I heard that John Lee is considering a proposal to remove the protected bike lanes from the Reseda Boulevard Great Streets project, and I am writing to say that I could not disagree with this proposal more. This route has become exponentially safer now that there's protection for cyclists, and now I ride it (and frequent businesses in the area) all the time. I'm a downtown resident, and I never felt comfortable riding on the road previously, and had a number of very close calls in the bike lanes there. Mr. Lee's suggestion that "exiting and entering a vehicle that is parked on-street can be dangerous, as the driver is immediately adjacent to ongoing traffic" is a bit of a fallacy, as drivers were already immediately adjacent to traffic in the old design (bicycle traffic), and dooring a cyclist leads to numerous deaths every year. With the new configuration, drivers can easily avoid an unsafe situation by checking their mirror and using the dutch reach before exiting the vehicle. However, in the previous configuration, cyclists were at risk and did not have any means to protect themselves against active drivers drifting into the bike lane nor parked drivers opening their doors without warning (which also puts drivers at risk, both those parked and those driving). The new configuration is much, much better for everyone. As seen in the countless studies done of the protected bike lanes and road diets elsewhere in the city, they're good for preventing injury, improving local business and foot traffic, and have little to no effect on car traffic. We need to keep in mind that Los Angeles is a dense urban environment, and we need to keep the safety and security of EVERYONE in mind, not just the car driver demographic. If people are having difficult navigating the bike lanes from their car, perhaps we should improve the barriers, and use a solid concrete curb, rather than the plastic bollards. I urge you to keep the Reseda Blvd Great Streets improvements intact. It may not seem like a big deal to drivers speeding by, but I am literally begging with my life. What are minor inconveniences for drivers are absolutely major MAJOR improvements in my life as a pedestrian and while riding a bicycle. Thank you.
