It's a step in the right direction, sure, but we're asking for a leap. The council needs to acknowledge the role that the LAPD has played in furthering white supremacy, institutionalized racism, and fascism, having murdered 601 people in the past 7 years. Is this really the best use of the General Fund? Right now, you all sit in positions of power and have the ability to enact real, quantifiable change. Please don't waste this opportunity, and consider the following budget reforms: --Reduce the LAPD budget and reinvest in programs that support your Black, Brown, and Indigenous constituents -- Fund public education, mental healthcare, public access and resources for the differently-abled, drug treatment, affordable housing, and other community programs that offer alternatives to incarceration -- Refuse to budget for civil litigations against LAPD employees.
