I've seen the amount of unhoused people we have living on our streets grow at an astonishing rate. I've seen the amount of addicted and unhoused grow at that same astonishing rate as well. I've watched as our roads crack and deteriorate and lay there damaged and inefficient without any hope of getting them fixed. I've watched as promises about improved public transportation have gone unfulfilled. I've watched as budgets for schools, daycares, and other educational institutions have been slashed left and right. I've watched as two Los Angeles appear to emerge distinct and horrifying: the ultra wealthy and the devastatingly poor. And all this time I was here thinking that the reason these things were happening was because our city did not have enough money to change them. Boy was I wrong. Instead of putting our money toward the communities that make up this city, you have flooded it into the police and their weaponry. Not to police training, not to police education, not to police outreach in the community. No, our money is going toward arming the police with military-grade weapons and armor. You say that this is a measure to prevent crime, but there is no evidence that increasing police budgets (especially increasing the amount of weapons they use) has any effect on crime. In fact, it is proven that communities with the largest amount of police presence are the ones with the most crime. You might argue that the police are there because of the crime, but it is the opposite. Those communities were decimated by cuts to education, healthcare, and other community institutions. And then you sent in a racist, brutal police force trained to believe they are in a den of criminals, not a community of their constituents. You will have many, many lies as to why you continue using our tax dollars this way, but the truth of the matter is that the police is a powerful political force and you are scared of what defunding them might do to your precious career. But I ask you to grow a spine and actually work for the people who elected you. We do not want a stronger police force that controls every aspect of our life in this city. We want community institutions that will uplift us and create pathways to prevent crime from even happening in the first place. We want schools that have

working computers, new textbooks, comprehensive curriculums that include the arts and sciences, and well-paid, appreciated teachers. We want complete shelters for the unhoused that offer resources for continuing success once they find housing, such as job interview training, education on nutrition, cooking, and grocery shopping, free childcare, access to computers and internet, more temporary housing that allows families to stay together, etc. We want community centers both for healthcare and for community gatherings and bonding. We want our roads fixed. We want an expansive and affordable public transportation system. We want affordable housing. We want teams of social workers and psychiatrists who can manage situations of addiction, mental illness or domestic violence, situations that, when police are called in, often end in violence and murder. We want so, so many things that would improve our quality of life and lower crime simply by assuring that citizens are housed, fed, healthy, safe and cared for. And with movements come uncomfortable change. I know many police officers within LAPD that, at their core, are decent people. But, the system is broken. It does not allow them to be the great people that they are. That is, until massive changes take place. I do believe, after much consideration, it is time to defund the police and rebuild a much different People's Force. It's time for that money to go back into the community at large to serve everyone, including marginalized communities--POC, LGBTQ and the socioeconomically disadvantaged. 

SPENDING AREAS

UNIVERSAL AID AND CRISIS MANAGEMENT

The Universal Aid and Crisis Management funding category supports the basic needs of Angelenos like housing, food, healthcare, economic assistance and emergency relief. Both survey participants and those participating in our participatory budgeting session emphasized universal aid and crisis management as their top priority, with a particular focus on housing.

This funding area includes funding for long-term housing, renter support and emergency housing, food assistance, support for those seeking work, support for small businesses, providing public health care, offering youth development programs and supporting youth centers, fighting the impacts of climate change and ensuring our city's environment is protected. This area also includes emergency preparedness for natural disasters like earthquakes and fire as well as the public health disasters.

THE BUILT ENVIRONMENT

The Built Environment funding category focuses on our city's physical infrastructure like public transportation, libraries, parks, public works and the fire department. Based on our survey results, these are essential public goods for Angelenos.

REIMAGINED COMMUNITY SAFETY

Participants were also committed to reimagining community safety and building and resourcing restorative justice practices that enable strong communities without law enforcement presence or intervention. The Reimagined Community Safety funding category supports a community-led safety model including investing in mental health and harm reduction approaches. Rather than funding police that bring violence and harm into our communities, Reimagined Community Safety invests in communities themselves to determine what they need and to offer them support in executing those programs.


Specific initiatives that could be included in this category are family counseling, restorative justice programs, reparations to victims and their families, community-led crisis response programs, gang prevention/intervention/recovery without police involvement, and domestic violence prevention/intervention/recovery without police involvement. This category also includes building stronger connections among neighbors through investing in community-led events.

LAW ENFORCEMENT

The law enforcement category included all traditional approaches, including police, City Attorney, and traffic enforcement. Across all demographics of survey respondents, this was ranked as the lowest priority for spending.





Top Priorities for Investment



PROCESS AND METHODOLOGY

A survey was sent out by dozens of community organizations, with city-wide presence and representing neighborhoods throughout Los Angeles. The survey was also posted on more than 100 social media accounts and People's Budget LA's website. Responses were only accepted from residents of the City of Los Angeles who could identify their area of residence on an interactive map. Beyond the solicitation of survey responses, the coalition held a two-hour, online participatory budgeting session on Sunday, May 24, 2020 to share information about the city budgeting process and to gather public input. More than 10,000 people have viewed the session so far.

**1470 Angelenos responded to the survey and we are continuing to collect results
3300 participants engaged in the participatory budgeting session in real time and an additional 10,000 viewers watched the session after-the-fact.**

Survey responses included constituents from all 15 council districts. The survey data is available for exploration in a Tableau dashboard ([linked at PeoplesBudgetLA.com](http://PeoplesBudgetLA.com))

ADOPT A PEOPLE'S BUDGET

We believe that the government should be responsive to the needs, priorities, and demands of the people. There is clearly a wide chasm between the budget proposed by the Mayor (and directly or indirectly endorsed by the City Council) and the one envisioned by Los Angeles residents. The City Charter enables Council to pass or revise the Mayor's budget proposal or submit a new budget for implementation. In a democracy, the Council should listen to the will of the people and pass a People's Budget that centers the priorities that Angelenos have listed as central to them by June 1, 2020.
