The Echo Park Neighborhood Council supports the City Council's May 27, 2022 approved Motion, originating at the Planning and Land Use Management Committee of August 12, 2020, instructing the Planning Department, the Department of Building and Safety, and the Bureau of Street Services to prepare a report and recommendations relative to ongoing tree and biodiversity planning, strategies and/or efforts to protect and grow the City's urban canopy (CF 15-0499-SI).
