#### RECOMMENDED ACTIONS

1. That the Board of Police Commissioners (Board) REVIEW and APPROVE this report.

2. That the Board TRANSMIT the grant application and award for the 2015 Port Security Grant Program (PSGP), pursuant to Administrative Code Section 14.6(a), to the Mayor, Office of the City Administrative Officer (CAO), Office of the Chief Legislative Analyst, and to the City Clerk for Committee and City Council consideration.

TRANSMITTAL OF THE GRANT APPLICATION AND AWARD FOR THE

- 3. That the Board REQUEST the Mayor and City Council to:
  - A. AUTHORIZE the Chief of Police or his designee to retroactively apply for and ACCEPT the grant award of \$637,500 from the Department of Homeland Security, Federal Emergency Management Agency, for the PSGP for the period of September 1, 2015 through August 31, 2018;
  - B. AUTHORIZE the Chief of Police or his designee to negotiate and execute the Cooperative Agreement and submit any necessary documents relative to the grant award, subject to the review of the City Attorney as to form and legality;
  - C. AUTHORIZE the Controller to set up a grant receivable and appropriate \$637,500 to account number to be determined, within Fund No. 339, Department No. 70, for the disbursements of 2015 PSG grant funds;
  - D. AUTHORIZE the Los Angeles Police Department (LAPD) to submit grant reimbursement requests to the grantor and deposit grant receipts in Fund No. 339, Department No. 70;
  - E. AUTHORIZE the LAPD to spend up to the total grant amount of \$637,500 in accordance with the grant award agreement;
  - F. AUTHORIZE the LAPD to prepare Controller Instructions for any technical adjustments, subject to the approval of the CAO, and AUTHORIZE and INSTRUCT the Controller to implement the instructions.

#### DISCUSSION

The PSGP provides financial assistance to state and local agencies as well as private sector partners to improve port-wide maritime security risk management; enhance domain awareness; support maritime security training and exercises; and maintain or reestablish maritime security mitigation protocols that support port recovery and resiliency capabilities. The 2015 PSGP's allowable costs support efforts to build and sustain core capabilities across Prevention, Protection, Mitigation, Response, and Recovery mission areas, with specific focus on addressing the security needs of our Nation's maritime ports. The grant allocates \$637,500 for equipment. The grant award requires a 25% match, totaling \$212,500. The LAPD will utilize the entire grant award for the following projects:

## a. LAPD Microwave Downlink Upgrade

The \$562,500 grant funding will enhance LAPD's air support to law enforcement operations. It will outfit one aircraft with a new hi-definition camera, microwave downlink system and Churchill Navigation. The microwave downlink system transmits encrypted images from an aircraft to fixed or portable receivers. The Churchill Navigation overlays data, e.g., street names and directions on top of the live video feed being transmitted. Matching funds from the Municipal Improvement Corporation of Los Angeles (MICLA) funds in the amount of \$187,500 will supplement the project.

## b. LAPD Underwater Dive Unit Vessel Repair and Maintenance

Grant funding in the amount of \$75,000 will be utilized to haul out the vessels by an insured and bonded commercial boat yard with a certified marine crane and docking facility. The boat hulls will then be scrapped, sanded and painted; marine electronic systems will receive needed upgrades; non-skid surfaces and rubberized linings and sponsons will be patched; and the electrical system and boat safety equipment will be serviced and updated as needed. The 25% match of \$75,000 will be paid for by LAPD Department 70 Account 3090 Field Equipment Account.

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## **Article I - Summary Description of Project**

Project 2: Microwave Downlink Upgrade with Forward Looking Infra-Red and Churchill Navigation System is fully funded for \$562,500.

Project 4: LAPD Underwater Dive Unit Vessel Repair and Maintenance is fully funded for \$75,000.

#### Article II - Acknowledgement of Federal Funding from DHS

All recipients must acknowledge their use of federal funding when issuing statements, press releases, requests for proposals, bid invitations, and other documents describing projects or programs funded in whole or in part with Federal funds.

#### **Article III - Activities Conducted Abroad**

All recipients must ensure that project activities carried on outside the United States are coordinated as necessary with appropriate government authorities and that appropriate licenses, permits, or approvals are obtained.

- vi. Other compensation, if the aggregate value of all such other compensation (e.g. severance, termination payments, value of life insurance paid on behalf of the employee, perquisites or property) for the executive exceeds \$10,000.

#### Article XVI - False Claims Act and Program Fraud Civil Remedies

All recipients must comply with the requirements of <u>31 U.S.C.</u> § <u>3729</u> which set forth that no recipient of federal payments shall submit a false claim for payment. #### **Article XXI - Lobbying Prohibitions**

All recipients must comply with 31 U.S.C. §1352, which provides that none of the funds provided under an award may be expended by the recipient to pay any person to influence, or attempt to influence an officer or employee of any agency, a Member of Congress, an officer or employee of Congress, or an employee of a Member of Congress in connection with any Federal action concerning the award or renewal.

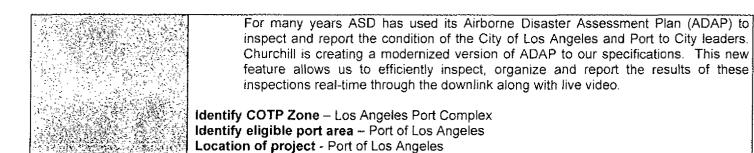

	The repair and maintenance of these vessels will support the deployment of both the LAPD's Underwater Dive Unit (UDU) and Tactical Waterborne Unit (TWB) which are integral partners within the Port Dive Operations Group (PDOG). All four vessels support both UDU and TWB in the conducting of critical infrastructure checks, IED / CBRNE screening, preparedness and response. These vessels respond daily to emergencies within the Port Complex and support the Captain of the Port's (COPT) precepts and focus on Joint Operations, multi-jurisdictional response and regionalized capabilities.
	This Project was reviewed and vetted by the AMSC during comprehensive meetings leading up to the PSGP 2015 submission deadline. It received the highest rankings across the board for: Port Centric (average score 10 out of 10), Strategic (average score 9 out of 10), Regional Focus (average score 9 out of 10), and PSG15 priorities (average score 9 out of 10); receiving a final score of 393. This is also the first time the LAPD has requested maintenance funds for its fleet. This funding will offset costs associated with repairs that the LAPD cannot perform.
	The repair and maintenance of these vessels will allow the Underwater Dive Unit to effectively address Group A priority concerns to include: Risks 7, 9, 15, 16, and 20.
