

ADOPT a policy that the objective of a *Green New Deal for Los Angeles* is to also:

- Reduce by 50% by 2030 the number of census tracts in the communities of the East San Fernando Valley, South Los Angeles, Eastside, and Harbor/Wilmington that have a top-third CalEnviroScreen score as indicated in the attached map, by prioritizing and implementing the city’s initiatives and funding major investments directly in these areas to achieve equity and environmental parity.

DIRECT the DWP, LASAN, and other departments, with assistance from the CLA and CAO, to promptly:


- Create a 10-year, \$100M local version of the “Transformative Climate Communities” program, to fund, and implement community defined and led transformation, using existing resources
- Establish targeted local hire programs and career pipelines for residents of these burdened communities to implement Green New Deal capital projects and infrastructure.
- Develop an “Equity and Environmental Justice Impact Statement” for inclusion in all reports analyzing the impact any investment, action, or project would have towards the 50% by 2025 burdened community reduction goal.
- Request the Ratepayer Advocate to analyze DWP’s proposed budget and report on how the budget and activities will directly contribute to the 50% by 2025 burdened community reduction goal, including recommendations for an Environmental Justice Metrics program.

INCLUDE in the requested report pursuant to the original motion:


- An inventory of jobs and pay scales in industries and operations that would be impacted by the implementation of a Green New Deal; and in consultation with the workforce, recommendations to achieve no net job or compensation loss so that the future of blue and green collar jobs continues to serve as the backbone of middle class employment and upward mobility.
- An engagement strategy to incorporate the first hand experiences and insight of workers in the development and implementation of plans for the transition of in-basin generating stations (including the Sun Valley Generating Station) to ensure system reliability and affordability.


