I oppose the Planning Commission's recommendations to upzone the R1 neighborhoods to the south of the Bundy Station.

Demolishing 200 homes to families, seniors and children should be a last resort. <u>Our Community Plan says that single-family housing shall be preserved</u>, and the Expo Line changes none of that. You would have to amend the Community Plan to allow the destruction of these 200 houses, which should not be done in an overlay plan.

You should let the other parcels be developed over the next 10 years. If more housing is needed at that point, the Plan can be revised through a subsequent public process, and more housing locations can be found.

Please listen to us neighbors who live here, not only the developers and the land owners who wish to build 5-story stucco apartments next to our beloved 1-story houses.

We had a 5-story 54 unit apartment building with 3 and 4 bedroom units built next door to us and it's mostly vacant, likely due to the \$4200+/ month cost of rent. Rather than keep building more units, we would be better served by our council members working to lower our state and local taxes so we all have more money to spend on things like rent.
