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I. BACKGROUND

A. ADMINISTRATIVE ENTITY

The City of Los Angeles Department of Aging (LADOA) is designated by the California Department of Aging as Planning Service Area 25, an Area Agency on Aging (AAA) responsible for providing senior and caregiver services to older adults who are 60 years of age or older. According to the 2016 American Community Survey 1-Year Estimates, it is estimated that the City of Los Angeles is home to approximately 686,165 adults age 60 or over.

LADOA was established in 1983 with a mission to improve the quality of life, independence, health and dignity of the City's older population by managing community based senior programs that are comprehensive, coordinated and accessible, and to advocate for the needs of older adults and their family caregivers.

On behalf of the City of Los Angeles, the Los Angeles Department of Aging will serve as the administrative entity for this request for proposals (RFP). LADOA has been authorized to release this RFP pursuant to action(s) approved by the Los Angeles City Council and Mayor (City Council File No. 14-1660).

B. PROGRAM OVERVIEW

Senior services are provided pursuant to the Older Americans Act (OAA) under Title III (parts B and C) and the Proposition A Transportation program, which provides for social, nutrition, and transportation services to persons aged 60 and older with an emphasis on serving seniors with the greatest economic or social need, and with particular attention to minorities and those individuals with non or limited proficiency in the English language whose income is at or below the poverty line. These services shall be provided at a Multipurpose Senior Centers (MPCs) which are the designated focal points of the senior citizen community.

The City has been divided into fifteen geographic areas (see *Aging Service Area Maps*, **Attachment 29**). The LADOA will award <u>one</u> contract to provide social, nutrition, and transportation services per ASA.

II. RFP SPECIFICATIONS

A. SCOPE OF WORK

1. DESCRIPTION OF SERVICES

a. Social Service Program

The intent of the Multipurpose Senior Center Social Services, Nutrition, and Transportation Programs for the Elderly is the provision of services that are necessary for the general welfare of older adults 60+ years of age and designed to assist them in avoiding institutionalization. The Social Service Program is funded under Title III-B of the Older Americans Act and provides supportive services enabling older adults to remain living in their home. Those services as defined in the National Aging Programs Information System (NAPIS) and the National Ombudsman Reporting System (NORS) and are categorized as **Priority Services** and **Other Support Services**.

i. Priority Services are divided into three sub-categories:

<u>Access Services:</u> Information & Assistance, Care Management, Assisted Transportation, Transportation, Outreach, Comprehensive Assessment, Health, Mental Health and Public Information;

<u>In-Home Services:</u> Personal Care, Homemaker, Chore, Visiting, Respite Care, Residential Repairs/Modifications, Telephone Reassurance; and

<u>Legal Assistance:</u> Legal Advice, counseling and/or representation by an attorney or other person acting under the supervision of an attorney.

ii. The following services are identified as Other Support Services:

Cash/Material Aid; Community Education; Disaster Preparedness Materials; Employment; Housing; Interpretation/Translation; Mobility Management Activities; Peer Counseling; Personal Affairs Assistance; Personal/ Home Security; Registry; and Senior Center Activities.

Title III-B Supportive Services are, generally, centrally located and primarily provided from a designated Senior Multipurpose Center that serves as the focal point of the community.

b. Nutrition Program

i. Title III C-1 (Congregate Nutrition Services): The Congregate Nutrition Services program provides nutrition services for older individuals in a congregate setting. Services include meals, nutrition and health promotion education, health promotion programs, nutrition risk screening, and opportunities for socialization. Each meal shall provide one-third (1/3) of the Dietary Reference Intakes and comply with the current Dietary Guidelines for Americans. See **Attachment 4**, Nutrition Documentation.

ii. Title III C-2 (Home Delivered Nutrition Services): The Home Delivered Nutrition Services program provides nutrition services to homebound older individuals including meals, nutrition and health promotion education, and nutrition risk screening. Each meal shall provide one third (1/3) of the Dietary Reference Intakes and comply with the current Dietary Guidelines for Americans. See **Attachment 4**, Nutrition Documentation.

c. MPC based Senior Transportation Program

Under Proposition A (Transit funds) program, the Department of Aging makes funds available to provide personal transportation services. The Para-transit services (Prop A) Program is for older adults and individuals with disabilities to provide doorto-door service where beneficial and necessary to the client in each Aging Service Area. The intent of the Para-transit program is to provide services to help those persons whose physical or mental disabilities preclude usage of traditional curb-tocurb transit services. Vehicles are assigned to each service area. Cost sharing fees by participants are encouraged under Prop A to help offset operational costs of the program.

2. UNITS OF SERVICE

A proposer must provide the minimum level of service units as outlined in **Attachment 3.** Proposers will be rated on these minimum levels of service and their ability to augment the services with non-OAA funds. Additional units of service from non-OAA funds must be identified with appropriate budget documentation to support service levels above the minimum requirements.

3. TARGETING

Special attention is given to the *targeting* of services to older individuals with greatest economic need, older individuals with greatest social need and older individuals with frailty.

a. Frailty

The older individual is determined to be functionally impaired because the individual:

- i. Is unable to perform at least two activities of daily living without substantial human assistance, including verbal reminding, physical cueing, or supervision;
- ii. Or due to a cognitive or other mental impairment, requires substantial supervision because the individual behaves in a manner that poses a serious health or safety hazard to the individual or to another individual.

b. Greatest Economic Need

The need resulting from an income level at or below the poverty line.

c. Greatest Social Need

The need caused by non-economic factors, which include:

- i. Physical and mental disabilities;
- ii. Language barriers; and

- iii. Cultural, social, or geographical isolation, including isolation caused by racial or ethnic status, that:
 - Restricts the ability of an individual to perform normal daily tasks; or
 - Threatens the capacity of the individual to live independently.

B. OPERATING REQUIREMENTS

1. Mandated Services

a. Care Management

i. Care Management Supervisory Standards

Supervisor must have a minimum of a Bachelor's Degree in Nursing, Health, Social Services, Gerontology or other related field with three (3) years relevant experience with older adults, or, preferably, a Master's Degree in Nursing, Health, Social Services, Gerontology or other related field with one (1) year relevant experience with older adults. The Supervisor must be HIPPA compliant and must be available to care managers for scheduled conferences, provide guidance on problem cases, review client's care plans and discharge plans, ensure appropriate referrals are made upon discharge and perform other judgment decisions.

ii. Care Manager Standards

Care Managers must have at a minimum a four-year degree from an accredited college or university with a degree in nursing, social work, or gerontology, or other related field. Experience may be substituted for education on a year-foryear basis. Care managers must be HIPPA complaint and have the knowledge, skills and experience necessary to assess the client's need for services and perform the following core functions of care management: (1) intake, (2) comprehensive assessment of the client's functional and cognitive capacity and limitations, (3) development of a care plan based upon the assessment, (4) implementation of the care plan by coordinating and arranging for services; (5) routine follow-up and monitoring the client to ensure that the care plan continues to meet the client's need (a minimum of one month); (6) completion of a comprehensive reassessment on a yearly basis or sooner given the client's need; and (7) termination of care management services when appropriate. Care Managers must be able to communicate effectively with the client, client's representative and staff of other service agencies and work as a part of a multidisciplinary team of service providers on behalf of the client. The core functions of care management do not count as Information and Assistance services.

b. Information and Assistance (I&A)

Agency must identify program staff in their Organizational Chart and Personnel Budget who will be the designated Information & Assistance (I & A) Director. The I & A Director is responsible for Information and Assistance program operations and will be required to attend quarterly meetings conducted by the LADOA I & A Director. The agency's I & A Director and any applicable I & A staff must be Alliance of Information Referral Systems (AIRS) certified during the contract cycle.

c. Outreach

Agency must have planned outreach activities to ensure targeting is in agreement with Older American Act and Department of Aging requirements (see Outreach under Program Requirements below).

d. Nutrition Services

- i. Agency must have sufficient personnel to carry out the needs of the program, including a Nutrition Director. All positions must be in the organizational chart and identified in the budget document.
- **ii.** The Nutrition Director must have no less than a Bachelor's degree with an emphasis in nutritional science, food service management or gerontology. Preferably, the Nutrition Director will have no less than two years of relevant experience with nutrition and food service management.
- **iii.** Agency must have written procedures to protect the confidentiality and privacy of client information collected for program purposes.
- **iv.** The Nutrition Program (C1 and C2) Director's managerial function must be delineated in the job description and separate from the Senior Multipurpose Center Director and/or Social Services Director. The Nutrition Program Director must have complete oversight of the nutrition program (C1 and C2 components).
- **v.** Agencies proposing sub-contracting the preparation of meals are required to contract only with caterers approved by the LADOA (see LADOA Approved Caterer List-**Attachment 4**).
- **vi.** Agencies proposing the operation of a <u>project kitchen facility</u> or an <u>approved</u> <u>caterer</u> must submit proof of the following existing in proposer's operations:
 - Public health permit;
 - Business license;
 - Food Official Inspection Report (recent 6 months);
 - Certified Food Handler (two on-site staff for every 8 hours of operation) and Certified Food Handler Permits;
 - Insurance including Product Liability, Workers' Compensation, and General Liability;
 - Hazard Analysis Critical Control Point (HACCP) policies;
 - A Registered Dietitian Supervising meal production or a Food Production Manager with a Certified Food Handler Permit;
 - Agencies must conform to all proposer requirements contained in **Attachment 4**.
- **2.** Contractors must form collaborations with community agencies, family source centers and other organizations in order to ensure comprehensive and coordinated service delivery and to prevent duplication of services.
- **3.** Contractors shall outreach to serve all ethnic groups in each ASA in which services are being provided. (See **Attachment 30**).

- 4. Participant Involvement:
 - **a.** Contractors must provide participants with the opportunity to voluntarily and confidentially contribute to the cost of the social, nutrition, and transportation services.
 - **b.** Contractors must have procedures to protect the confidentiality and privacy of information about, or obtained from, participants.
- **5.** Contractors must designate congregate dining centers, where social services may also be provided, in communities within the proposed ASA.
- 6. Proposers may review the California Department of Aging Congregate Nutrition and Home Delivered Meals Index to receive further information on the program requirements. This information can be accessed at: <u>https://www.aging.ca.gov/ProgramsProviders/AAA/Nutrition/</u>.
- 7. Contractors must maintain a cash reserve, without using grant funds, equal to the amount it would cost to operate the program for three months.
- **8.** Contractors must establish a written grievance process for reviewing and attempting to resolve complaints of older individuals.
- **9.** Contractors must have a written contingency plan describing how services, as specified in this RFP, will be maintained during the event of a disaster or emergency.
- **10.** All contractors must maintain a registry of program participants for emergency purposes only.
- **11.** All proposers with an MPC site that is located in a City-owned facility are required to have a lease agreement established within 90 days of the execution of the contract.
- **12.** All Contractors must identify someone as the Emergency Preparedness Coordinator (EPC) who will implement the agency emergency plan and oversee continuance of services to seniors during and after an emergency. The EPC is the designated point of contact person between the contractor and the LADOA and is required to attend emergency preparedness/response training, activities and/or meetings as directed by the LADOA.

C. PROGRAM REQUIREMENTS

1. Mandated Services

A proposer contracts with the LADOA and must provide a minimum amount of service in each ASA it is proposing to serve. Below are programs mandated to be provided, and within each program there is a minimum level of service required (**Attachment 3**). Agencies must submit a proposal that contains the minimum units of service to be provided for each mandated program. Level of service is measured in units of service. The unit of service measurement is in parentheses adjacent to the service.

a. Care Management

i. Program Standards

Agency must be able to provide a professional assessment of a client's cognitive, health, medical, social, emotional, environment and financial capacities. Agency must ensure that clients participating in the Home Delivered Meals program or the MPC Based Alternate Senior Transportation Program are assessed by a Care Manager. Agency must have the capacity to provide <u>per client</u>: (1) 1-2 hours of Comprehensive Assessment that covers health, cognitive status, financial status, mood status and family/support system, (2) 1 hour of Care Planning, (3) 1 hour of Service Arrangement or Authorization <u>each</u> time client needs assistance, (4) 1 hour <u>per month</u> of Case Monitoring, and (5) Annual Comprehensive Reassessment. For homebound older adults, an annual home visit is required.

Agency must have written procedures to protect the confidentiality and privacy of client information collected for program purposes, and maintain documentation for Care Management Services provided for each client. All client-related files must be kept safe and under lock and key, whether or not the client is in active care management or has been inactive for more than one year (closed). Care Managers or anyone who has access to client files must be cleared via a fingerprint/background check.

ii. Standards for Client Rights and Responsibilities

The agency is to have a written document listing the rights and responsibilities of the client that is to be disseminated to the client at the time of the comprehensive assessment. This document should include, but not be limited to: (1) the client has the ability to refuse service at any time, (2) indicate that client information shared with other professionals or provider agencies must have the client's written permission for release, (3) client has the right at any time to amend, correct or delete any information, (4) contain assurances of the client's right to privacy, and (5) include a provision for the confidential treatment of all client information retained by the agency. The agency's grievance and appeal process should also be clearly presented.

b. Information and Assistance

Agency must provide the following services as defined below:

- i. Provide individuals with information on services available within the communities;
- ii. Links individuals to the services and opportunities that are available within the communities;
- iii. To the maximum extent practicable, establishes adequate follow-up procedures. Internet web site "hits" are to be counted only if information is requested, supplied, and is satisfying to the client;
- iv. To the maximum extent practicable, includes offering a follow-up call to all individuals who were linked to a service (individuals can remain anonymous and refuse a follow-up call).

c. <u>Senior Center Activities (1 hour)</u>

Services are designed to enable older individuals to attain and/or maintain physical and mental well-being such as recreation, music, creative arts, physical activity, education, leadership development and other supportive services not covered under other service categories. Development and provision of new volunteer opportunities and services, and creation of additional services and programs to remedy gaps and deficiencies in existing services. Entertainment costs such as tickets to shows or sporting events, meals, lodging, rentals, transportation and gratuities, are not allowable.

d. Personal Affairs Assistance (1 contact)

Personal Affairs Assistance provides assistance in writing letters and with the completion of financial forms, including tax forms, and other written or electronic documents.

e. Outreach (1 contact)

Outreach activities refer to interventions initiated by an agency or organization for the purpose of identifying potential clients and encouraging their use of existing services and benefits. Outreach is measured by the number of individual, one-on-one contacts between a service provider and an older adult client (60+ years of age). Mailers and activities that involve contact with several current or potential clients are considered group services and <u>cannot</u> be counted as a unit of outreach.

f. In-Home Services

Agencies must provide the following services as defined below:

- i. Personal Care (1 hour) providing personal assistance, stand-by assistance, supervision or cues for persons with the inability to perform one or more of the following activities of daily living: eating, bathing, toileting, transferring in and out of bed/chair, walking, dressing, and grooming.
- ii. Homemaker (1 hour) providing assistance to persons with the inability to perform one or more of the following instrumental activities of daily living: preparing meals, shopping for personal and household items, managing money, using the telephone or doing light housework.
- iii. Chore (1 hour) providing assistance to persons having difficulty with one or more of the following instrumental activities of daily living: heavy housework, yard work or sidewalk and other home maintenance.

g. General Nutrition Services

All agencies must conform to the following program requirements:

i. Meals provided by the Congregate Nutrition Program (Title III-C1) and the Home Delivered Meal Program (Title III-C2) must meet the Dietary Reference Intakes and conform to the most recent Dietary Guidelines for Americans.

- ii. <u>One unit of service</u> is measured as <u>one hot meal</u> provided to, generally, one older adult (60+).
- iii. Meals provided for each program must be served a minimum of once per day every Monday through Friday each week, excluding City Holidays (See Attachment 31), during the mid-day. Meals must be provided for a minimum of 249 days.
- iv. Agency must have in place an approved menu for each program that covers a minimum period of six (6) weeks.
- v. The Title III-C1 and Title III-C2 program must contain an outreach component as defined on page 8 of this document.

h. <u>Title III-C1 Requirements</u>

- i. All meals must be provided in a congregate setting (Dining Centers) and each meal must be hot.
- ii. Dining Centers must be located throughout the Aging Service Area (ASA [see **Attachment 29**]) and sites are to be identified in the Work Program.
- iii. Proposer's proposal package must include a signed agreement by the management of the facility the dining center will be located in.
- iv. Dining Centers must maintain a minimum participation rate of 30 seniors per day.
- v. Planned activities must be conducted at all dining centers.

i. <u>Title III-C2 Requirements</u>

- i. All Home Delivered Meals must be delivered hot.
- ii. Meal Delivery Routes cannot be longer than 2 hours.
- iii. All Title III-C2 clients must receive an in-home assessment prior to service authorization.
- iv. All Title III-C2 clients must receive two telephone assessments and two inhome assessments in each program year.

j. <u>MPC Based Alternate Senior Transportation Program</u> Prop A Door-to-Door

- i. Program Staff Requirements for the Transportation Program:
 - Reference/Background Checks
 - Physical Examination
 - Drug/Alcohol Screening

- Driver's Training (ongoing every three months)
- Valid Class B California Driver's License
- Los Angeles City Board of Transportation Commissioner's Medical Examination Certificate
- American Red Cross First Aid Card
- Certificate of Cardiopulmonary Resuscitation Training that meets American Heart Association or American Red Cross Standards
- All trips must be within City limits
- ii. Client Eligibility Requirements for the Transportation Program:
 - Los Angeles City Resident
 - 65 Years of age or older
 - Registered Client
 - Donations are encouraged but not required
 - Require Door-to-Door Assistance due to physical or mental disability.
 - Subscription service is restricted to medical appointments and nutrition

Refer to the MPC Based Senior Alternate Transportation Program, Manual of Policies and Procedures. Available upon request.

2. Data Performance Reporting

Each month an agency will be required to report to the LADOA the number of units of service performed in each program area. The LADOA will forward these figures to the California Department of Aging.

3. Financial Expenditure Standards

- **a.** Contracts for OAA Title III funds for 2019/2020 will contain a financial expenditure standard clause. In reviewing expenditures the performance standard to be used will be 95%-110% of the planned goal.
- **b.** A contractor whose expenditures fall outside of the standard will not be in compliance with the contract. Such noncompliance may jeopardize a contractor's chance of receiving redistributed funds.
- **c.** A contractor is required to maintain advances of Federal funds in interest-bearing bank accounts per Program instruction AoA-PI-98-01.

4. Program Performance Standards

The contractor agrees that when program performance falls below ninety-five (95) percent or exceeds one hundred and ten (110) percent of the contracted unit of service level for any quarter, contractors may be required to develop and submit a corrective action plan to the LADOA that will be reviewed for approval. The 110% cap does not apply to transportation related services.

D. COMPUTER/AUTOMATION REQUIREMENTS

- 1. Contractor shall agree to the installation of a personal computer and peripheral equipment, software, telecommunication lines and/or Wi-Fi to the LADOA's host computer, at service center site(s) and/or operating agency's administrative office(s), at the discretion of the LADOA as automated systems are developed. Said computer, peripheral equipment, and software are to be loaned to service provider by the LADOA.
- **2.** Contractor shall provide a locked room at the service center site to house said computer, peripheral equipment, and software.
- **3.** All contractors must have the capability to receive and transmit information via Electronic Mail. Contractors must have resources to send and receive e-mail.
- **4.** Contractor shall obtain fire and theft insurance coverage for replacement of new computer, peripheral equipment, and software from the time of installation to the end of contract. Contractor shall reimburse LADOA for the cost (new) of all loaned computer, peripheral equipment, and software from proceeds of insurance claims due to loss of same through fire or theft.
- **5.** Contractor shall provide trained personnel to operate a personal computer for reporting automated reports as such reporting systems are developed by LADOA.
- **6.** Contractor shall provide ready access to LADOA personnel during regular working hours for inspection and/or recovery of computer, peripheral equipment, and software.
- 7. Contractor shall provide printer paper supplies, printer cartridges, and compact diskettes (CD) / flash drives.
- 8. The Security Awareness Training (SAT) process is mandated by the California Department of Aging (CDA) to enable all CDA affiliates to understand information security responsibilities and the consequences of infractions and to integrate information security practices into daily work. All successful proposers must read, complete, and maintain a copy of the SAT certificate of completion on an annual basis for existing employees with access to client information or the LADOA Client Tracking System (CTS). New employees must complete the training within thirty (30) days of their start date.
- **9.** The successful proposer will use computerized reporting for fiscal and National Aging Program Information System (NAPIS) and any other reports, as software reporting systems are developed. The successful proposer will provide personnel with sufficient skills in automation to support such systems when installed and will designate a liaison to the LADOA regarding the NAPIS (this individual should appear in the personnel section of the budget [**Attachment 2**] and organization chart). LADOA reserves the right to approve the skill levels of such personnel assigned to support automated reporting systems.

E. ELIGIBLE ORGANIZATIONS

An organization is eligible to bid if it is a legally constituted public, private nonprofit, or private body rendering services in social, nutrition, and/or transportation services as described herein. Organizations must demonstrate a minimum of two years continuous experience within the past five years.

Non-profit organizations must meet all of the following criteria:

- Have current 501(c)(3) status.
- Are qualified to conduct business in the State of California and in good standing with the California Secretary of State and other applicable regulatory oversight agencies.
- If an agency is located in another state, it must be qualified to conduct business there and be in good standing.
- Have not been determined to be non-responsible or been debarred by the City pursuant to the Contractor Responsibility Ordinance.
- Have not been debarred by the federal government, state of California, or local government.

F. ANNUAL ESTIMATED PROGRAM FUNDING

b. Based on the 2016 American Community Survey 1-Year Estimates, there are an estimated 686,165 senior citizens living within the city limits of Los Angeles. The chart above divides the total proposed federal dollars available for social,

nutrition, and transportation services, in each ASA.

c. The OAA funds are distributed to the fifteen ASA's using a funding formula which is driven by the demographic composition of each area with a percentage weight given to each portion of the population as follows:

- d. Allocations to each ASA will be subject to change depending upon the level of federal and state funding received by the city of Los Angeles.
- e. Be advised that the City reserves the right to adopt any formula that is consistent with the targeting strategy of OAA and that the dollar allocations identified above are subject to change. Final determination will be made at the time the City makes contract offers to successful proposers.

2. CONTRACTOR MATCHING SHARE

Older Americans Act Funds

- a. Contractors are expected to provide a matching share. The LADOA considers 10% matching share as typical (10% of the total funding of the project). The matching share may be cash or an in-kind contribution (see **Attachment 2** for definition) or a combination thereof.
- b. Contractor's Matching Share = The 10% matching share is computed by multiplying the grant share by 11.11%. The product is 10% of the total funding of the project.

3. PROGRAM INCOME SHARE

- a. Program income is income earned from activities of which the cost is partly or entirely borne by the grant. It can include participant donations, proceeds from the sale of personal or real property, rental fees, interest, and/or royalties received on patents and copyrights from contract supported activities. It must be equivalent to a minimum of 10% of the OAA funding.
- b. Program Income Share = Grant Share x 10%. For example, if your OAA share \$90,000, then your program income share is \$9,000.
- c. Voluntary participant contributions shall be budgeted as Program Income.
- d. Program Income must be used to expand services of the program from which it is generated.

4. NUTRITION SERVICES INCENTIVE PROGRAM (NSIP)

a. The NSIP provides incentives to encourage and reward effective and efficient delivery of nutritious meals to older adults. The program is administered by the

Administration on Aging (AoA) within the federal Department of Health and Human Services. The NSIP cash or commodity allocation to State Units on Aging (SUA) and Indian Tribal Organizations (ITO) is a proportional share of the annual appropriation based on the number of meals served in the prior year.

- b. For purposes of this RFP NSIP is to be allocated as follows: the amount of NSIP for each Congregate Meal (C1) served is \$0.74. The amount of NSIP for each Homebound Meal delivered is \$1.33. Please be aware that the manner in which the LADOA allocates NSIP in the language of the contract may not be the same as described in this RFP.
- c. NSIP funds shall only be used to purchase domestically produced foods for nutrition programs.
- d. NSIP funding must be allocated toward the expansion of meals only.

G. CONTRACT TERM

This RFP is for the period from July 1, 2019 through June 30, 2020. At the discretion of the City, the contract may be renewed and renegotiated for a period of up to three additional years in one-year increments, depending on the availability of funds, the contractor's performance, and the best interests of the City.

Proposals will be evaluated against others proposing to provide the same services identified in this RFP. The City reserves the right to verify information contained in the proposal. If the information cannot be verified, and if the errors are not willful, the City reserves the right to reduce the rating points.

The City's decision to award a contract will be based on the stated evaluation criteria. C. STATEMENTS REQUIRED WITH PROPOSAL

1. Contractor Responsibility Ordinance (CRO) Questionnaire

Every Request for Proposal, Request for Bid, Request for Qualifications or other procurement process is subject to the provisions of the Contractor Responsibility Ordinance, Section 10.40 et seq. of Article 14, Chapter 1 of Division 10 of the Los Angeles Administrative Code, unless exempt pursuant to the provisions of the Ordinance.

This Ordinance requires that all proposers/bidders complete and return, with their response, the responsibility questionnaire included in this procurement. Failure to return the completed questionnaire may result in the proposer/bidder being deemed non-responsive.

The Ordinance also requires that if a contract is awarded pursuant to this procurement, that the contractor must update responses to the questionnaire, within thirty calendar days, after any changes to the responses previously provided if such change would affect contractor's fitness and ability to continue performing the contract.

Pursuant to the Ordinance, by executing a contract with the City, the contractor pledges, under penalty of perjury, to comply with all applicable federal, state and local laws in performance of the contract, including but not limited to laws regarding health and safety, labor and employment, wage and hours, and licensing laws which affect employees. Further, the Ordinance, requires each contractor to: (1) notify the

awarding authority within thirty calendar days after receiving notification that any governmental agency has initiated an investigation which may result in a finding that the contractor is not in compliance with Section 10.40.3 (a) of the Ordinance; and (2) notify the awarding authority within thirty (30) calendar days of all findings by a government agency or court of competent jurisdiction that the contractor has violated Section 10.40.3 (a) of the Ordinance.

All proposers shall submit a completed City of Los Angeles Responsibility (CRO) Questionnaire signed under penalty of perjury with their proposal (see **Attachment 9**). If a proposer will have subcontractors in the project, a list of the subcontractors must also be submitted with the proposal.

2. Conflict of Interest

Proposers shall submit a completed Conflict of Interest Statement (See **Attachment 10**) indicating that no present director, officer, member or employee of the City of Los Angeles has any financial or personal interest, direct or indirect, in any agreement resulting from this offer and will not have such interest for a period of one (1) year after his/her employment with the City of Los Angeles.

3. Proposer Workforce Information/Non-Collusion Statement

Proposers shall submit with their proposal a statement indicating their headquarters address, as well as the percentage of their workforce residing in the City of Los Angeles. Proposer shall also submit a completed Workforce Information/Non-Collusion Statement (See **Attachment 11**).

4. Municipal Lobbying Ordinance CEC Form 50

NOTE: Failure to submit this completed CEC Form 50 will result in the proposer being deemed non-responsive and the proposal will be rejected.

5. Municipal Campaign Finance Ordinance CEC Form 55

Persons who submit a response to this solicitation (proposers) are subject to Charter Section 470(c)(12) and related ordinances. As a result, proposers may not make campaign contributions to and or engage in fundraising for certain elected City officials or candidates for elected City office from the time they submit the response until either the contract is approved or, for successful proposers, twelve (12) months after the contract is signed. The proposer's principals and subcontractors performing \$100,000 or more in work on the contract, as well as the principals of those subcontractors, are also subject to the same limitations on campaign contributions and fundraising.

Proposers must submit CEC Form 55 (provided in Attachment 13) to the awarding

authority at the same time the response is submitted. The form requires proposers to identify their principals, their subcontractors performing \$100,000 or more in work on the contract, and the principals of those subcontractors. 12. Living Wage Ordinance and Service Contractor Worker Retention Ordinance

Unless approved for an exemption, contractors under contracts primarily for the furnishing of services to or for the City and that involve an expenditure in excess of \$25,000 and a contract term of at least three (3) months, lessees and licensees of City property, and certain recipients of City financial assistance, shall comply with the provisions of Los Angeles Administrative Code Sections 10.37 et seq., Living Wage Ordinance (LWO) and 10.36 et seq., Worker Retention Ordinance (WRO). Any contract awarded pursuant to this RFP shall:

- 1. Comply with the Americans with Disabilities Act, as amended, 42 U.S.C. Section 12101 et seq., the Rehabilitation Act of 1973, as amended, 29 U.S.C. Section 701 et seq., the Fair Housing Act, and its implementing regulations and any subsequent amendments; and California Government Code Section 11135.
- 2. Not discriminate in the provision of its programs, services or activities on the

basis of disability or on the basis of a person's relationship to, or association with, a person who has a disability.

- 3. Provide reasonable accommodation upon request to ensure equal access to all of its programs, services and activities.
- 4. Contractor represents that it will certify that any construction for housing performed with funds provided through any future contract will be done in accordance with the Uniform Federal Accessibility Standards (UFAS), 24 CFR, Part 40.
- 5. Contractor represents that it will certify that its buildings, and facilities used to provide services in accordance with any future contract, are in compliance with the federal and state standards for accessibility as set forth in the 2010 ADA Standards, California Title 24, Chapter 11, or other applicable federal and state law.
- 6. Contractor understands that the City is relying upon these certifications and representations as a condition of funding any future contract.
- 7. Contractor will require its subcontractors, in any, to include this language in any subcontract.
- 8. Contractors must be in compliance with these provisions at the time the contract is executed.
- 9. Contractor/Consultant must ensure that their website is compliant with the Americans with Disabilities Act (ADA) Section 508.

Proposers are required to complete, sign and submit the Certification Regarding Compliance with Americans with Disabilities Act form with their proposal (See **Attachment 23**).

14. Child Support Assignment Orders

Any contract awarded pursuant to this RFP shall be subject to the following:

This Contract is subject to Section 10.10 of the Los Angeles Administrative Code, Child Support Assignment Orders Ordinance. Pursuant to this Ordinance, Contractor/Consultant certifies that it will (1) fully comply with all State and Federal employment reporting requirements applicable to Child Support Assignment Orders; (2) that the principal owner(s) of Contractor/Consultant are in compliance with any Wage and Earnings Assignment Orders and Notices of Assignment applicable to them personally; (3) fully comply with all lawfully served Wage and Earnings Assignment Orders and Notices of Assignment in accordance with California Family Code Section 5230 et seq.; and (4) maintain such compliance throughout the term of this Contract. Pursuant to Section 10.10.b of the Los Angeles Administrative Code, failure of Contractor/Consultant to comply with all applicable reporting requirements or to implement lawfully served Wage and Earnings Assignment Orders and Notices of Assignment or the failure of any principal owner(s) of Contractor/Consultant to comply with any Wage and Earnings Assignment Orders and Notices of Assignment applicable to them personally shall constitute a default by the Contractor/Consultant under the terms of this Contract, subjecting this Contract to termination where such failure shall continue for more than ninety (90) days after notice of such failure to Contractor/Consultant City. Any subcontract entered into by bv the Contractor/Consultant relating to this Contract, to the extent allowed hereunder, shall be subject to the provisions of this paragraph and shall incorporate the provisions of

the Child Support Assignment Orders Ordinance. Failure of the Contractor/Consultant to obtain compliance of its subcontractors shall constitute a default by the Contractor/Consultant under the terms of this contract, subjecting this Contract to termination where such failure shall continue for more than ninety (90) days after notice of such failure to Contractor/Consultant by the City.

Contractor/Consultant shall comply with the Child Support Compliance Act of 1998 of the State of California Employment Development Department. Contractor/Consultant assures that to the best of its knowledge it is fully complying with the earnings assignment orders of all employees, and is providing the names of all new employees to the New Hire Registry maintained by the Employment Development Department as set forth in subdivision (1) of the Public Contract Code 7110

Proposers are required to complete, sign and submit the Certification Regarding Compliance with Child Support Obligations. (See **Attachment 24**: Child Support Obligations).

15. LABAVN Certification

All proposers shall register on the Los Angeles Business Assistance Virtual Network (LABAVN) at the following website: <u>www.labavn.org</u> and submit the required online documentation (Items 17 through 20, See **Attachment 25**).

16. Equal Benefits Ordinance (EBO) /First Source Hiring Ordinance (FSHO) Compliance Affidavits

All proposers are advised that any contract awarded pursuant to this procurement process shall be subject to the applicable provisions of Los Angeles Administrative Code Section 10.8.2.1, Equal Benefits Ordinance (EBO) and the Los Angeles Administrative Code Sections 10.44 et seq., First Source Hiring Ordinance (FSHO).

Effective July 1, 2016, the Equal Benefits Ordinance and First Source Hiring Ordinance Compliance affidavits were combined into one web application form available on the City of Los Angeles' Business Assistance Virtual Network (BAVN) residing at www.labavn.org. If subject to the ordinances, a contractor will be required to complete the web application form, electronically sign, and submit. If a form was uploaded and verified prior to July 1, 2016, these will continue to be valid until they expire or are deleted (generally three years from upload date). When the form expires, a contractor will be required to complete the new web application form.

Equal Benefits Ordinance

By completing and uploading the Equal Benefits Ordinance Compliance Affidavit,

your company is certifying compliance with the requirements of said ordinance. If selected as a successful Proposer, your EBO Compliance Affidavit will be verified for completeness by the Office of Contract Compliance (OCC) prior to contract award. 19. Local Business Preference Program and Affidavit of Eligibility

Awarding Authorities shall grant an eight percent Local Business Preference to Local Businesses contracts involving consideration in excess of \$150,000. 3. Secretary of State Documentation

All contractors are required to submit one copy of their Articles of Incorporation, partnership, or other business organizational documents (as appropriate) filed with the Secretary of the State. Organizations must be in good standing and authorized to do business in California, as registered contractors with the State of California. Visit the Secretary of State's website for more information at: https://businesssearch.sos.ca.gov/.

4. Proof of IRS Number (W-9)

All contractors are required to complete and submit Proof of IRS Number (W-9) form. (Refer to link: <u>http://www.irs.gov/pub/irs-pdf/fw9.pdf</u>) Request for Taxpayer Identification Number (Form W-9).

5. Non-Discrimination/Equal Employment Practices/Affirmative Action

Effective July 1, 2016 the Non-Discrimination / Equal Employment Practices and Affirmative Action (ND/EEP and AA) provisions were amended to eliminate the need for contractors to complete affidavits on BAVN. By affixing its signature to a contract, the contractor agrees to adhere to the ND/EEP and AA for the duration of the contract. When a contractor signs the contract, they will also be acknowledging their responsibility to comply with both the ND/EEP and AA provisions. The AA provisions will now apply to all construction contracts and all non-construction contracts of \$25,000 or more.

E. SUBCONTRACT COMPETITIVE BID REQUIREMENTS

- All subcontracts exceeding \$500 must be let only by the competitive bidding process in compliance with City bidding procedures (see Los Angeles City Charter, Section 371), except when the subcontractor is the sole supplier of services or materials. Any procurement exceeding \$10,000 must also comply with the requirements of the OMB Circular A-102.
- 2. Prior to entering into any subcontract of \$500 or more a contractor shall submit to the City evidence that it has received a minimum of three bids for said subcontract and justification for the selection of the successful bidder or documentation indicating it is a sole supplier. F.AUDITS

- **1.** Any audit of a LADOA contracted agency may be subject to review and oversight by the City's single audit contractor.
- 2. A contractor agrees to hire an auditor to audit the organization and test the financial integrity of the contractor's transactions. The contractor will be reimbursed by the LADOA for the audit fees. This audit shall be conducted within the contract period in accordance with:
 - a. Single Audit P.L. 98-502
 - b. OMB Circulars A-110, and A-133
 - c. OMB Compliance supplement for Single Audits of State and Local Governments (service delivery level)
 - d. City Council action dated February 4, 1987, Council File No. 84-2259-S-1
 - e. Administrative regulations or field memos which implement the OAA.
- **3.** The City reserves the right to withhold funds, disallow costs, suspend payments, or impose the default, probation, suspension, and termination clause of the agreement if the contractor fails to comply with the Single Audit Act and its provisions and/or until the audit is completed satisfactorily.

G. CONTRACTOR EVALUATION ORDINANCE

At the end of the contract, the City will conduct an evaluation of the Contractor's performance. The City may also conduct evaluations of the Contractor's performance during the term of the contract. As required by Section 10.39.2 of the Los Angeles Administrative Code, evaluations will be based on a number of criteria, including the quality of work product or service performed, the timeliness of performance, financial issues, the Contractor's compliance with budget requirements, and the expertise of personnel that the Contractor assigns to the contract. A copy of the Contractor Evaluation Form is available upon request. The Contractor will be provided with a copy of the final City evaluation and allowed fourteen (14) calendar days to respond. The City will use the final City evaluation, and any response from the Contractor, to evaluate proposals and to conduct reference checks when awarding other contracts.

H. EMERGENCY EXPANSION OF SERVICE AREA

As a condition of this grant award, the City shall have the right to temporarily adjust the contracted service area to ensure continued program services in the event of an emergency, natural or manmade disaster, or contract termination in an adjacent Aging Service Area (ASA). The services shall be provided until a contractual agreement is established with a new contractor for the vacated ASA. The interim contractor must adhere to the funding, units of service requirements, terms and conditions established under the previous contract for the vacated ASA.

I. C-1 and C-2 MEALS COST REIMBURSEMENT RATE

LADOA will calculate a cost per unit (meal) reimbursement rate for C-1 and C-2 meals based on the final budget proposal of the successful bidder. Contract payments will be calculated as the cost reimbursement rate multiplied by the number of meals served for the month. The monthly number of meals served/billed cannot exceed the monthly increment of annual meals allotted by LADOA in the annual funding allocation notice. The monthly increment is equivalent to 1/12 of the annual allocation of meals for both the C-1 and C-2 programs.

If a Board Resolution cannot be obtained prior to proposal submission, it may be submitted no later than one (1) calendar week after the proposal submission deadline.
 - Identify the individual or firm, which prepared or assisted in preparing the proposal. If that individual or firm will not participate in the implementation of the project, describe how the transfer of responsibility will occur to ensure timely implementation.
 - If agency is a corporation, list corporate officers and voting board members and their work and home phone numbers. Do not include nonvoting members.

 - Double-sided, plain white paper
- 7. Each page of the proposal, including attachments, must be numbered sequentially at the bottom of the page to indicate Page _____of ____.
- **8.** Please use the indicative mood (will, shall, etc.) in narratives rather than the subjective (would, should, etc.) so that proposals can be easily converted to contract form.
- 9. The Proposal Checklist lists all narratives, attachments and certifications that must be included in the proposal. In assembling the completed proposal, please insert the attachments and certifications where they are indicated in the Proposal Checklist. The Proposal Checklist will serve as your Table of Contents (See Section V).

- i. Describe how Council activities will be incorporated as part of on-going program improvements.
- ii. Describe how Council will interface with agency's executive director and board of directors.
- iii. Describe how the activities/goals/objectives of the Council will be coordinated with the activities/goals/objectives of the local community Neighborhood Council.
- iv. Provide an organization chart that reflects Council's advisory role in the operations of the proposer's organization.
- v. **New Proposers** Describe efforts that will be used to develop the membership and information of a new Advisory Council including outreach, publicity, invitations, By-laws, etc.
- vi. **Existing Contractors** Provide Advisory Committee membership roster complete with the name, address and telephone number of Advisory Committee members. Provide the minutes from the first Advisory Committee meeting conducted in Fiscal Year 2018-2019.

b. Service Delivery Plan

i. **Scope of Service:** The proposer shall describe a plan for the provision of social, nutrition, and transportation services throughout the ASA for which each proposal is submitted.

• Identify and justify the location of the congregate meal sites within the ASA's (i.e., close to public transportation, large facility that accommodates activities, located near where large number of seniors congregate or live.).

iii. Targeting:

- Describe the population of the service area/community proposed to be served and include any changes in the demographics that may be anticipated.
- Describe the strategy employed that will facilitate populations who are in greatest economic and social need, with particular attention given to older individuals at the poverty level, accessing services.

iv. Staffing:

 Describe your agency's staff recruitment strategy. Explain how the strategy will enhance your ability to attract applicants that are a reflection of the clients in the ASA and experienced in working with older adults. Provide a copy of your agency's personnel policies and procedures with your proposal.

v. Outreach and New Seniors Served:

Describe your plan for outreach activities to bring new seniors into the programs, and demonstrate how the activities will attract these clients. Identify the proposed number of new seniors to be served. Identify the staff to be involved and the coordination between the Title IIIB, C, and Transportation programs.

vi. Volunteers:

Describe how volunteers will be recruited and utilized to expand and enhance programs.

vii. Client Confidentiality:

Describe the method of ensuring confidentiality in collecting and storing client information. Submit a copy of your agency's written procedures to protect the confidentially and privacy of client information collected for program purposes.

viii. Standards for Client Rights and Responsibilities:

Provide a copy of the written document from your agency listing the rights and responsibilities of the client (See page 7 of this document, "Standards for Client Rights and Responsibilities").

ix. Written Procedures for Grievance Process

Provide a copy of your agency's written grievance process for reviewing and attempting to resolve complaints of older individuals (See California Code of Regulations, Title 22 Social Security, Division 1.8 California Department of Aging, Article 5 Grievance Process, §7400).

x. Service Coordination

Describe, in detail, how your agency will coordinate the delivery of Title III-B, Title III-C and Transportation services to ensure the seamless provision of services to your clientele. iii. In-Home Services (NAPIS Program #1, 2, 3)

 - Selection process of appropriate staff, volunteers, or subcontractor to provide services.

- Discuss how the effectiveness of the program on the lives of seniors will be measured? (units of service <u>does not</u> measure the effectiveness of a program)

iv. Senior Center Activities

Senior Center Activities are designed to enable older individuals to attain and/or maintain physical and mental well-being such as recreation, music, creative arts, physical activity, education, leadership development and other supportive services, including but not limited to: <u>development and provision of</u> <u>new volunteer opportunities and services, and creation of additional services</u> <u>and programs to remedy gaps and deficiencies in existing services.</u>

- Describe how Senior Center Activities will be provided and coordinated with other MPC activities, dining center activities, and community activities. Identify staff and how the activities will be measured for effectiveness.
- Provide the number of new seniors to be served for one year.

v. Personal Affairs Assistance

Personal Affairs Assistance activities provide assistance in writing letters and with the completion of financial forms, including tax forms, and other written or electronic documents.

TITLE IIIC-1 AND C-2 NUTRITION SERVICES

Proposers must conform to the requirements of the LADOA Title III-C Program Manual. Estimated grant contribution per congregate meal is \$5.13. Estimated grant contribution per Home Delivered Meal is \$5.96. An organizational chart must be provided for the nutrition programs and program staff must be listed in the Personnel Section of the proposed budgets and clearly identified in the organizational chart.

Proposers must demonstrate that they have a qualified Nutrition Director identified in the proposal. The narrative must clearly demonstrate that the Nutrition Director identified has complete supervision of the program. The budget documents must reflect the position in the C-1 Congregate Meals budget and the C-2 Home Delivered Meals budget.

When preparing the staffing plan for this proposal, the Nutrition Director position must list the duty of "preparing and submitting an annual detailed internal program monitoring structure to the grantor agency (LADOA)" in the job description.

Describe how the Nutrition Director will monitor the internal policies and practices of every congregate dining center and every home delivered meal route. See example included in **Attachment 4**: Nutrition Documentation.

Proposing agency shall describe a plan for operating a Nutrition Program which will include, but not be limited to the following:

i. Meal Planning, Production and Distribution

ii. Title III-C1 Congregate Meals

- Total number of congregate meals served must be no less than the number of C-1 meals allocated per ASA (**Attachment 3**), and with no less than thirty meals to be served at each proposed dining center;
- Proposers shall provide a list of dining centers;
- Proposers shall provide the hours of operation at each dining center;
- Proposer shall describe how it will outreach to the community and the strategies to performance goals at each center;
- Proposers shall describe other services and/or activities to be provided at the dining center and
- Proposers shall include a list of activities that will be provided at each dining center.

iii. Title III-C2 Home-Delivered Meals

• Total number of home-delivered meals served must be no less than the number of C-2 meals allocated per ASA (**Attachment 3**);

Assessment

Description of procedures for the initial in-home assessment and quarterly reassessments of client's need for nutrition services (two phone assessments and two in-home assessments annually). See assessment requirements in **Attachment 4**;

- Demonstrate internal coordination of assessment with other social, nutrition, and in-home services programs. Identify staff members and time required to conduct quality assessments of each client (both in-home and telephone assessments must be performed by paid staff members only).
- Service Delivery Describe how service will be delivered and include the following:
 - Total number of meals to be served daily;
 - Number of meal delivery routes;
 - Maximum time allowed for the delivery of meals for each route, and the corrective action taken if the time is not maintained.
 - Staff members, both paid and volunteer, to be involved in meal delivery;
 - How agency or staff vehicles will be utilized;
 - How referrals will be made for those older adults receiving a home delivered meal that are found to be in need of additional services;
 - Describe the outreach strategies the agency will use to maintain program participation levels.

MPC BASED ALTERNATE SENIOR TRANSPORTATION PROGRAM

- i. Describe the method your agency will implement to ensure the transportation program meets the eligibility and transport requirements of the program.
- ii. Describe the outreach efforts that will be taken to ensure the minimum transport requirements are met and new seniors are attracted to utilize the transportation program.

b. Performance History

Indicate number of years providing service and number of clients served. Compare proposed service to actual service provided. Discuss attainment of proposed goals. Identify three references to verify performance. (See **Attachment 8**)

c. Fiscal Management

This section must contain a brief description of procedures for the agency's financial management system. <u>Your most recent audited financial statements</u> <u>must be provided</u>. Identify three credit references. (**Attachment 8**)

d. Staffing Plan

The proposer must submit an Organizational Chart and Job Descriptions which will be evaluated to determine whether qualifications/requirements of personnel

are suitable to provide social, nutrition, in-home service and transportation. Each program must identify the lead staff and that position must be included in the budget.

- i. **Job Descriptions**: Each funded position must have a corresponding job description that describes duties and responsibilities. The job description must contain at a minimum: the summary of duties, examples of duties and responsibilities, qualifications, experience, and education requirements.
- ii. **Organizational Chart**: The organizational chart must show clear lines of authority for each position listed in the proposed budget as well as other positions not paid with contract funds which have a direct relationship to the project. The chart should start with the Board of Directors.

e. Supplemental Funding

i. Identify any supplemental funding (such as grants) that your agency receives to support services for older adults. List the start and end dates of current grant(s).
