To the Clerk of Budget and Finance Committee:

I live in Sherman Oaks. Because our Mayor is asking for our comments on the allocation of police funding, I am chiming in with my opionion, and hope you will pass these sentiments on to him.

As you know, the LAPD's current budget, around \$1.8 billion, includes at least \$1.28 million in administrative costs over which the City has no control. But until we are able to create a new culture of equality and fairness within the organization designed to protect us all, I STRONGLY advocate for the reallocation of far more than \$100-\$150 million from the LAPD. These funds should be poured into community services such as housing, education, youth empowerment and mental health aimed predominantly at our Black population which has been so severely underfunded.

As all us Angelinos know, we have an out-of-control homeless problem which will require much more funding than is currently available. In addition, we have seen more clearly than ever over these past weeks just how deeply poverty, shoddy education, and rampant racist attitudes have contributed to crime and violence. Worse, we have once again been made starkly aware of the hardened intolerance of our police culture.

I am a 73-year-old white widow living alone in a neighborhood of single family homes. Of course, I want to be safe in my home. My name is Kate Bolea and I am a resident of Los Angeles, Council District #4. We are in the midst of a health pandemic with severe economic consequences. Over 50% of Angelenos are unemployed — and we can expect 42% lasting unemployment. Over 50% of this city is renters — and if they are unemployed, they cannot pay rent. Prior to the pandemic, there were around 60k people unhoused in LA, by our best estimates; after evictions and economic insecurity due to COVID-19 and its fallout, we can expect thousands more.

The "cuts" to LAPD announced so theatrically by Mayor Garcetti this week are not deep, as they have been characterized in the media; rather, they are in line with or even lagging behind cuts to other areas of the city's budget. In the midst of widespread upheaval over the systemic violence, embodied by the LAPD, which has murdered more than 600 people during the tenure of DA Jackie Lacey. We will no longer accept empty gestures and suggestions of "reform."

We need to defund the LAPD.
