SUBJECT: OPPOSE COUNCIL FILE 18-0002-S13 - City's 2017-18 State Legislative Program, opposition to SB 827 (Weiner)

Dear Council President Wesson:

On behalf of the Los Angeles Area Chamber of Commerce, which represents more than 1,650 organizations and 650,000 employees in the region, I am writing in opposition to Council File 18-0002-S13 which would add opposition of SB 827 (Weiner) to the City's State Legislative Program..

SB 827 (Weiner) aims to incentivize building near high quality transit by streamlining the process to permit and create more homes in the appropriate areas throughout the state. We recognize that the City of Los Angeles already has Transit Oriented Development incentives built in through Measure JJJ. However, opposing this bill would be contrary to the goals of addressing housing affordability.

Our housing crisis places a huge burden on employees, many of which face excruciatingly long commutes while paying increasing percentages of their income on rent. Many companies have chosen to leave or not locate here at all because of the housing challenges their employees would face. This bill aims to ease the process and expand housing opportunities for our families, growing workforce and first-time homebuyers.

Senator Weiner has worked with various stakeholders on this bill and unveiled a number of amendments last month to address community concerns. These amendments include a ban on demolishing rent-controlled housing units, requirements for locally adopted mandatory inclusionary housing to be used, local processes for evaluating demolition permits, and an adequate Right to Remain Guarantee.

Los Angeles is investing heavily in building out our public transportation system and addressing our homelessness crisis. We should be doing everything in our power to increase residential opportunities in areas where we are working to relieve congestion with transportation options. Additionally, to get anywhere close to substantially addressing our homelessness problem, we need to ensure supply is adequate enough to maintain affordability and thus more people do not fall into homelessness.

Opposing this bill is step backward in combating our housing crisis here in Los Angeles and in our state. For these reasons, the Los Angeles Area Chamber of Commerce opposes this item. Abundant Housing LA writes to request that you rescind or defeat resolution 18-0002-S13 to oppose SB 827. With recent amendments, SB 827 is a great bill that will help add more homes of all types near transit and that strengthens tenant rights through a right to remain for people living in existing housing.

Abundant Housing LA is a volunteer pro-housing organization. Our 1500 members support more homes of all types in Los Angeles. We support local pro-housing policies and plans like the permanent supportive housing ordinance and TOC guidelines. But even with these good local laws, production of housing in the City of Los Angeles is far too low to meet our needs. Therefore we also favor state level reform to allow more homes. For instance, we were strong supporters of state laws that made it easier to build ADUs, and believe that these preemptions of local barriers have improved Los Angeles.

SB 827, proposed by state senator Scott Wiener, would enact statewide zoning standards within ½-mile of Major Transit Stops and ¼-mile of High Quality Transit Corridors, eliminating density restrictions and parking requirements as well as establishing new height minimums between 45 and 85 feet in these areas. The Bill also protects rent stabilized housing and gives tenants a new right to remain and to receive relocation assistance that is stronger than existing City of Los Angeles RSO protections. SB 827 also defers to local demolition controls and to inclusionary zoning requirements like JJJ and TOC.

It is true that SB 827 will put modest limits on local control of zoning by implementing a new density bonus program linked to transit adjacency. Solving our severe housing crisis and helping struggling families stay in LA is more important than the procedural details of zoning. We know that you are public servants because you want to help people's lives. SB 827 will do great amounts of good in exchange for a small reduction in local authority.

We support SB 827 for the following reasons:

- 1. It's the first and only proposal that would address our housing shortage on the necessary scale. In LA County alone, we've accrued a housing deficit of over 1 million homes, causing prices to rise much faster than incomes and pushing many Angelenos onto the streets or out of the state. The City has taken steps in recent years to begin updating plans, but no proposals approved or pending would put more than a dent in this backlog or adequately prepare us for decades of continued growth. SB 827 would.
- 2. It would strengthen tenant rights and benefits. Sb 827 requires cities to affirmatively pass an ordinance before SB 827 bonuses can be used on any rent stabilized apartments. It also gives tenants in any housing demolished using SB 827 a right to remain that includes an obligation for the developer to pay to house tenants during construction and gives tenants a right to come back into a new unit at the same rent as they paid in the former unit.
- 3. It would reduce housing shortages, rent increases, displacement, homelessness and Angelenos being forced to leave the region. In the mid to long term, allowing more homes of all types in Los Angeles is the key to reducing negative impacts from the housing crisis. Shortages allow owners to raise rents; they put old and new residents in competition for housing; and prevent many people who might want to live in our great city from pursuing their dreams. While encouraging more homes is not sufficient to solve all of our housing challenges, it is an absolutely necessary precondition for an LA with homes for all.
- 4. It would reverse decades of exclusion from affluent, low-density neighborhoods. Historians have drawn a direct line between the advent of single family zoning and racist efforts to exclude people of color from specific communities. Current residents of single family zones are not responsible for this history, but we are all answerable to its ongoing legacy of segregation, the racial wealth gap, and more. SB 827 would not eliminate single family zoning altogether, but it does make clear that single family homes should not be the only permissible use in areas of significant investment in public transit, and argues that we must open such areas to residents of all incomes and backgrounds.
- 5. It's aligned with policy goals which focus new housing near transit. Both locally and at the state level we have approved numerous ordinances and bills to encourage housing near transit. We do so out of a recognition that transit-oriented housing is environmentally sustainable and contributes least to traffic congestion, among other benefits. Locally we hve also seen reductions in ridership partly because the land use near stations and lines does not allow enough people to live and work close-by. Unfortunately, efforts to turn this policy into practice like the Expo and Purple Line transit neighborhood plans have failed to live up to their promise, proposing to add perhaps 5,000 or 10,000 new homes over 20 years next to some of the most transit-accessible and job-rich locations in Southern California. SB 827 would achieve what our local plans have not.

- 6. It would create many more resources for affordable housing. SB 827 would lead to significantly more housing development in Los Angeles and across the state, providing an immediate boost to property and sales tax revenues. It would also generate much greater linkage fee revenues, helping to directly subsidize the creation and preservation of housing for low and moderate income households. Further, the bill does not override local inclusionary requirements, demolition protections, or anti-displacement provisions that the City may wish to enact locally. While we have not calculated the economic impacts yet, SB 827 would also generate many jobs directly in construction and design and indirectly by allowing more people to live and work in Los Angeles.
- 7. It would force free-loading cities to allow their fair share of housing. While housing production in Los Angeles is at historic lows compared to previous decades, we've done more than many. Other cities like Beverly Hills and Hermosa Beach build almost no new housing whatsoever, worsening the housing crisis for the entire region and shunting more of the responsibility onto cities like ours. SB 827 would upend this dynamic and create a level playing field, requiring all cities with quality transit to contribute their fair share toward resolving our housing crisis.
- 8. It would dramatically reduce our contribution to global carbon emissions. Transportation is now the single-largest contributor to carbon emissions in California, and most of that is from passenger vehicles. We have to change how we get around, and we won't succeed without changing how our neighborhoods are built. SB 827 would allow more housing where people can walk, bicycle, and use transit for many of their daily trips and we could stop forcing Angelenos to move to sprawling communities in Arizona, Nevada, and Texas where per-capita emissions are much greater. Ask any climate expert: If we're serious about reducing per-capita emissions in California, there's nothing more effective than land use reform.

SB 827 holds great promise for Los Angeles and for cities across California, and we believe that combined with good local policy, it will help address our housing crisis and give more people more choices on where to live in the city without leaving our most vulnerable residents behind.

We can afford to do no less.



Subject: SB 827

On February 27, 2018, at its regularly scheduled public meeting, the Tarzana Neighborhood Council Board unanimously voted to oppose SB 827 a bill that proposes to override all zoning within a ½ mile radius of a major transit stop or ¼ mile radius of a high quality bus line stop. The bill would override local land use regulations, allow buildings up to 85 feet in height, significantly reduce the required construction setbacks from the property line, and eliminate requirements for on-site parking. All property in Tarzana, including single family zoned property, with the exception of the hillside area, would be affected, as would most of the residentially zoned property in the entire city of Los Angeles. Neighborhood Councils throughout the City, as well as property owner groups, including the Tarzana Property Owners Association, have vigorously opposed the proposed legislation. A resolution to oppose SB 827 has recently been introduced in the Los Angeles City Council (CF-18-0002-S13) as part of its State Legislative Program.

We request that you oppose the bill in committee and in the Senate as a whole if it proceeds to a full Senate vote.



Dear Rules Committee Chair Wesson and Members Huizar and Harris-Dawson:

We are most pleased to learn that the Rules Committee will be considering the Ryu/Wesson motion to oppose SB 827 this week. It is critical that the City of Los Angeles add its voice to the growing list of cities opposing this fatally flawed legislation that seeks to apply a "one size fits all" approach to the very complicated and necessary process of community land use planning. As you know, SB 827 essentially abolishes local input into land use planning within one half mile of high quality transit from jurisdictions and charter cities.

Already, 93 cities have adopted resolutions to oppose SB 827. The list of those cities is attached to this letter for your reference.

Those of us long involved with matters related to community planning understand well the challenges our city and others face in seeking to provide affordable housing. Los Angeles has already adopted strong measures to address this challenge through Measure JJJ and the policies governing Transit Oriented Communities. Our Westwood South community has never turned away an affordable housing project and, in fact, has strongly supported the two low income projects that have come before us in recent times to be built in our area. However, we do not support the wholesale rezoning of land near transit lines without regard to infrastructure, historical structures, and other factors that define community.

It is essential that Los Angeles act to protect local authority and control over land use and planning. Sadly, those advocating for SB 827 appear to have adopted the popular YIMBY philosophy that endorses a "trickle down" Reaganomic-like theory of housing

that will likely result in increasing gentrification and the loss of affordable housing stock. We are troubled by the growing YIMBY lobby that seems to accuse those in favor of local control of being NIMBYs. That characterization is a broad attack on those of us who favor local control and local planning to meet reasonable population growth figures. We seek to work with City leadership to forge a livable Los Angeles mindful of the many factors that go into building strong and sustainable communities.

We urge your support and adoption of CF 18-0002-S13 and trust that it will move forward to the full Council quickly.

Dear Council President Wesson,

CCA is committed to building Downtown Los Angeles' vibrancy and increasing investment in the region and we are writing to oppose the resolution against Senate Bill (SB) 827. The proposal would establish proven planning principles throughout California, targeting new housing development to places where transit investments warrant denser and more walkable communities.

Most importantly, SB 827 treats the housing crisis with the urgency that it deserves. It is aggressive, but so are the economic forces that are pushing our residents and businesses to the edge. State officials, gubernatorial candidates, and outside experts all agree that protecting residents and stabilizing housing prices in California will require the construction of approximately 3.5 million homes by 2025 — including at least 1 million homes in LA County — and SB 827 can help us get there.

We commend the City Council for the proposals you have championed including the Transit Orientated Community Guidelines, Affordable Housing Linkage Fee, Permanent Supportive Housing Ordinance, Interim Motel Conversion Ordinance, and Proposition HHH. These policies are a step in the right direction but they only begin to chip away at the housing deficit that's accumulated over the past 30+years.

SB 827 is our opportunity to meaningfully address the heart of the housing crisis and put an end to continued rent increases, out of reach home prices, growing homelessness and displacement, and economic fragility caused by a rising and unsustainable cost of living. As the largest city in California we must lead on this issue, setting the example while also holding our neighboring cities to a higher standard.

Last year the state made great progress on housing and climate by passing the 15-bill housing package and extending cap-and-trade, but our work is far from done. Californians will continue to suffer high housing costs, breathe dirty air, and spend too much time stuck in traffic until much more housing is built where it's needed most: near transit. SB 827 will further improve the quality of life for Californians by making housing more affordable, reducing pollution and per-capita carbon emissions, and increasing the effectiveness of transit and active transportation resources.

Downtown LA is the mass transit hub for all of Southern California, and with the support of the City Council, Mayor, and other elected leaders, we continue to improve connectivity with important projects like the Regional Connector. Our community has embraced density more than any other place in the City of LA, and vigorously encourages alternative modes of transportation like walking and biking.

CCA, and the Downtown community we represent, have been and will continue to be a part of the solution. As a part of our own efforts, we recently released two white papers that speak directly to housing production and affordability: one addressing the construction of micro-units and the other reassessing the goals set by Regional Housing Needs Assessments. But we need more communities to do their part if we're ever going to solve the housing crisis. SB 827 would help us achieve that goal.

We appreciate the thoughtfulness of Senator Wiener's recent amendments and believe SB 827 is an essential step towards tackling the severe housing shortage at the heart of this crisis. We especially appreciate inclusion of LA's Transit-Oriented Communities (TOC) guidelines into the bill's framework, as we believe it is a model for smart planning and equitable development. SB 827 builds on the success of the TOC guidelines by expanding them into areas where transit access is excellent but out-of-date zoning has been used to prevent more people from enjoying it. We also support his proposed tenant protections, which strike an important balance between community stability and long-term growth.

CCA recognizes that further amendments will occur as SB 827 moves ahead, and we will look forward to continued refinements to the bill — including efforts to address any unintended impacts and ensure that new housing goes where it's needed most and where infrastructure is best able to support it. We hope that, rather than opposing the bill, your office and the rest of the City Council will identify areas of the bill that need improvement and find constructive solutions to them. We stand ready as partners to do that work together.

We support SB 827 and urge City Council to do the same — to take a courageous stand and directly address the housing crisis. We appreciate your consideration, and thank you for your leadership on this critical issue.

I worked hard to obtain new zoning for our neighborhood – R1R3 – RG ALONG WITH NUMEROUS NEIGHBORS IN Crestview, Los Angeles, Herb Wesson's Council District 10. We spent two years of hard, volunteer work to help maintain the integrity of our neighborhood, its charm, affordability; Because of our anti-mcmansion work, our smaller homes would have been replaced with much larger, MORE EXPENSIVE HOMES. Your bill would kick out renters, replace smaller duplexes and apartments and the charming ethnic quality that attracts diverse residents.

CCA is committed to building Downtown Los Angeles' vibrancy and increasing investment in the region and we are writing to oppose the resolution against Senate Bill (SB) 827. The proposal would establish proven planning principles throughout California, targeting new housing development to places where transit investments warrant denser and more walkable communities.

Most importantly, SB 827 treats the housing crisis with the urgency that it deserves. It is aggressive, but so are the economic forces that are pushing our residents and businesses to the edge. State officials, gubernatorial candidates, and outside experts all agree that protecting residents and stabilizing housing prices in California will require the construction of approximately 3.5 million homes by 2025 — including at least 1 million homes in LA County — and SB 827 can help us get there.

We commend the City Council for the proposals you have championed including the Transit Orientated Community Guidelines, Affordable Housing Linkage Fee, Permanent Supportive Housing Ordinance, Interim Motel Conversion Ordinance, and Proposition HHH. These policies are a step in the right direction but they only begin to chip away at the housing deficit that's accumulated over the past 30+years.

SB 827 is our opportunity to meaningfully address the heart of the housing crisis and put an end to continued rent increases, out of reach home prices, growing homelessness and displacement, and economic fragility caused by a rising and unsustainable cost of living. As the largest city in California we must lead on this issue, setting the example while also holding our neighboring cities to a higher standard.

Last year the state made great progress on housing and climate by passing the 15-bill housing package and extending cap-and-trade, but our work is far from done. Californians will continue to suffer high housing costs, breathe dirty air, and spend too much time stuck in traffic until much more housing is built where it's needed most: near transit. SB 827 will further improve the quality of life for Californians by making housing more affordable, reducing pollution and per-capita carbon emissions, and increasing the effectiveness of transit and active transportation resources.

Downtown LA is the mass transit hub for all of Southern California, and with the support of the City Council, Mayor, and other elected leaders, we continue to improve connectivity with important projects like the Regional Connector. Our community has embraced density more than any other place in the City of LA, and vigorously encourages alternative modes of transportation like walking and biking.

CCA, and the Downtown community we represent, have been and will continue to be a part of the solution. As a part of our own efforts, we recently released two white papers that speak directly to housing production and affordability: one addressing the construction of micro-units and the other reassessing the goals set by Regional Housing Needs Assessments. But we need more communities to do their part if we're ever going to solve the housing crisis. SB 827 would help us achieve that goal.

We appreciate the thoughtfulness of Senator Wiener's recent amendments and believe SB 827 is an essential step towards tackling the severe housing shortage at the heart of this crisis. We especially appreciate inclusion of LA's Transit-Oriented Communities (TOC) guidelines into the bill's framework, as we believe it is a model for smart planning and equitable development. SB 827 builds on the success of the TOC guidelines by expanding them into areas where transit access is excellent but out-of-date zoning has been used to prevent more people from enjoying it. We also support his proposed tenant protections, which strike an important balance between community stability and long-term growth.

CCA recognizes that further amendments will occur as SB 827 moves ahead, and we will look forward to continued refinements to the bill — including efforts to address any unintended impacts and ensure that new housing goes where it's needed most and where infrastructure is best able to support it. We hope that, rather than opposing the bill, your office and the rest of the City Council will identify areas of the bill that need improvement and find constructive solutions to them. We stand ready as partners to do that work together.

We support SB 827 and urge City Council to do the same — to take a courageous stand and directly address the housing crisis. We appreciate your consideration, and thank you for your leadership on this critical issue.

The housing crisis has not gotten better despite piecemeal solutions (linkage fees, bonds) because fundamentally we do not allow enough housing to be built. The city is zoned to capacity. This hurts the poorest members of society who are moving out of the city, state, and county at alarming numbers (95% of people who leave Los Angeles county have a HS degree or less, or whose households earn \$70,000). 827 would allow development in areas that have denied it for the longest, and it would allow it in the areas that have the best public transportation options. Land economics would insist that it would NOT speed up gentrification, and displacement because it would allow development in areas where at risk community members are not located.

Ninety-five (95) year old Hollywoodland, a R-1 zone neighborhood consists of unique, physically constrained qualities. It is a clear statement of why SB827 should not be a "one size fits all "state-wide planning regulation.

Hollywoodland Tract 6450 is comprised of 640 acres located in the <u>Santa Monica Mountains</u>, including 575 single family residents and 444 acres of park land donated to the City of Los Angeles in 1944 by its developer, the Sherman Company. This open space gift, now part of <u>Griffith Park</u> is recognized as passive park land and identified as SEA (significant ecological area). <u>Hollywoodland</u> is the only residential Los Angeles hillside community surrounded by three sides of park land covering 85% of its perimeter.

The area is regulated by the Hollywoodland Specific Plan (168,121) and historically re-enforced by cultural designations (#111, #535, #20)

Its' narrow winding, streets (generally ranging from 17 -20 feet without sidewalks) is perched in a (VHFZ) very high fire hazard zone per state fire code #49 with the Main Communication Tower monitoring all emergencies for the entire City of Los Angeles. This facility is accessed through Hollywoodland's upper most winding, narrow roadways. There are 8,000 gallons of fuel stored at the Communication site.

How could SB827 be a "one size fits all"? It could never accommodate Hollywoodland's fragile infrastructure without causing extreme safety concerns, an environmental disaster or without destroying a sensitive historic character.



I am writing in support of SB 827 and to express my disappointment that the LA City Council is moving so quickly to take an oppose position on a bill designed to help our housing crisis.

In full disclosure, I work for the Los Angeles Chamber of Commerce, which voted to support the bill conceptually in January. However, I am writing in my capacity as an 11-year resident of Council District 5 and a third generation Angeleno. My grandmother grew up in Boyle Heights, my father in the Fairfax District and my mother in Westchester. I was raised in Chatsworth and moved into CD 5 after grad school. However, as an older Millennial, even with two degrees and being lucky enough to have a well-paying job, I cannot afford to purchase a home in the city my family has called home for generations.

SB 827 is an opportunity to build more housing for all. Students, working class, first-time home-buyers and everyone in between. We are at risk of losing a generation of people who grew up in Los Angeles or were educated here, who are either forced to live long-distances and commute in, or leave entirely.

I love Los Angeles and have spent my professional career working for elected officials and organizations committed to improving the quality of life in this city. Los Angeles is unique, vibrant and incredibly diverse in demographics, cultures and industries. It is devastating to watch people my age and younger struggle to balance bills and student loans with rents that take up an increasing percentage of income. Then at the end of the day, question whether they can stay here at all and enjoy the opportunities prior generations had.

Dear Rules Committee Chair Wesson and Members Huizar and Harris-Dawson:

The Westside Regional Alliance of Councils (WRAC) is a coalition of all 13 neighborhood and community councils in Council Districts 5 and 11. A supermajority of WRAC member-councils (11 of 13)¹ have passed, in substance, the following motion in opposition to the proposed the Transit-Rich Housing Bonus Bill (Wiener – SB 827):

- "i. Whereas the City Charter-mandated Neighborhood Council system of Los Angeles, and the Community Councils of the City of Los Angeles, represent grass roots democracy,
- ii. Whereas the newly introduced California State Senate Bill 827 [Scott Wiener] as written constitutes a top down pen stroke planning measure which completely removes land use and planning authority within one half mile of high quality transit from jurisdictions and charter cities,
- iii. Whereas removal of said authority clearly abolishes local input into land use planning and therefore constitutes an attack upon local democracy, upon neighborhoods, and upon the Neighborhood Councils and Community Councils in the City of Los Angeles,

Member Councils: Bel Air-Beverly Crest Neighborhood Council, Brentwood Community Council, Del Rey Neighborhood Council, Mar Vista Community Council, Neighborhood Council of Westchester/Playa, Pacific Palisades Community Council, Palms Neighborhood Council, South Robertson Neighborhoods Council, Venice Neighborhood Council, West LA-Sawtelle Neighborhood Council, Westside Neighborhood Council, Westwood Community Council, Westwood Neighborhood Council

¹The motion in opposition was passed by all 11 WRAC members who considered the issue to date; the remaining two members are expected to consider the motion in the coming weeks.

iv. Whereas SB 827 as written trashes the density bonus and wage provisions of the JJJ TOC ordinance which were recently enacted by the people of Los Angeles -- in good faith -- in order to guarantee transit close housing opportunities would actually be available to working and low-income persons and families in the City of Los Angeles,

v. Whereas the lack of analysis of infrastructure and other costs associated with this pen stroke planning creates grave uncertainty that a local agency would be able to "levy enough service charges, fees or assessments sufficient to pay for the program or level of service mandated by this act within the meaning of Section 17556 of the Government Code,"

vi. Whereas, given the aforementioned lack of fiscal analysis, Section 6 of Article XIII B of the California Constitution "No reimbursement" clause is cited inappropriately in this legislation,

vii. Therefore, [WRAC] opposes SB 827 in its present form."

Pacific Palisades Community Council (PPCC) passed additional language requesting SB 827 be withdrawn and calling upon "the City of Los Angeles, through its official representatives, to vigorously oppose SB 827 and protect local authority and control over land use and planning."

It is the consensus of WRAC leadership as expressed at the regular monthly public WRAC meeting on March 21, 2018, that subsequent proposed amendments to SB 827 do not change the fundamental fatal flaws of the bill and do nothing to alter the fact that it is a usurping of the city's traditional role in city planning, it is an attack on the ability of communities to manage the growth of neighborhoods in a manner that is consistent with local input, and it is an attack upon the principle of local control. It should be vigorously opposed by the City of Los Angeles.

WRAC therefore strongly urges the Rules Committee to recommend that the full City Council, 1) take up this matter at the earliest possible time and, 2) adopt the proposed resolution in opposition to SB 827 (Ryu-Wesson) in CF 18-0002-S13.
