REPORT BACK ON THE STATUS OF THE FISCAL YEAR 2018 PROPOSED

FEDERAL BUDGET AND RELATED ITEMS

RECOMMENDATION

That the City Council receive and file this report.

SUMMARY

On July 31, 2017, the Budget and Finance Committee considered the City Administrative Officer's (CAO) June 9, 2017 report related to federal funding received by the City in Fiscal Year (FY) 2016-17 and the potential impact of the Trump Administration's Federal Budget Proposal for FY 2018.

The Committee requested that the CAO report back on the following:

- 1. Status of the FY 2018 Federal Budget Proposal;
- 2. The potential impact to the City as a result of the notice issued by the U.S. Department of Justice (DOJ) relative to new conditions on immigration compliance requirements that the City would have to meet to receive the Edward Byrne Memorial Justice Assistance Grant (Byrne JAG); and
- 3. The potential impact on the City's homeless efforts as a result of the FY 2018 Federal Budget Proposal.

This report outlines the status of the FY 2018 Federal Budget Proposal, including an updated chart noting the approved appropriation bills to date (Attachment 1); provides an update on the

City's action relative to the DOJ notice on the Byrne JAG grant; and an estimate of the proposed Federal Budget impact on the City's homeless efforts.

BACKGROUND

On May 23, 2017, the Trump Administration released its \$1.15 trillion FY 2018 budget proposal, "America First, A Budget Blueprint to Make America Great Again," (Federal Budget Proposal). This budget prioritizes public safety and proposes increases to the military, immigration enforcement and veteran services. These increases are off-set by more than \$54 billion in reductions to other departments and to key antipoverty programs including housing, health care and education.

STATUS OF PROPOSED FEDERAL BUDGET

The U.S. House of Representatives (House) Appropriations Committee has passed all 12 of the annual appropriation measures. Its 2018 Budget Plan would cut programs serving low - and moderate-income people by \$2.9 trillion over the next 10 years. These cuts would target Medicaid, the Supplemental Nutrition Assistance Program, school meals, Supplemental Social Security, refundable tax credits, federal college assistance, and other non-defense programs. The House intends to schedule their budget plan for a full vote this month. This schedule may be delayed as Congress will be debating the disaster supplemental bill for Texas to address Hurricane Harvey's damage, as well as other key issues such as Flood Insurance and the Debt Limit.

The U.S. Senate (Senate) has only finalized six (6) of the 12 annual appropriation bills. As Attachment 1 outlines, both the House and the Senate mainly have rejected the Trump's Administration FY 2018 budget Proposal. As our June 9th report stated, the City departments most impacted by the Federal Budget Proposal would be the Housing and Community Investment Department (HCID), the Economic and Workforce Development Department (EWDD) and the Department of Aging (Aging). The DOJ and U.S. Department of Homeland Security (DHS) grants may be adversely impacted as well due to the immigration enforcement issues, one of which is addressed below. As it relates to HCID, EWDD and Aging, none of the U.S. Department of Housing and Urban Development programs slated for elimination by the Federal Budget Proposal (highlighted in yellow) were eliminated by either the House or Senate, but these programs are proposed for reduction. The proposed cuts to these programs from the FY 2017 funding level stand at:

- Community Development Block Grant (CDBG) 6.39 percent and 3.23 percent;
- Home Investment Partnership Program (HOME) 17.23 percent and 7.50 percent; and
- Community Services Block Grant (CSBG) a 13.52 percent reduction in the House appropriation bill.

On the U.S. Department of Labor grants, which impact both EWDD and Aging, the Senate has yet to consider the Labor appropriations measure, but the House has proposed the following reductions:

- Senior Community Services Employment Program (SCSEP) 30.88 percent; and
- Workforce Innovation and Opportunity Act (WIOA) 12.41 percent.

Other House proposed reductions, which should be noted include:

- 17.78 percent reduction to the U.S. Environmental Protection Agency's Safe Drinking Water State Revolving Fund and a 44.22 percent reduction to the US. Economic Development Administration Grant, both of which fund the Los Angeles Department of Water and Power.
- A 2.03 percent reduction to the National Endowment of the Arts, which funds the City's Department of Cultural Affairs.

With the exception of the House's proposed elimination of the DOJ's Body Worn Camera Policy and Implementation Program, both the House and the Senate have recommended increases to DOJ and DHS programs. These include:

- Byrne JAG 33.23 percent and 7.78 percent;
- DNA Capacity and Enhancement Backlog Reduction Program .19 percent; and
- Training and Services to End Violence Against Women with Disabilities Grant Program .18 percent.

Next Steps

It is unlikely the Senate will complete the remaining six appropriation measures and reach agreement with the House on a budget resolution by October 1, 2017. In order to avoid a government shut-down, Congress would have to pass a Continuing Resolution (CR), which would maintain FY 2017 funding levels for federal agencies. The White House indicated today that they would support a three-month CR to December 15, 2017. In some fiscal years, a CR has been in place for the entire year. A year-long CR would be the most favorable outcome for the City of Los Angeles.

DOJ GUIDANCE ON BYRNE JAG

On July 25, 2017, DOJ issued a notice alerting state and local governments that the Byrne JAG grant would be awarded under new conditions. These conditions include increased information sharing related to immigration enforcement between federal, state, and local law enforcement. Under these new conditions, grantees would have to provide 48-hour notice before they release an undocumented immigrant wanted by federal authorities.

In response to this change in conditions, the City Attorney filed a lawsuit against DOJ on August 22, 2017 seeking an injunction against the new conditions. The City's suit alleges that imposing civil immigration-related conditions is unconstitutional given that Byrne JAG is a formula-based program enacted by Congress to assist state and local law enforcement to prevent crime. As

such, only Congress can change the conditions to federal grants that have been established by the Legislature. The lawsuit also alleges that the 48-hour condition may require the City to violate the 4th Amendment rights of arrestees by requiring the Los Angeles Police Department to detain individuals longer than necessary. The City is joining the California Attorney General, the City of San Francisco and others in challenging DOJ's new conditions.

The Byrne JAG program is awarded through a formula based on population and crime statistics. The City administers the program and shares its allocation with the County of Los Angeles. The City received \$1.8 million in FY 2016, of which \$800,000 was used to reduce gang activity in Los Angeles. The City is eligible to receive \$1.9 million in FY 2017.

IMPACT TO HOMELESS EFFORTS

The FY 2018 Federal Budget Proposal's impact on HCID and the City of Los Angeles Housing Authority (HACLA) would be devastating to the City's homeless efforts. The only funding HCID currently receives to finance affordable housing (other than permanent supportive housing with Proposition HHH funds) is the Federal HOME Program. The HOME allocation allows HCID to finance up to 600 units of affordable housing annually. These units house the City's low-income residents and prevent more individuals from becoming homeless. HACLA estimates that they would lose over 1,727 rental vouchers annually as a result of the Federal Budget Proposal. These vouchers are critical to providing the rental/operating subsidy for every permanent supportive housing (PSH) unit for the homeless financed by the City's Proposition HHH, as well as rental assistance to the poorest Angelenos. The estimated impact would be a loss of over 2,327 affordable and PSH units annually. This estimate does not include the cuts to Medicaid or other federal homeless funding received by the Los Angeles Homeless Services Authority, for which impact analysis is not available.

FISCAL IMPACT

There is no impact on the General Fund as a result of this report.
