Summary: Los Angeles Neighborhood Councils (NCs) faced the 2020-2021 NC virtual election campaigns with trepidation in the face of a pandemic. Actions and omissions by the Department of Neighborhood Empowerment (DONE) have borne out our concerns as valid. Retrospectively, we can confirm that DONE's use of inexperienced and unprofessional election vendors wasted an enormous amount of funding and that those vendors missed crucial election timeline deadlines. For DONE to hire local civic organizations and non-profits to assist it to conduct a professional election promotion campaign was a giant misstep. If DONE didn't have the expertise to conduct such a campaign, we are appalled that DONE would not engage professional organizations with the expertise to do that. By not doing so, DONE made it painfully obvious that it did not regard NC elections as important enough to merit using professional expertise. We expect the Los Angeles City Council to exercise oversight over DONE's management of NC elections and to demand accountability for the funding DONE receives for this purpose. We at Rampart Village Neighborhood Council were dismayed when DONE ignored our request to place ads on local NPR radio stations KCRW and KPCC as well as on public radio station KPFFK. We heard a radio reference only once on KPCC and that one instance only mentioned that NC elections were happening and it came with no instructions on how to participate. Rampart Village Neighborhood Council agrees with those other NCs that have submitted Community Impact Statements on Council File 20-0963 that DONE's failures of leadership indicate a lack of accountability for the \$456,000 in funding for the 2020-2021 NC elections. Consequently, we request that the Los Angeles City Council require DONE to pass through all future NC election funding directly to the NCs and allow them to select their own election promoters.

Dear Los Angeles City Councilmembers,

Los Angeles Neighborhood Councils (NCs) faced the 2020-2021 NC virtual election campaigns with trepidation in the face of a pandemic. Actions and omissions by the Department of Neighborhood Empowerment (DONE) have borne out our concerns as valid. Retrospectively, we can confirm that DONE's use of inexperienced and unprofessional election vendors wasted an enormous amount of funding and that those vendors missed crucial election timeline deadlines.

A review of the Reseda Neighborhood Council's investigation into the 2020-2021 NC elections reveals that at least seven organizations or vendors contracted by DONE expended large sums of money to promote NC elections without accountability. These include the Dangerman Education Foundation, the Los Angeles County African American Employees Association (LACAAEA), All People's Community Center, Koreatown Youth and Community Center, Evitarus (a survey and public policy polling firm), AltaMed Health Services, and Central City Neighborhood Partners.

For DONE to hire local civic organizations and non-profits to assist it to conduct a professional election promotion campaign was a giant misstep. If DONE didn't have the expertise to conduct such a campaign, we are appalled that DONE would not engage professional organizations with the expertise to do that. By not doing so, DONE made it painfully obvious that it did not regard NC elections as important enough to merit using professional expertise. We expect the Los Angeles City Council to exercise oversight over DONE's management of NC elections and to demand accountability for the funding DONE receives for this purpose.
