Comments for Public Posting: The LA city budget will go into effect TOMORROW July 1st and there has hardly been any change in the budget. The police budget was originally around \$3 BILLION, so a \$150 Million reduction is not going to cut it. From Garcetti's email:"So we're identifying \$250 million in new investments — including cuts to the police department — for community programs in our city's Black communities and other communities of color." So we are again only taking such a small fraction from the police (\$150 million) and where is the rest of the \$100 million being taken from? schools? homelessness programs? hospitals? There is no information on the "new investments." In addition, \$250 million spread across multiple programs is nothing for the work they must do to build our city back up and hardly does much to sustain these programs. They are false promises made in order to appease the public and trick them into thinking you care. THREE BILLION DOLLARS is not necessary for the police. Remember when the coronavirus hit and the city was struggling with coming up with the money to provide proper PPE for all healthcare workers to where some nurses died or refused to work?? Remember that? But when it came to the police and these protests, every officer had their riot gear uniform (which is about 54x as expensive as 1 full PPE uniform) and tear gas and rubber bullets and the National Guard was called in as backup faster than any aid for the coronavirus. Comments for Public Posting: Regarding the City Council meeting on June 30, 2020: I would like to make a general public comment on the extreme lack of care (though unsurprising) the Council members have taken in the past several months regarding the COVID-19 pandemic and its effects on millions of Angelenos' lives and regarding the demands proposed by Black Lives Matter Los Angeles' presentation of the People's Budget on June 15, 2020. The infrastructure of this city, from freeway construction to housing ordinances, is violent against communities of color. Housing is a human right and should be built into the city's maintenance budget. Speaking of poor budgeting, the amount of money going into the LAPD budget is astonishing--you should all be wary of the amount of people radicalized after viewing that budget and the fact that we will all vote you out of office based on your actions. We are watching you closer than ever before. Item no. 48: Non-violent, unarmed first responders are necessary as the police are defunded and demilitarized in the coming years. Yes, the LAPD will be defunded and that money will be reallocated to services that put people first. Since the uprisings in Watts, the LAPD has been showcasing its baseless violence against Black communities with shameless abandon. This view of Los Angeles as one of the most racist cities in the U.S. has been upheld by the LAPD for far too long. We have not forgotten about Rodney King; we have not forgotten about the raid on 39th and Dalton Avenue in 1988; we are keeping score of the 600+ lives taken by the LAPD under Jackie Lacey's reign. There has been an extreme lack of care in how the police are implemented in this city for decades--and reform has never been the answer to right the countless wrongs committed by officers in your force. Affordable housing has been all but ignored by the City Council in favor of developments and planning projects that directly force people out of their homes. Once again, this city council has proven they do not care about the people they serve--you care about money and power. Your position dehumanizes the citizens of Los Angeles and any attempt at showing you care is pointless without action. We urge you to use eminent domain to purchase Hillside Villa and the Grand Plaza Apartments and keep them permanently affordable. This would be the first of many acts repairing the harm the city has caused its tenants with their lack of care during this global pandemic and always. Given that LA City Council only allotted general public comment for a limited period of time in today's Budget and Finance Committee Meeting, I would like to demand that LA City Officials defund and divest LAPD funding. The Mayor's budget allocates more than 50% of our city budget (over 3 billion) to law enforcement which is a gross injustice to our community. I would like to place heavy emphasis on dismantling the LAPD Air Support Division and Sheriff's department which boasts 36 helicopters. That is 9 more helicopters than Chicago, New York, Philadelphia, Phoenix and Houston COMBINED. We'd like an end to ineffective and expensive Predictive Policing. In a study authored by Jeff Asher and Benjamin Horowitz by AH DataLytics, in major cities law enforcement responds to calls of crime 4% of the time.
