Every non-AZA facility I have been a part of provides exceptional care to their animals.

Outreach programs at libraries, schools, birthday parties, fairs and more provides the public with information that they wouldn't learn otherwise. It is very easy to believe that all families can afford to take their family to their local AZA accredited zoo but unfortunately that is not the case. When we bring our animals to fairs and festivals we often hear that they're extremely pleased to see us there because they can't afford to take their families to the zoo. It is important for all children to learn about animals and see them up close at an early age because it inspires a love for animals in a way that watching them on television or reading about them cannot.
