Summary: The Los Feliz Neighborhood Council, committed to leading the way for community-based and inclusive solutions to house our neighbors experiencing homelessness, welcomes and supports Councilmember Ryu's motion to begin the process to bring bridge housing for families to 3061 Riverside Drive. In February, this council, along with the Los Feliz Improvement Association, Griffith Park Adult Community Club, Friends of Griffith Park, and several other neighbors and neighborhood groups, supported new Bridge Housing at 3210 and 3248 Riverside Drive. A separate, specialized facility for parents and young children would further demonstrate our commitment towards building a Los Feliz for all. The location in question is near existing city facilities, near major arterial roads and freeways, and close to the Los Angeles River, where several of our homeless neighbors currently live. Like the project previously approved by this council, this housing will be safe, sanitary, and secure, providing its residents and their adjacent neighbors peace of mind. Eight months ago, this neighborhood showed the entire City of Los Angeles that it was different. Eight months ago, this neighborhood became one of the first to overwhelmingly welcome new housing for our most vulnerable community members. Eight months ago, this neighborhood proved that there need not be a divide between renter and homeowner, "boomer" and "millennial," or "NIMBY" and "YIMBY" when it comes to supporting common-sense solutions to house our neighbors in need. We hope the addition of this new housing, with the broad-based support of our community, can inspire other neighborhoods to join us in helping all of our neighbors find their way home.
