questions. The Helpdesk cost is the same whether one or 50 Neighborhood Councils opt-in for online voting in 2018. EmpowerLA recommends that the City set aside funds to pay for the Helpdesk and the \$3,800 online voting/voter registration for any of the 50 Neighborhood Councils that opt-in for online voting. If funding must be prioritized, then the City should cover the cost of the Helpdesk and then ask Neighborhood Councils to pay for \$3,800 online voting/voter registration activation as part of their election outreach budget.

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In addition, the Office of the City Clerk requires additional funding to implement opt-in online voting for Neighborhood Councils in 2018. While the online voting and voter registration platforms have been created for Neighborhood Councils, the process of activation still takes staff investment to review and conduct logic and accuracy testing with the vendor for each of the Neighborhood Council elections.

To effectively administer an online election, the Office of the City Clerk will require 4 additional as-needed staff members to assist with the development and implementation of the stakeholder registration process with existing staff. Four of these staff members (1 Principal Election Clerk and 2 Senior Election Clerks) will be responsible for processing all stakeholder registrations, which will include, but not be limited to, reviewing and approving online stakeholder registration applications and resolving registration issues with voters. Staff will also contact stakeholders who previously registered to vote online for the 2016 Neighborhood Council Elections and verify that they are still eligible to vote. An additional staff member (1 Senior Election Clerk) will be required to help validate that each online election is set-up correctly. This includes assisting with online ballot development and conducting Logic and Accuracy tests prior to online voting periods This staff member will also be needed to set-up, test, monitor the required hardware necessary to conduct an online election at a polling place. The Office of the City Clerk would require additional funding in the amount of \$132,526.00 to secure these staff members.

Further, the Office of the City Clerk will require updated hardware (tablets, laptops, and identification scanners) for at-poll registration and voting. These devices will allow stakeholders, both registered and non-registered, who have voted online prior to Election Day, to check-in at the polls, receive a PIN number and cast a digital ballot. The identification scanners, a feature not available in the 2016 online Neighborhood Council elections, would be used to scan driver's licenses to expedite the registration process and quickly establish what ballots a voter is entitled to vote on. The Office of the City Clerk would require additional funding in the amount of \$67,474.00 to implement these features.

Online Voting and Voter Registration Security Issues

As noted in EmpowerLA's January 17, 2017 election report, during the 2016 election cycle, an EmpowerLA election staff member released data from EmpowerLA's QuickBase voter registration platform via an internal staff document to candidates of the Studio City Neighborhood Council elections. This data included some of the documents that the voters had submitted as part of the qualification process, which had not yet been deleted per the election procedures. This breach was the result of a human error in access and operations, a situation that was addressed when EmpowerLA implemented the Everyone Counts voter registration platform, which does not allow for such staff mistakes.

The Everyone Counts voter registration platform was used during the recent Skid Row Neighborhood Council subdivision election. Voters would register and submit their

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documentation online. Each night, the vendor would batch the incoming registrations and move the data to a shared server so that EmpowerLA election staff could verify the registrations. Upon verification, the staff would delete verification documents, and the vendor would retrieve the verifications, issuing the usernames and passwords to the voters. The new platform and process prevented staff from accessing and releasing voter registration data because it created a firewall between voter data and public release or access. No breaches in voter information occurred.

It should be noted that in future elections only the Office of the City Clerk's election staff and Everyone Counts staff will have access to the voter information stored in the online voter registration system. Currently, anyone requesting access to stakeholder registration information may only have access to the voter's name and what ballot(s) they were issued. Personal information, including home addresses, phone numbers, birth dates, signatures, and email addresses are withheld by staff when fulfilling public records requests.

The Office of the City Clerk will work with the City Attorney's Office and Everyone Counts to strengthen the current Neighborhood Council public records policy to ensure that voter data is protected, and data breaches are prevented.

CONCLUSION

EmpowerLA and Office of the City Clerk respectively request that any decisions that would affect the administration of the 2018 elections as scheduled, aside from moving the elections to 2019, be made by mid-August 2017 because of the time it will take to implement them effectively.

GENERAL BOARD SPECIAL MEETING MINUTES

April 27, 2017, 8:30 PM



☑ Other recommendation:

The Los Feliz Neighborhood Council voted at our June 20, 2017 meeting in support of a different approach than any of those presented in the above multiple choice selections. As a board with staggered four-year terms, none of the above multiple choice selections fit well within our elections schedule, although we have voted in support of an option that would have elections in both 2018 and 2019, with some additional notes that we wish to make known to the Department of Neighborhood Empowerment and the Office of the City Clerk as your offices determine the appropriate next steps.

First, we request that, should the City opt to require elections in two successive years, that the City also will ensure that neighborhood councils will be provided with additional funds in 2019 to address the added burden of two years in a row of election-related outreach that is paid from neighborhood council funds. For the Los Feliz Neighborhood Council, our most recent election in 2016, which generated the highest number of candidates for our board and which has since resulted in a much stronger turnout at board and committee meetings, came at an expense of nearly \$10,000. All of this was paid from our council's annual budget from the City. Having to deploy these resources to elections two years in a row severely hampers our council's ability to engage with the community around the myriad other issues of concern that are the primary focus of our day-to-day operations and outreach.

Second, we request that, in this order:

- (1) Our 2018 election be a standard election for the year, with 9 of our 19 seats up for a vote, including one seat from each of our five districts and all four of our neighborhood-wide community interest seats;
- (2) Our 2019 election be what would have been the standard election for the 2020 year, thus shortening the four-year terms of our board elected in 2016 by one year;
- (3) Our 2021 election be what would have been the standard election for the 2022 year, thus shortening the four-year terms of our board elected in 2018 by one year.

We request this ordering because we have found that the staggering of our board member terms has resulted in a much stronger board and greater continuity over time. The options presented in the multiple choice selections would, in most cases, require a vote on all seats on the board, with subsequent elections then halving some board terms while leaving the rest untouched. We believe this approach would unnecessarily undermine the ability of our board to conduct its business, and thus we request the above approach.

Re: Neighborhood Council Election Cycles

Dear Ms. Liu:

We are in receipt of a request for the Los Feliz Neighborhood Council (LFNC) to formally adopt a resolution recommending a course of action on how our biennial election cycles must be altered to accommodate the City Clerk's reconfiguration of its timetable for conducting other elections.

As you're aware, we have undergone similar election timetable changes in the past (2008 & 2012), and are cognizant of the many other formal adjustments (bylaws, rules, policies, etc.) that must also be facilitated to effectively accommodate any such election related change.

When the Los Angeles City Council voted to extend the terms of half its members in order to align L.A.'s municipal election cycle with those of federal and state officials, the incumbent council members who might have potentially received extended terms had to first prevail in a general election, with the understanding their terms would be longer than the requisite four years.

You're now asking Neighborhood Council boardmembers to potentially vote to extend their *own* terms without the benefit of a general election. While some may see this as a matter of incumbent boardmember preference and paperwork modifications, we do not. Careful consideration must be given, and it should be done with transparency and by methods where not even the appearance of impropriety or individual self-serving motivations could be called into question.

To accomplish this, we must formulate a plan that contemplates the staggered election structure of our Governing Board, our four-year boardmember terms,

adhering to the constraints of a new fixed election schedule held in odd-numbered years (after 2018), and how to engage the public in such a discussion and decision. Add to this that we still do not know whether there will be a formal policy mandated upon us requiring the use of online voting.

DONE's decision timetable is incongruent with the realities of administrating the monthly business of our neighborhood council, nor were we consulted on what sort of timing was realistic for the task at hand. LFNC coming to consensus on this decision may very well require the convening of a special meeting.

Taking into account our regular monthly meeting schedule, and given our recent agenda loads, we were given what essentially amounts to two meetings worth of notice near the fiscal year's end. We are writing to advise you we are actively engaged in addressing this concern, and will apprise you and others as to what we resolve as soon as possible.

We do not want to have a "default" decision mandated upon our stakeholders and ourselves by whoever has the authority to do so, who is likely to have limited understanding of mechanics of our governing board and the expectations of the stakeholders we represent.

Thank you for your consideration in this matter. The courtesy of a written reply is appreciated.

Description:

The attached document was received from Valley Alliance of Neighborhood Councils (VANC). Conflicts between the municipal elections and NC elections in 2020 have prompted the City Clerk's office to request NC's to discuss and complete a resolution during the March and April meetings to select one of three options to avoid this conflict. The intent is to shift all even-year elections to odd years while maintaining a staggered election schedule:

Option 1 - Conduct the 2018 NC elections as scheduled, extend all terms to 2021, and then conduct an election for all the Board members in 2021, and then the Board would have to re-stagger with 2-year and 4-year terms.

Option 2.A - Extend the terms ending in 2018 by 1 year and conduct their election in 2019. These board seats would then be up for election in 2023, 2027, etc. Then, extend the terms currently ending in 2020 by 1 year and conduct their election 2021. These seats would then be up for election in 2025, 2029, etc.

Option 2.B - Extend the terms ending in 2018 by 1 year and reduce the terms ending in 2020 by 1 year. This will result in a full-board election in 2019, which will then require the seats to be re-staggered with 2-year and 4-year terms.

Dear President Shaffer, President Wesson and Councilman Krekorian:

At the February 22 meeting of Neighborhood Council Valley Village (NCVV), our Board held a robust and lengthy discussion about proposed changes to the NC election process, detailed in the Department of Neighborhood Empowerment Election Report Summary and referenced in Council File 15-1022-S2.

Our Board members thoroughly reviewed each recommendation, and engaged input from stakeholders who were present at Board and committee meetings. A separate vote was taken on each recommendation, and the Board added a sixth two-part recommendation that is unique to Valley Village and to our election "region".

The BONC recommendations and our Board's position on each are:

1. Voters may use any form of identification and may self-affirm their affiliation without any further documentation.

Our Board voted unanimously against this recommendation (13-0-0). We feel strongly that identification and proof of stakeholder status is important to the integrity of the election, and it has served our stakeholders well without creating any barrier to voter participation. The Board also strongly held the opinion (13-0-0) that online voting should not be mandatory but left up to each individual NC as they best know the successful methods of community engagement among their stakeholders.

2. Voter age be lowered to 16 years old where applicable.

Our Board voted unanimously against this recommendation (13-0-0). The discussion on this matter was led by our Student Board member, Cole Walker. Our bylaws allow for up to 2 student Board members who participate in all aspects of our Board's work. While their votes do not count toward a quorum, they are noted in our minutes. We provide a great "laboratory" for students to participate in every aspect of local government, and have successfully had 5 student Board members in our Board history, each serving a two-year term. We feel strongly that allowing the voting age to revert to 16, without

eligibility for a Board seat, is not appropriate. Board service for a student would be difficult. Our Board members are required to attend 11 Board meetings per year, serve on at least one Board committee, participate in one all-day retreat, and physically support our 3 annual signature events. The monthly time demands on our Board members are easily 10+ hours, most on week nights.

Board service would be particularly challenging for a student, as Juniors and Seniors do not typically have time to participate at levels required in our bylaws. What we provide in our NCVV student seat is a valuable learning experience that could/should be a template for other NCs. We feel very strongly that the voting age should remain at 18 years of age, and that a well-managed student Board seat can help integrate young people into the civics of city and neighborhood governance, and serve the dual purpose of grooming future Board members.

- 3. There should be a maximum of 3 ballot types for every Neighborhood Council election.

 NCVV's Board of Directors voted unanimously to support this (13-0-0), and further encourages BONC and DONE to find a way to develop a balloting system that can incorporate small NCs such as Valley Village, which has one ballot allowing stakeholders to vote in all categories listed, as well as the larger NCs which ascribe to multiple district voting within their boundaries. The latter approach tends to be confusing to stakeholders and much more difficult to administer.
- 4. EmpowerLA will ask for funds to expand election outreach so that existing Board members aren't expected to do extensive outreach to find people to run against them.

 NCVV's Board of Directors voted unanimously to support this (13-0-0). We wholeheartedly support this proposal and it has been recommended several times over various election cycles. Empower LA can play a positive role in promoting outreach at the Regional level; developing a full scale PR campaign to educate voters at each step of the process; i.e., announcing each regional election, the call for candidates, candidate forums, and election day information. The NCs could then concentrate on engaging voters and providing the detailed information relevant to each NC.
- 5. In an election year NCs should set aside 20% of their funding for election outreach notification and costs.

NCVV's Board of Directors voted unanimously against this recommendation (13-0-0). While our own NC does spend approximately 20% of our funding in election years on the election process, we are not in favor of establishing a 20% mandatory allocation. We feel this should be a decision left to each individual NC. We are a smaller NC and know what works best for engaging our stakeholders. Larger NCs face a greater challenge in reaching out to their stakeholders. Perhaps consideration should be given to establishing minimum requirements for all NCs related to tasks they need to accomplish before their election process could be approved; a checklist of sorts which outlines the tasks that must be completed in order to carry out a successful election. NCs could then allocate funds to complete each task according to what best works in their communities. EmpowerLA would be responsible for monitoring each task before moving on to the next. This approach provides continuity to the overall system but still gives the NCs the ability to tailor their outreach to the needs of their community.

In addition to these five items put forward by the Department of Neighborhood Empowerment Election Report, Neighborhood Council Valley Village held two additional discussions and voted on two other matters:

Should the elections currently scheduled be held as planned in 2018, or postponed until 2019? Although there was some disagreement among the Board, the majority felt (11-2-0) that the election should be held in 2018 as planned.

The Board of Neighborhood Council Valley Village also voted unanimously (13-0-0) to request that the Southeast San Fernando Valley (Region 4) be allowed to move later into the election schedule, rather than having to go first or second as we have in the past several years.

We are grateful for the opportunity to respond to the Department of Neighborhood Empowerment Election Report Summary, and look forward to working with DONE and BONC to make the next elections the best yet.

To whom it may concern.

I write on behalf of the roughly 44,000 students at UCLA to encourage the Department of Neighborhood Empowerment to reject the Westwood Neighborhood Council's recommendation that its board members terms be extended by 1 year so that the next election would be in 2019. Instead, I would encourage elections to be held in 2018 for a 3-year term to end in 2021.

Our concern is that the current members on the board (most of whom are not students) are acting in a self-serving manner to avoid electoral accountability, not only in this recommendation but also in their repeated refusal to allow online

Their last election on just one day on June 5th, which was at the beginning of UCLA's Final Exams period, was located at 1350 S. Sepulveda, which is about as far as a polling place could possibly be from where most of UCLA's students (most of whom do not have cars) reside on and around campus. When the polling place would require most of its electorate, in the middle of their most stressful time of the year, to walk about 40 minutes each way or else take an Uber (which is expensive for students), this presents a serious participation, which resulted in just 496 votes cast in an electorate of over 50,000.

The current board lacks democratic legitimacy, and our students are being disenfranchised. I hope you will work with us to have elections in 2018 that are accessible both in person and online.
