May 12, 2020

#### **Background.**

On February 4, 2020, members of the Los Angeles City Council passed a motion directing the Los Angeles Police Department (LAPD) to prepare a written response on the following additional recommendations listed in the report relative to the LAPD's reporting of hate crimes and religious, ethnic, or racially motivated violence, under Council File No. 17-0256.

#### **Summary.**

The LAPD, Robbery-Homicide Division (RHD), conducted an analysis regarding the February 4, 2020, Los Angeles City Council, Public Safety Committee's motion relative to the LAPD's reporting of hate crimes and religious, ethnic or racially motivated violence. The Los Angeles City Council instructed the LAPD to:

- 1) Work with the Chief Legislative Analyst (CLA) to compile a list of organizations, that is geographically and demographically comprehensive that the LAPD can place on their victim's assistance website as resources for victims of hate crimes.
- 2) Adapt the hate crimes section of the LAPD's website to include appropriate contact information for LAPD security assessments.
- 3) Report on the feasibility of developing a Citywide communication tool, operationally similar to the Jewish Federation's Community Security Initiative, to serve as a single point of contact for critical incident coordination and information sharing to serve as a conduit for proactive hate crime prevention.

The Hate Crime Coordinator, RHD, was assigned the task of responding to the City Council's request. The Hate Crime Coordinator contacted the CLA Office, LAPD's Media Relations Division and the Jewish Federation's Vice President, Community Security Initiative (CSI).

#### **Findings.**

The Los Angeles City Council instructed the LAPD to:

- 1) The Hate Crime Coordinator contacted the CLA Office and was informed that the City of Los Angeles does not currently have a hate crime resource roster of non-profits, non-governmental organizations or service providers. These organizations do not have to apply for special permits nor register with the City of Los Angeles to serve in their chosen capacity.

The LAPD has several strong partnerships with vetted organizations that are included on the hate crimes brochure, which is distributed to every victim of a hate crime or incident. This information is also available on LAPD's official website, [www.lapdonline.org](http://www.lapdonline.org), which can be viewed in over 120 languages. The list of organizations includes:

- 2) Robbery-Homicide Division collaborated with Media Relations Division and added the following information regarding security assessments and appropriate State and Federal forms to apply for the security grant on the official LAPD website:
- The Los Angeles Police Department (LAPD) will assist you in evaluating your 501(c)(3) nonprofit organization (NPO), house of worship and/or school for security vulnerabilities and provide recommendations for security enhancements using the California Office of Emergency Services (Cal OES) Vulnerability Assessment Worksheet. Please contact your LAPD Area's Community Relations Office (CRO) for assistance.
- Should your NPO qualify for the Federal Emergency Management Agency (FEMA)/ California Office of Emergency Services (Cal OES) FY 2020 Nonprofit Security Grant Program (NSGP), LAPD personnel will provide support in applying for the FEMA/Cal OES NSGP.
- 3) The LAPD, Hate Crime Coordinator met with the Jewish Federation of Greater Los Angeles Vice President of the Community Security Initiative (CSI). The CSI employs a dedicated programmer who developed a custom software communications tool and provides ongoing technical support.

The LAPD utilizes the Regional Public Private Infrastructure Collaboration System (RPPCS) as a system to share information with Critical Infrastructure members, private sector leaders,

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and LAPD. Features of the RPPCS include a discussion board, a calendar, postings, and hyperlinks. The RPPCS is managed by Major Crimes Division. Currently, the system is off line due to software problems that caused a potential security issue for City facilities. This was shut down in March of this year. Major Crimes Division is working with the LAPD's Information and Technology Division on a plan to upgrade to a security standard that is more modern. The project is pending financing and it is likely to be inoperable for the foreseeable future.

The LAPD currently has a license to a communications tool named NIXLE by the Everbridge Company. This software can produce Citywide notifications that disseminate critical information to the community over multiple connected platforms including voice, short message service, email and social media. Information on how community members could opt-in to receive messages from the application will be posted on the official LAPD website.

The Hate Crimes Coordinator will coordinate and release any hate crime information, deemed in the interest of public safety to the affected communities in a timely manner, through the NIXLE program, and LAPD social media.


**Conclusion.**

The LAPD has posted a list of organizations, that are a resource for victims of hate crimes on its official website. The contact information and links to their respective websites are on the LAPD Hate Crimes webpage. Additionally, the LAPD updated the web-page with the latest information.

The LAPD has added information on the definition and availability of security assessments, along with the appropriate state and federal forms to apply for the security grant.

The LAPD will utilize NIXLE communications tools to update the community regarding hate crime activity in the City of Los Angeles.

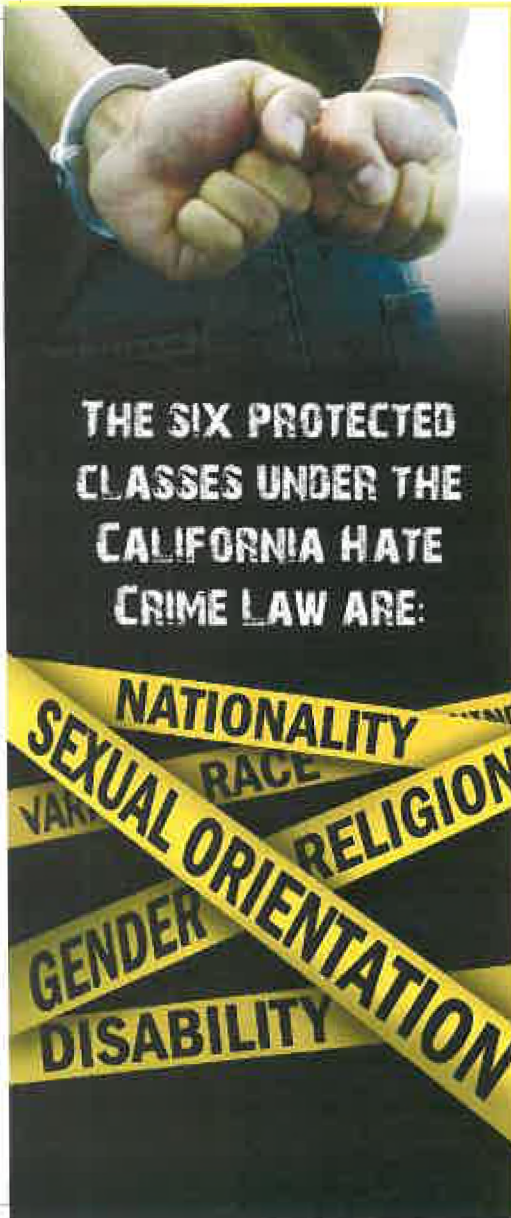

The City of Los Angeles has a unique and culturally diverse population. Its residents represent nearly every culture, nationality, race, and religion on earth. This diversity has significantly contributed to making Los Angeles the vibrant and dynamic City it is today. There are people and groups who commit crimes and acts against members of specific groups. These crimes and acts are called "Hate Crimes" and "Hate Incidents." It is important to know the facts about hate crimes and hate incidents. Knowing the facts places the community in a better position to recognize hate crimes and hate incidents as a very serious community problem.

## HATE CRIMES

A hate crime is any criminal act or attempt directed against a person(s), public agency, or private institution based on the victim's actual or perceived race, nationality, religion, sexual orientation, disability, or gender or because the agency, institution or victim is identified or associated with a person or group of an identifiable race, nationality, religion, sexual orientation, disability, or gender.

Examples of hate crimes include:

- Acts that result in injury, no matter how slight the injury appears.
- Threats of violence that look like they can be carried out.
- Vandalism and other destructive acts, resulting in property damage.
- Any criminal act or attempted criminal act, including property damage, directed against public or private agencies.
- Harassment, including anonymous telephone calls, threatening letters, and interruptions of religious services.
- Threats made verbally, in writing, and by means of electronic communication devices which can apparently be carried out. (Electronic communication device includes, but is not limited to, telephones, cellular telephones, computers, video recorders, fax machines, or pagers.)
- Murder.

## HATE INCIDENTS

A hate incident is any noncriminal act including words directed against a person(s) based on that person's actual or perceived race, nationality, religion, sexual orientation, disability, or gender.

Examples of hate incidents include:

- Epithets.
- Distribution of hate material in public places.
- Posting of hate material that does not result in property damage.
- The display of offensive material on one's own property.

## WHAT CAN BE DONE?

Hate crimes and hate incidents not only affect the victim but also the community. Hate crimes and hate incidents strike at the heart of our society. Our country, constitution, and national character are based on tolerance and respect for the rights and needs of the individual. Hate crimes and hate incidents directly attack those founding principles: breeding fear, distrust, and uncertainty in the community.

Hate crimes can be prosecuted either as misdemeanors or felonies, depending on the severity of the acts committed. Hate crimes and hate incidents are tracked by the Los Angeles Police Department.

Historically, hate crimes have been under-reported; thus many are not prosecuted. Law Enforcement, the Los Angeles Police Department, and the Los Angeles City, County and U. S. Attorneys' Offices, are all committed to apprehending and prosecuting perpetrators.

## RESPECT DIVERSITY!

Respect diversity at work and in your community. The more you learn and know about different cultures and traditions, the richer your life will be. Additionally, support the efforts of the community to fight hate crimes and hate incidents through programs and projects on cultural diversity, human relations, and conflict resolution. Promote the sharing of cultural events and holidays.

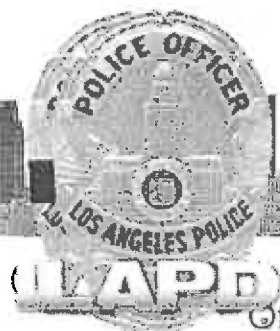

## What LAPD is Doing to Fight Hate Crimes

- o The Los Angeles Police Department is committed to the fight against hate crimes. The Department has assigned hate crimes investigators at each of the 21 area stations. The Department hate crimes coordinator oversees each hate crimes investigation and assists at the State level in developing hate crime policy and training guidelines. The Police Department will vigorously investigate and bring any individuals or groups responsible for hate crimes to justice.
- o If you are a victim of a hate crime, call or go to your nearest police station to report the crime. Any police officer can take a hate crime or hate incident report. The investigation will then be conducted by a detective that is assigned to handle hate crime cases.
- o Hate crimes disrupt community order, hurt neighborhoods and individuals and will not be tolerated. The only way to conquer hate crime is by having every person get involved. Therefore, the Los Angeles Police Department encourages any citizen that has been a witness to a hate crime or hate incident to step forward and report the occurrence.

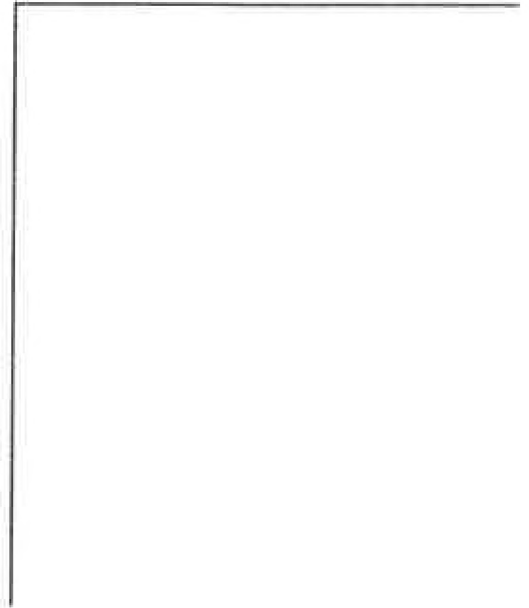
