Re: <u>Urban Areas Security Initiative FY 2018 Grant</u>, Office of Homeland Security: <u>Notification of Submission of a Grant Application and Request for Adoption of</u> <u>Governing Body Resolution</u>

Dear Honorable Members:

Pursuant to Section 14.6 of the Los Angeles Administrative Code, the Mayor's Office of Public Safety is providing notification to the City Council of the submission of a grant application for the Urban Areas Security Initiative Fiscal Year 2018 (FY18 UASI). The Department of Homeland Security is expected to issue a solicitation for the FY18 UASI Program in Spring of 2018. The final FY18 UASI award allocations are anticipated to be announced in Summer of 2018. The anticipated grant performance period will be September 2018 through May 2021, although the grant performance period start date is dependent on the award date.

#### **OVERVIEW**

Since the FY 2017 Grant Award, the Department of Homeland Security (DHS) has changed its application requirements which has impacted the application timeline. DHS awards the funds to the California Governor's Office of Emergency Services (Cal OES) which acts as the State Administrative Agent and disperses the federal funds to the urban areas. Due to an accelerated application timeline, Cal OES, in a Grant Management Memorandum (GMM) dated November 21, 2017, instructed the Los Angeles/Long Beach Urban Area (LA/LB Urban Area) to submit its grant award application in advance of the release of the DHS solicitation, and to use the FY 2017 allocation as the estimate for project funding (Attachment 1). Based on the GMM, the LA/LB Urban Area estimates receiving \$54,888,000, and has submitted its application based on those estimates. Actual allocations will be made available within the grant award acceptance transmittal. The UASI award does not require any cash or in-kind match.

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### UASI FY18 APPLICATION PROCESS

### **Investment Justifications**

The UASI grant application is developed with input from public safety agencies (law, fire, emergency management, health) representing the LA/LB Urban Area jurisdictions. The Urban Area Working Group, made up of eighteen voting representatives from jurisdictions across the Urban Area, sets forth homeland security objectives, proposes programs to meet those objectives, and presents funding requests to meet each objective for the application. This draft grant application is reviewed and ratified by an eleven member Approval Authority, which represents the Urban Area jurisdictions and includes four City of Los Angeles representatives (Attachment 2). The Mayor's Office of Public Safety serves as the administrative and fiscal agent for all UASI awards, and submits all grant applications and related documents on behalf of the LA/LB Urban Area jurisdictions.

Similar to the FY17 UASI application, the Working Group recommended and the Approval Authority concurred on:

- Identifying the primary IJs to be pursued;
- · Defining criteria for project eligibility under those IJs;
- Establishing allocation ranges for each IJ (as a percentage of the award); and
- Providing clear direction to potential sub-grantees.

The IJs for FY18 UASI were developed by the Working Group and Approval Authority with consideration of the core capabilities and gaps of the LA/LB Urban Area and based on feedback provided by Cal OES and the U.S. Department of Homeland Security.

The IJs that were recommended in FY18 UASI are identified below:

- 1. Strengthen interoperable and communications capabilities Outcomes
  - Continued development of regional interoperable communications systems
- 2. Strengthen information sharing, collaboration capabilities, and law enforcement investigations

Outcomes

- Continuing to link and enhance Urban Area criminal and intelligence systems together
- Increasing analytical capability to detect and disrupt terrorist activity across linked databases and intelligence systems
- Expand Common Operational Platform Program capabilities to enhance information gathering, sharing, and incident management

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> The procurement of equipment and training designed to enhance technological capabilities to support intelligence and criminal cases for the pursuit of terror networks and individuals

### 2A. Fusion Center/Joint Regional Intelligence Center

Outcomes

- Training for the intelligence community and Terrorism Liaison Officers (TLOs) across Urban Area jurisdictions
- Funding for analysts at the Joint Regional Intelligence Center (JRIC).
- 3. Protection of critical infrastructure and key resources (limited to commercial airports and seaports)

Outcomes

- Enhance transportation systems and maritime security
- Procure equipment, technologies, training and exercises designed to improve security at critical infrastructure and to combat threats of high consequences including CBRNE
- Resiliency (continuity of operations)
  - Integrate critical sub-systems (e.g. power, key roads, water, communications) into overall critical infrastructure security plans and operations
- Operations and maintenance of Homeland Security Grant Program acquired systems

# 4. Catastrophic incident planning response and recovery

Outcomes

- Procure equipment to enhance catastrophic incident response
- Catastrophic disaster response training & exercises
- Regional and interdisciplinary planning, training, and exercises to recover from catastrophic incidents
- Regional medical care capabilities
- Regional volunteer planning and training
- Regional community outreach program

### **Governing Body Resolution**

The California Governor's Office of Emergency Services (Cal OES) requires the submission of the attached Governing Body Resolution (Attachment 3) as a part of the application package that is due to Cal OES. The Governing Body Resolution authorizes specified LA City Officials to execute for and on behalf of the City of Los Angeles any actions necessary for the purpose of obtaining federal financial assistance under the FY18 UASI.

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When notified of an award, the Mayor's Office will return to City Council and request authority to accept its grant award share. At that time, detailed information will be provided regarding the specific projects to be funded under the FY18 UASI award and the allocations for each jurisdiction within the LA/LB Urban Area.

### Recommendations

It is therefore requested that the City Council:

- 1. **AUTHORIZE** the Mayor's Office of Public Safety to submit the FY 2018 Urban Areas Security Initiative grant application to the California Governor's Office of Emergency Services on behalf of the City of Los Angeles and the Los Angeles/Long Beach Urban Area, for the estimated \$54,888,000 allocation. Final amount will be made available within the acceptance transmittal;
- 2. ADOPT the attached Governing Body Resolution to designate the City entities that will apply for and manage Federal financial assistance provided by the Federal Department of Homeland Security and sub-granted through the State of California; and
- 3. INSTRUCT the City Administrative Officer to report back with the necessary actions to approve and accept the FY18 UASI award once applications are evaluated and funding is allocated by the Department of Homeland Security, subject to Council and Mayor approval.

As noted at the September 2017 Homeland Security Grant Program (HSGP) workshops, Cal OES plans to submit a statewide project-based application again this year for FY 2018 HSGP funding.

In preparation for the submission of the State's FY 2018 HSGP application, subrecipients were asked to begin project planning efforts in October. While the final FY 2018 award amounts cannot be established until the official Department of Homeland Security (DHS) Notice of Funding Opportunity (NOFO) is released, California subrecipients are to begin developing projects based on their FY 2017 allocations and the Cal OES FY 2018 Investment Justifications.

In order to accommodate *possible* cuts to the HSGP program, Cal OES subrecipients were asked to prioritize their projects based on a 75%/25% prioritization split using their FY 2017 HSGP allocation. Should there be a cut to the federal FY 2018 HSGP program, projects (or a portion of projects) falling within the lower tier 25% allocation will be withdrawn from the application, as needed. In addition, projects earmarked for the first 75% of subrecipient allocations were to include one or two scalable projects; projects earmarked for the last 25% of funding were also to include one or two scalable projects. Both sets of scalable projects shown in your Advance Application, as well as the projects falling within your 25% lower tier, will later be used to adjust to the final FY 2018 allocations (if needed).

During the September workshops, subrecipients were also instructed to begin planning for a *potential* 25% match requirement. Cal OES has adjusted the FY 2018 Financial Management Forms Workbook (FMFW) to accommodate match reporting, should a match requirement be implemented. While information on match has been included in the 2018 FMFW, subrecipients are <u>not</u> required to include match projects in their Advance Applications. Subrecipients will be

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required to fully develop and submit their match projects at the time of final application submission, should a match requirement be implemented under the HSGP.

The FY 2018 Advance Application process and changes to the FY 2018 FMFW will be reviewed during a series of webinars slated for the first part of December.

For advance planning purposes, the following is a provisional schedule for the FY 2018 HSGP Advance Application process.

April 1, 2018	Submission of SAA Application

The above schedule was developed based on a February 1, 2018, release of the FY 2018 NOFO with a 60-day application period. While an earlier release of the NOFO will affect some of the above dates, it is not anticipated that the advance application due date will change.

Finally, and to assist you in the development of your FY 2018 HSGP Advance Application, Cal OES has developed and released *The State of California Federal Fiscal Year 2018 Guidance for Writing Homeland Security Investment Justification Projects*. This document summarizes the training that was presented during the September HSGP workshops – it outlines how to properly develop and write HSGP funded projects, and provides information on how to accurately and consistently align projects to investment areas and core capabilities.
