RECOMMENDED ACTIONS

1. That the Board of Police Commissioners (Board) REVIEW and APPROVE this report.
2. That the Board TRANSMIT the attached Memorandum of Agreement for the FY 2018-2019 Juvenile Justice Crime Prevention Act (JJCPA) Program, pursuant to Administrative Code Section 14.6(a), to the Mayor and City Council, Office of the City Administrative Officer (CAO), Office of the Chief Legislative Analyst, and the City Clerk for Committee and City Council consideration.
3. That the Board REQUEST the Mayor and City Council to:
 - A. AUTHORIZE the Chief of Police to accept the grant award of \$393,799 from the Los Angeles County Probation Department (LACPD) for the FY 2018-2019 JJCPA program for the period from July 1, 2018 to June 30, 2019;
 - B. AUTHORIZE the Chief of Police, or designee, to negotiate and execute the attached Memorandum of Agreement (MOA) for FY 2018-2019 JJCPA between the City of Los Angeles and the LACPD for the period from July 1, 2018 to June 30, 2019, for a total of \$393,799, subject to the approval of the City Attorney as to form and legality;
 - C. AUTHORIZE the Controller to set up the grant receivable and appropriate \$393,799 to appropriation account, account number to be determined, within Fund No. 339 for the receipt and disbursement of FY 2018-2019 JJCPA Grant funds;
 - D. AUTHORIZE the Los Angeles Police Department (LAPD) to spend up to the total grant amount of \$393,799 in accordance with the grant agreement;
 - E. AUTHORIZE the LAPD to submit grant reimbursement requests to the grantor and deposit the grant receipts in Fund No. 339, Department No. 70;

- F. AUTHORIZE the Controller to increase appropriations as needed from the FY 2018-2019 JJCPA Grant, account number to be determined, in Fund No. 339, Department No. 70, to Fund No. 100, Department No. 70, account number and amount as follows:

- G. AUTHORIZE the LAPD to prepare Controller's instructions for any technical adjustments, subject to the approval of the CAO, and AUTHORIZE and INSTRUCT the Controller to implement the instructions.

DISCUSSION

The LAPD has been receiving JJCPA funds since Fiscal Year 2001-2002. It is administered by the LACPD and is a collaborative effort between public agencies and community-based organizations to serve the needs of potentially "at risk" youth. The main goal of the program is to provide prevention and intervention services to youth and their families.

For FY 2018-2019 the LACPD has awarded the LAPD \$393,799 in funding through the attached MOA for the period from July 1, 2018 to June 30, 2019. The total funding will pay for sworn overtime, fifty percent of the award will fund the Safe Passages/Safe Zones Program and the other half will go to the Youth Programs.

The LAPD will continue its implementation of the "High Risk/High Need" and "Safe Passages/Safe Zones" programs, which are expected to reduce juvenile delinquency and crime. These programs aspire to maintain "Safe Passages/Safe Zones" in and around JJCPA sites for youth and their families to safely engage in daily activities, including attending school, and obtaining services from partnering agencies and community organizations. In addition, the LAPD will collaborate with the Los Angeles Unified School District to quell student conflict and arrest when they occur on JJCPA designated school campuses.

The LAPD will continue to provide enhanced patrol services in and around JJCPA sites, working with the community to identify and address problems of crime and disorder. Through directed patrol efforts, the LAPD will strive to deter gang members and others from engaging in criminal activities, while providing a sense of safety to youth and their families. In an effort to provide increased supervision to "High Risk/High Need" youth who are transitioning from probation camps to the community, the LACPD and the LAPD will continue working together to provide them with guidance and direction. Special attention will be given to those "High Risk/High Need" youth who have not met, or will be in jeopardy of not meeting, their probation reporting requirements. Once the LACPD identifies the "High Risk/High Need" youth, they will work with the LAPD to conduct probation checks at the residences of youth in an effort to offer assistance and referrals for services from community partners. This approach, which attempts to be minimally intrusive, is intended to remind youth that

someone cares and to ensure that they are not relapsing into old behavioral patterns. Borrowing from multi-systemic therapy, the attempt is to engage and empower family members who may not be aware of or may not know how to go about seeking services to assist their youth in making positive changes.

The LAPD will also conduct outreach activities through all LAPD Youth Programs. The LAPD's youth programs have proven to be an innovative and reliable solution to crime prevention and reduction objectives outside of the traditional enforcement measures. The LAPD hosts a variety of youth programs developed as community-based crime prevention and intervention strategies, which offer a positive relationship between the police, the City's youth, and their families. Youth programs provided the City's youth with positive alternatives, as well as a path that can lead to a brighter future.

The Youth program participants are provided with a safe environment to interact with their peers, while experiencing opportunity and hope. The LAPD's youth programs serve as an important element for broader community outreach efforts to build community trust and collaboration. Additionally, they are largely provided at no cost to youth participants and their families and it is through JJCPA funding that these programs are available.

SUBJECT: TRANSMITTAL OF THE MEMORANDUM OF AGREEMENT AND AWARD ACCEPTANCE FOR THE FISCAL YEAR 2018-2019 JUVENILE JUSTICE CRIME PREVENTION ACT (JJCPA) PROGRAM

Attached for your approval and signature is a transmittal to the Board of Police Commissioners seeking authorization to transmit a report to the Mayor and City Council. The report requests approval from the City Council and Mayor for the Los Angeles Police Department (LAPD) to accept the grant award of \$393,799 in funding from the Los Angeles County Probation Department for the Fiscal Year (FY) 2018-2019 Juvenile Justice Crime Prevention Act (JJCPA) Program for the period of July 1, 2018 to June 30, 2019. The LAPD is also seeking approval to execute a Memorandum of Agreement with the Los Angeles County Probation Department for the FY 2018-2019 JJCPA program.

The LAPD will utilize \$393,799 of the FY 2018-2019 JJCPA funding to provide overtime to four geographic bureaus for the Safe Passages and Youth Programs. The funding will allow the LAPD to continue its implementation of the "High Risk/High Need" and "Safe Passages/Safe Zones" programs, which are expected to reduce juvenile delinquency and crime. These programs aspire to maintain "Safe Passages/Safe Zones" in and around JJCPA sites for youth and their families to safely engage in daily activities. It will also allow the LAPD to continue conducting outreach activities through all LAPD Youth Programs, which offer community-based crime prevention and intervention strategies that foster a positive relationship between the police, the City's youth and their families.

**MEMORANDUM OF AGREEMENT
BETWEEN
COUNTY OF LOS ANGELES PROBATION DEPARTMENT
AND
CITY OF LOS ANGELES POLICE DEPARTMENT
FOR
THE JUVENILE JUSTICE CRIME PREVENTION ACT (JJCPA)
HIGH RISK/HIGH NEED AND SAFE PASSAGES/SAFE ZONES PROGRAMS**

This Memorandum of Agreement (MOA) is made and entered into this ____ day of _____, 2018 between the County of Los Angeles Probation Department, hereinafter referred to as County, and the City of Los Angeles Police Department, hereinafter referred to as Agency.

WHEREAS, the County has established the Juvenile Justice Crime Prevention Act (JJCPA) Program to reduce crime by promoting and providing services to at-risk and County youths and their families;

WHEREAS, the County, Agency, Los Angeles County Sheriff's Department, Los Angeles Unified School District, Los Angeles County District Attorney's Office, Los Angeles Superior Court, community-based organizations, and other agencies and organizations, contribute to the JJCPA Program (JJCPA Collaborative);

WHEREAS, on June 27, 2002, the County entered into a MOA with the Agency to implement the High Risk/High Need and Safe Passages/Safe Zones (HR/HN and SP/SZ) Programs, a component of the JJCPA for fiscal year 2001/2002;

WHEREAS, the County and Agency subsequently entered into additional one (1) year MOAs for operation of the HR/HN and SP/SZ Program for fiscal years 2002/2003, 2003/2004, 2004/2005, 2005/2006, 2006/2007, 2007/2008, 2008/2009, 2009/2010, 2010/2011, 2011/2012, 2012/2013, 2013/2014, 2014/2015, 2015/2016, 2016/2017 and 2017/2018;

WHEREAS, the County and Agency executed amendments to the MOAs for additional funding and enhancement for the HR/HN and SP/SZ Program during fiscal years 2003/2004, 2006/2007, and 2007/2008; and

WHEREAS, the County and Agency desire to enter into an MOA for fiscal year 2018/2019 for continuation of services rendered through the HR/HN and SP/SZ Programs.

NOW, THEREFORE, in consideration of the mutual covenants herein set forth and the mutual benefits to be derived therefrom, the parties agree as follows:

I. PURPOSE

The purpose of this MOA is to provide services to the JJCPA Program through implementation of the HR/HN and SP/SZ Programs. The HR/HN and SP/SZ Programs are aimed at reducing juvenile delinquency and crime as well as curtailing gang activity, gun violence and crime in areas that are in close proximity to schools, parks and housing developments.

II. TERM

The term of the MOA is for a one-year period beginning July 1, 2018 through June 30, 2019. Any additional renewals commencing after July 1, 2019 will be subject to approval by the County and Agency.

III. FUNDING

During the term of this MOA, the County will provide funding to the Agency in the amount of Three Hundred Ninety-Three Thousand Seven Hundred Ninety-Nine Dollars (\$393,799). These funds will be utilized by the Agency to operate the HR/HN and SP/SZ programs as detailed in Attachment A, Budget.

IV. COUNTY RESPONSIBILITIES

The County agrees, as resources allow, through the efforts of the Camp Community Transition Program, the Gang Unit, and School-Based Deputy Probation Officer IIs (DPO IIs), to provide any of the following services when appropriate:

- Make referrals to the Agency and track youth who have been referred and accepted into the Agency's HR/HN and SP/SZ Programs if they attend middle schools or high schools with an assigned Deputy Probation Officer (DPO);
- Attend monthly meetings of the partners of the JJCPA Collaborative;
- Coordinate efforts with the Agency to provide increased supervision to HR/HN youths transitioning from the camp to the community that have not met or will be in jeopardy of meeting the probation reporting requirements. They may perform "probation checks" at the homes of youths who are on probation as part of their effort to provide increased supervision. In an effort to facilitate the "probation checks", the County will provide the names and contact information of juvenile probationers who reside within the City of Los Angeles. The "probation checks" are intended to ensure that youths being serviced by the County are meeting the provisions of state and federal laws governing juvenile probationers;
- Coordinate efforts with the Agency to conduct curfew sweeps and truancy recovery operations for the HR/HN population, assessing and addressing

issues pertaining to the following risk factors: school truancy, negative peer associations, and substance abuse; and

- Coordinate with the Agency to provide additional presence at designated JJCPA sites based on the Agency's evaluation of existing crime patterns and emerging crime trends.

V. AGENCY RESPONSIBILITIES

The Agency will select the sites to deploy resources based on existing crime patterns and emerging crime trends. To effectively reduce juvenile-based violent crimes and delinquency as well as to suppress gang activity, crimes, narcotic sales and trafficking, Alcohol and Beverage Control (ABC) violations, and illegal weapons possession and sales, the Agency will provide to the HR/HN and SP/SZ Programs the following services, as appropriate:

- Provide extra patrols and increased uniform presence in, around and/or in the proximity of the designated schools, parks, housing projects and other sites;
- Coordinate proactive and aggressive efforts with the County to provide increased supervision to HR/HN youths transitioning from the camp to the community that have not met or are in jeopardy of meeting the County reporting requirements;
- Conduct youth outreach activities through certain Agency Youth Programs as may be designated by the Agency;
- Perform truancy and curfew sweeps when appropriate;
- The Agency will make every effort to coordinate the curfew and truancy sweeps with the County to ensure that a DPO II will be present to assist in identifying youths who may require JJCPA services. During the operation of the joint task force, the Agency will transport detained curfew and truancy violators to a pre-designated location for processing and assessment by County staff. County personnel will subsequently meet with the detained juvenile(s) and their respective parent(s) to provide intervention services;
- Direct gang suppression efforts in support of this program by monitoring the activities of local gangs for crime, parole/probation or injunction violations, or narcotic and weapons violations, impacting violent crimes that result each year from the combination of gang activity and narcotic sales;
- Provide follow-up services to victims of violent crimes, gang shootings, murders and narcotic sales in the vicinity of designated parks, street corners and/or other places frequented by gang members and juveniles in the targeted high crime/high need areas;

- Incorporate ABC and narcotic enforcement operations into prevention/intervention efforts by targeting and identifying licensees who illegally sell alcoholic beverages to minors, and by focusing on the sale and trafficking of illegal drugs at locations where juveniles assemble, hang around and/or patronize;
- Carry on operational activities and follow-up services to identify those responsible for gun trafficking, illegal weapons sales, and for perpetrating drive-by-shootings, in an effort to reduce drive-by-shootings and to stem gun violence around designated schools, parks and housing projects; and
- Attend monthly meetings of the partners of the JJCPA Collaborative.

VI. CONFIDENTIALITY

The County and Agency shall continue to maintain the confidentiality of all records and information relating to juvenile participants under this MOA. This shall be in accordance with Welfare & Institutions Code (WIC) provisions, as well as all other applicable federal, State and County laws, ordinances, regulations, and directives relating to confidentiality. The County and Agency shall inform all their managers, supervisors, employees, and contractors providing services hereunder, of the confidentiality provision of this MOA.

In no case shall records or information pertaining to participants be disclosed to any person except designated County and Agency employees without the written permission of a Probation Director, or authorized representative.

VII. FISCAL PROVISIONS

The County shall make payments to the Agency for services, as itemized in the Attachment A, Budget, pursuant to this MOA. Such payments shall be made from the JJCPA funds. Any modification to the Budget that exceeds 10% of the total award amount shall be in writing and executed by both the County and Agency. Payment terms are as follows:

- The Agency shall submit monthly invoices that comply with the JJCPA 2016/2017 plan budget, approved by the State and expanded upon in the attached Attachment B, Project Plan.
- Invoices, with supporting documentation, shall be submitted by the 25th day of the following service month. All invoices shall be sent to the County's Fiscal Manager:

If an audit of the Programs covered in this MOA identifies and disallows ineligible costs, the Agency shall reimburse the County the amount of the over-payment.

VIII. LIABILITY

Each of the parties to this MOA is a public entity. In contemplation of the provisions of Section 895.2 of the Government Code of the State of California imposing certain tort liability jointly upon public entities, solely by reason of such entities being parties to an agreement as defined by Section 895 of said Code, the parties hereto, as between themselves, pursuant to the authorization contained in Section 895.4 and 895.6 of said Code, will each assume the full liability imposed upon it or upon any of its officers, agents, or employees by law, for injury caused by a negligent or wrongful act or omission occurring in the performance of this MOA, to the same extent that such liability would be imposed in the absence of Section 895.2 of said Code. To achieve the above-stated purpose, each party indemnifies and holds harmless the other party solely by virtue of said Section 895.2. The provision of Section 2778 of the California Civil Code is made a part hereto as if fully set forth herein. The Agency certifies that it has adequate self-insured retention of funds to meet any obligation arising from this MOA.

IX. BACKGROUND AND SECURITY INVESTIGATIONS

The Agency shall be responsible for ongoing implementation and monitoring of the following Paragraphs 1 through 6, and ensuring compliance with the following:

1. The Agency shall conduct thorough background checks on all personnel employed by the Agency for this program.
2. The Agency shall ensure that the services of any volunteer for this program will not be utilized until the volunteer has completed the appropriate background review as required by state law.
3. The County and/or Agency reserve the right to preclude Agency/County employees from employment or continued employment of any individual for this contract service.
4. No personnel employed by the Agency for this program having access to County and/or Agency information or records shall have a criminal conviction

record or a pending criminal trial unless such information has been fully disclosed and employment of the employee for this program is approved in writing by the County.

5. No personnel employed by the Agency for this project shall be on active probation or parole within the last three (3) years.
6. The Agency and employees of the Agency shall be under a continuous obligation to disclose any prior or subsequent criminal conviction record or any pending criminal trial to the County.

X. SUSPENSION

Either party may suspend all or part of the project operations for failure by the other to comply with the terms and conditions of this MOA by giving written notice, which shall be effective upon receipt.

- Said notice shall set forth the specific conditions of non-compliance and shall provide a reasonable period for corrective action.

XI. TERMINATION

This MOA may be terminated at any time, without cost, by either party upon giving at least thirty (30) days prior written notice thereof to the other. This MOA may be terminated if funding becomes unavailable.

XII. AMENDMENTS

This MOA may only be amended by mutual written consent of both parties. Neither verbal agreements nor conversations by any officers, employees and/or representatives of either party shall affect or modify any of the terms and conditions of this MOA.

Any change to the terms of this MOA, including those affecting the responsibilities of the parties and/or the rate and/or the method of compensation shall be incorporated into this MOA by a written amendment that is properly executed.

XIII. ENTIRE MOA

This MOA contains the full and complete agreement between the two parties and is executed in three (3) identical originals, each of which is deemed to be an original. This MOA contains seven (7) pages and two (2) attachments that constitute the entire understanding and agreement of the parties.

IN WITNESS WHEREOF, the County of Los Angeles and Agency have caused this MOA to be executed on their behalf by their authorized representatives, the day, month and year first above written. The person signing on behalf of the Agency warrants that he or she is authorized to bind the Agency, and attest under penalty of perjury to the truth and authenticity of representations made and documents submitted and incorporated as part of this MOA.

PROJECT PLAN

Los Angeles Police Department's Juvenile Justice Crime Prevention Act (JJCPA) Programs

The Los Angeles Police Department (LAPD) intends to continue to build upon the success of last year's programs that focused on the reduction of juvenile delinquency and the reduction of crime. Those programs include the "Safe Passages/Safe Zones" Program and the LAPD's Youth Programs. Half of the funding will be used in support of the Safe Passages/Safe Zones Program. The other half will be used in support of the Department's youth programs where approximately 90%-95% of the earmarked money will be used specifically to support the Cadet Leadership Program (Cadet Program). Because the Cadet Program is a LAPD mandated program for every patrol division, there is a greater need and focus for this program. The LAPD will use 100% of the funding to pay for sworn overtime in support of these programs. Without police officers, the delivery of services to these two programs becomes a challenge.

SAFE PASSAGES / SAFE ZONES

The "Safe Passages/Safe Zones" program aims to maintain safe areas in and around pre-designated Juvenile Justice Crime Prevention Act (JJCPA) sites for youth and their families. These zones have been identified as having high crime rates and/or the propensity for violence. For the youth who reside in these areas, they now become high risk/high need (HR/HN) and prone to joining a gang, becoming involved in criminal activity, or becoming a victim of criminal activity.

To help establish the mission for each JJCPA location, and to effectively address active concerns, each LAPD Division that is responsible for a JJCPA site, shall attend the meetings of the partners of the JJCPA Collaborative (Safe Passage "cluster" meetings).

In order to improve the safety of these communities, the LAPD will provide extra patrol services in these areas where the community can safely engage in everyday life activities. These basic activities include the act of walking to and from school safely. The LAPD will provide extra patrols and increased uniform presence in, around, and/or in the proximity of the designated schools, parks, housing projects and other sites. The following can also be incorporated into the daily mission:

- At the request of the Probation Department, the LAPD will coordinate proactive and aggressive efforts with the Probation Department, to provide increased supervision to HR/HN youths transitioning from the camp to the community that have not met or are in jeopardy of meeting the County reporting requirements.
- Direct gang suppression efforts in support of this program by monitoring the activities of local gangs for crimes, parole/probation or injunction violations, or narcotics and

weapons violations, impacting violent crimes that result each year from the combination of gang activity and narcotics sales.

- Provide follow-up services to victims of violent crimes, gang shootings, murders and narcotics sales in the vicinity of designated parks, street corners, and /or other places frequented by gang members and juveniles in the targeted high crime/high need areas.
- Incorporate ABC and narcotic enforcement operations into prevention/intervention efforts targeting and identifying licensees who illegally sell alcoholic beverages to minors, and by focusing on the sale and trafficking of illegal drugs at locations where juveniles assemble, hang around and/or patronize.
- Carry on operational activities and follow-up services to identify those responsible for gun trafficking, illegal weapons sales, and for perpetrating drive-by shooting, in an effort to reduce drive-by-shootings and to stem gun violence around designated schools, parks, and housing developments.

The LAPD will provide appropriate police presence and patrol services to the JJCPA program pre-designated locations based upon existing crime patterns, emerging crime trends, and areas identified by the Safe Passage collaboratives. The service will focus on curtailing gang activity, gun violence, narcotic sales, and other criminal activity in and around the proximity of schools, parks and housing developments that are designated JJCPA sites (See attached site locations). The LAPD will collaborate with the Los Angeles Unified School District to help maintain a peaceful environment for students, parents, teachers, and administrators at JJCPA-designated school campuses.

If any youth are identified as high risk and in need of services, officers will complete a LACPD Request for Probation Services form. The request will be forwarded to probjjcpaadmin@probation.lacounty.gov for referral. The LAPD will track these referrals as part of their overall recap and submit this information as part of their measure of effectiveness.

During the joint taskforce operation, the LAPD will transport detained curfew and truancy violators to a pre-designated location for processing and assessment by LACPD staff. The LACPD personnel will subsequently meet with the detained juvenile(s) and their respective parent(s) to provide intervention services, which can include a referral to LAPD's youth intervention programs.

If a juvenile is arrested for a less serious offense, the goal of the LAPD is to refer the juvenile to diversion services instead of booking him or her. The juvenile offenses include resisting arrest, making false reports for emergency, fire, crime, and identification (148 (a) PC, 148.1 PC, 148.3 PC, 148.4 PC, 148.5 PC, 148.9 PC), assault and battery (242 PC, 243.4 PC, 243.5 PC, 243.6 PC), petty theft (459 PC, 484 (a) PC, 485 PC), robbery (211 PC without a weapon), disturbing the peace (415 PC, 415.5 (a) PC, 416 (a) PC, 416 (b) PC), vandalism (594 (a) PC, 594 (b) PC, 594 (b)(2) PC, 594 (c) PC, 594 (d) PC, 594 (e) PC, 594 (f) PC), assembly disturbance (416 (a) PC, 416 (b) PC), miscellaneous crimes in school grounds (626.10 (a) PC, 626.10 (b) PC, 626.10 (c) PC, 626.10 (d) PC, 626.10 (f) PC, 626.10 (h) PC), probation condition violations (cases under WIC 777 section), and disorderly conduct (647 (d) PC) when there is no prior sustained felony.

The LAPD has currently partnered with Centinela Youth Services, a restorative-justice agency, to provide alternatives to a booking when a juvenile is arrested for the first time or has a minimal arrest history. The Juvenile Arrest Diversion Program provides a young person and the parents or guardians an opportunity to participate in an intensive program designed to rehabilitate juveniles and advance their socially-normative development. This program also negates the need to book eligible juvenile subjects, reducing the time involved for arresting officers and increasing the availability of patrol resources.

The LAPD will also collaborate with the LACPD in instances where a juvenile has been released from custody and is deemed a “high risk/high need” youth who is transitioning from probation camps to the community. The LAPD can work collaboratively with the LACPD to provide these youths with the guidance and direction they might need. Special attention will be given to those “high risk/high need” youths who have not met, or will be in jeopardy of failing to meet their probation reporting requirements. This attention can include “probation knocks” at the homes of youths in an effort to offer assistance, support, and referrals for services from community partners.

The approach is intended to remind youths that someone cares, and ensure that they are not relapsing into old behavioral patterns. Borrowing from multi-systemic therapy, it also aspires to engage and empower family members who may not be aware of or may not know how to go about seeking services to assist youths in making positive changes. The ultimate goal is to create opportunities for youths to excel in life.

LAPD YOUTH PROGRAMS

The LAPD will conduct outreach activities through all LAPD Youth Programs. The LAPD’s youth programs have proven to be an innovative and reliable solution to the department’s crime prevention and reduction objectives outside of traditional enforcement measures. The LAPD hosts a variety of youth programs developed as community-based crime prevention and intervention strategies, which offer a positive relationship between the police, the City’s youth, and their families. Youth programs provide the City’s youth with positive alternatives, as well as a path that can lead to a brighter future.

Youth program participants are provided with a safe environment to interact with their peers, while experiencing opportunity and hope. The LAPD’s youth programs serve as an important element for broader community outreach efforts to build community trust and collaboration. Additionally, they are largely provided at no cost to youth participants and their families and it is through JJCPA funding that these programs are available.

Recruitment efforts are aimed at all Los Angeles City youth, but increased focus is directed at providing viable and healthy alternatives/choices to those in communities who often have few - the most needy, disadvantaged, and vulnerable. The City’s youth face unique challenges and profound obstacles resulting from poverty, exposure to drugs and violence, neglect, and lack of access or exposure to quality education.

Many of the City's youth live in "at-risk" communities and have started to exhibit "risky behavior." The LAPD aims to provide guidance, direction, and inspiration through existing youth programs, with the ultimate goal of preventing and/or interrupting risky behavior.

Youth programs and the subsequent relationships forged between the LAPD, youth participants, and their families can change the distrust-and-fear dynamic between community members and the police, resulting in safer communities. It is through the continuation of youth services that police officers are provided the opportunity to make a difference in young people's lives. The LAPD's youth programs are an indispensable approach to developing meaningful and sustained relationships with the diverse communities of Los Angeles, and it is through these relationships that our ability to prevent crime and make our communities safer is enriched.

Although a big part of our youth outreach and recruitment effort focuses on the LAPD's signature Cadet Leadership Program, other programs are hosted by various patrol divisions. These varied programs focus on the different needs of our communities and our youth.

Jeopardy (8-17 years)

Jeopardy is a community-based intervention program for youth "at-risk" of becoming involved in gangs. The program offers at risk youth and their families with resources and referrals, while seeking to decrease truancy, gang involvement, violence and criminal behavior.

Juvenile Impact Program (9-17 years)

The Juvenile Impact Program is a community-based intervention program for delinquent "at risk" youth in need of immediate diversion from gangs and criminal behavior. The program strives to prevent and correct negative or inappropriate behavior in youth by instilling personal accountability, discipline, self-esteem, and respect for themselves and others. This is accomplished through a regimented academic and physical training program.

Police Activities League (6-17 years)

The Police Activities League is a youth crime prevention program that provides youth with an opportunity to participate in self-enhancement activities through educational, athletic, and other recreational activities, while creating a bond between police officers and the youth in the community.

Junior Cadets (9-12 years)

The Junior Cadet program introduces youth to the law enforcement profession, while instilling a sense of community pride, self-discipline, and leadership. It provides the participants with the physical and mental preparation necessary to transition to the Cadet program, or any other Department sponsored youth program.

Cadet Leadership Program (13-20 years)

The Cadet Leadership Program is a community-based prevention program that aims to empower youth to maximize their personal and scholastic potential, while emphasizing the importance of leadership, academic excellence, ethical decision-making, and community stewardship.

To achieve the “Cadet” title, youth participants must complete the 15-week academy as “Recruit Cadets” (recruits). The academy is generally hosted at the LAPD Ahmanson Recruit Training Center (ARTC) on Saturdays from 7am-2pm with classroom instruction delivered primarily by LAPD police officers. A typical academy class will include approximately 450-600 youth participants from throughout the City, which requires approximately 60 LAPD police officers (to include LAPD supervisors and an Emergency Medical Technician certified staff member) to effectively manage all participants in addition to maintaining health and safety measures.

Upon completion of the 15-week academy, the Cadet Program hosts a graduation ceremony at the University of Southern California Galen Center where family, friends, and educators celebrate each youth participant’s successful transition from “Recruit Cadet” to “Police Cadet.” Following the graduation ceremony, new graduates take their place among thousands of cadet peers Citywide and remain connected to the Cadet Program through active participation at their respective cadet posts (28 total posts Citywide). Cadets are eligible to participate in the Cadet Program until 21 years of age. Participants who turn 21 years of age must retire from the Cadet Program; however, upon retirement they can return as volunteers or apply for the many career paths associated with the Department.

While engaged at their cadet posts, cadets participate in educational activities (tutoring sessions, homework assistance, visits to college campuses, scholarships and grant writing, guest presentations, etc.); vocational activities (non-hazardous police job-training, volunteer community service tasks, carrying out non-hazardous police duties at their respective Areas/Divisions); and, social and recreational experiences (skate nights, barbeques, yearly picnics and banquets, single-day and overnight outings, amusement park visits, and dances). Cadets have access to the above-described benefits if they remain committed and engaged active members of the program and follow a code of conduct that precludes engaging in any criminal activity and requires academic excellence and ethical decision-making.

Cadet Leadership Program Focus

To reemphasize, a significant portion of the JJCPA funding will be utilized to host the various components of the Cadet Leadership Program, which is LAPD’s largest and most enduring program. The funding will be utilized to supply the program with police officer mentors tasked with providing the educational, vocational, and social experiences for over 1400 active cadets Citywide (as of June 2018).

The LAPD will continue to strive to find the balance between suppression, intervention, and prevention using varied strategies, with the ultimate goal of preventing juvenile delinquency and supporting the reduction of crime in the City of Los Angeles.
