A Neighborhood Council Community Impact Statement (CIS) has been successfully submitted to your Commission or City Council. We provided information below about CISs and attached a copy of the CIS.

We encourage you to reach out to the Community Impact Statement Filer to acknowledge receipt and if this Community Impact Statement will be scheduled at a future meeting. Neighborhood Council board members are volunteers and it would be helpful if they received confirmation that you received their CIS.

The CIS process was enabled by the Los Angeles Administrative Code §Section 22.819. It provides that, "a Neighborhood Council may take a formal position on a matter by way of a Community Impact Statement (CIS) or written resolution." NCs representatives also testify before City Boards and Commissions on the item related to their CIS. If the Neighborhood Council chooses to do so, the Neighborhood Council representative must provide the Commission with a copy of the CIS or resolution sufficiently in advance for review, possible inclusion on the agenda, and posting on the Commission's website. Any information you can provide related to your agenda setting schedule is helpful to share with the NC.

If the CIS or resolution pertains to a matter *listed on the Commission's agenda*, during the time the matter is heard, the designated Neighborhood Council representative should be given an opportunity to present the Neighborhood Council's formal position. We encourage becoming familiar with the City Council's rules on the subject. At the Chair's discretion, the Neighborhood Council representative may be asked to have a seat at the table (or equivalent for a virtual meeting) typically reserved for City staff and may provide the Neighborhood Council representative more time than allotted to members of the general public. They are also permitted up to five (5) minutes of time to address the legislative body. If the CIS or resolution pertains to a matter *not listed on the agenda*, the designated Neighborhood Council representative may speak during General Public Comments.

Summary: We are heartened to hear that both the Mayor's Office and City Councilmembers are actively working on a capital infrastructure plan that focuses on transparency, accountability, and equity. According to the motion, Council File 23-0919 will result in a Council proposal to the Mayor's office that would implement a 5-year Capital Infrastructure Plan for all public right-of-way projects as part of the FY 2024-25 Budget Proposal and going forward. Furthermore, adoption of this motion and the Council proposal and implementation of a 5-year Capital Infrastructure Plan would represent a strategic approach toward developing, prioritizing, funding and implementing projects to meet mobility equity goals. As stated in the following guide, "What is a Capital Infrastructure Plan (CIP)? And why does L.A. need one?", "Los Angeles has up to 11 agencies working within the City's public right-of-way, sometimes working toward the same outcomes but

without a coordinated approach. Each bureau and department does things differently, often competing with each other for grants and often pursuing opposing visions for the streets and sidewalks. The CIP would give a clear focus and coordinated project list that everyone is working from.” For these reasons, the Rampart Village Neighborhood Council supports Council File 23-0919 and requests that the City Council include in such a plan a role for Neighborhood Councils based on Section 910 of the City Charter. However, given the inability of the CAO and the prior working group comprised of representatives from relevant departments to create a comprehensive Capital Infrastructure Strategic Plan as moved in Council File 13-1384, we recommend that the Council proposal to the Mayor’s office for Council File 23-0919 include the City Attorney negotiating a Memorandum of Agreement among the relevant departments that assigns roles and responsibilities and a time line for development and implementation of a 5-year Capital Infrastructure Plan.
