

RULES, ELECTIONS, AND INTERGOVERNMENTAL RELATIONS COMMITTEE REPORT and RESOLUTION relative to establishing the City's position regarding ACA 4 (Mullin) which would authorize a U.S. citizen who is 17 years of age, is a resident of the State, and will be 18 years of age at the time of the next general election to vote in any intervening primary or special election.

Recommendation for Council action, pursuant to Resolution (Wesson - Harris-Dawson), SUBJECT TO THE CONCURRENCE OF THE MAYOR:

ADOPT the accompanying RESOLUTION (Wesson - Harris-Dawson) to include in the City's 2019-20 State Legislative Program, SUPPORT for ACA 4 which would authorize a U.S. citizen who is 17 years of age, is a resident of the State of California, and will be at least 18 years of age at the time of the next general election to vote in any intervening primary or special election that occurs before the next general election.

Fiscal Impact Statement: None submitted by the Chief Legislative Analyst (CLA). The City Administrative Officer has not completed a financial analysis of this report.

Community Impact Statement: None submitted.

### SUMMARY

At a special meeting held on March 5, 2019, the Rules, Elections, and Intergovernmental Relations Committee considered a CLA report dated March 1, 2019 and Resolution relative to establishing the City's position to support ACA 4 which would authorize a U.S. citizen who is 17 years of age, is a resident of the State of California, and will be at least 18 years of age at the time of the next general election to vote in any intervening primary or special election that occurs before the next general election.

After providing an opportunity for public comment, the Committee recommended that Council approve the recommendation in the CLA report and adopt the Resolution. This matter is now forwarded to Council for its consideration.
